

Controversy Ends Town, District Agree On Sewer Exchange

After four years of negotiations, frustrations, walk-outs, boycotts, deliberations and recriminations, the town of Manchester and the 8th District agreed last night to a town-wide sewer swap, designed to benefit both.

The two boards of directors, meeting in the hearing room of the Municipal Building, agreed to a plan suggested by Town Director Heron Taylor, and instructed its respective counsel, Irving Abramson for the town, and John LaBelle for the District, to work out the details of the agreement.

The plan, in substance, calls for the abrogation of the 1928 contract, under which the District is handling town sewage for about 50 acres in the Manchester Hospital area; the equal split of sewage on W. Middle Twp., to be accomplished by erecting a new manhole at the intersection of Homestead and the servicing, by the District, of the sewage flow from area near Forest Hills development until such time as the town builds its proposed Village Treatment Plant.

Last night's agreement was unanimous among District board members, but split 5 to 1, with one abstention, among town board members. Directors Robert Stone and Atty. Richard Woodhouse were not present.

Giving approval for the town were Mayor Francis Mahoney, Directors Atty. David Harlan, Harold A. Purkington, Harlan Taylor and Francis Della-Fera.

Frank Stambler abstained and Tom Powell voted "no." As a matter of fact, most of the session was spent in answer to Powell's repeated objections, on his theory that "the town will gain nothing, and the District will benefit greatly."

When the agreement was made to effect, the immediate results will be to relieve the District Sewage Plant of an overload of sewage from the hospital area, and to relieve the town of the almost insurmountable immediate problem of handling Forest Hills sewage.

The alternative in Forest Hills would be the construction of septic tanks, an event-

Ben. Clifford P. Case of New Jersey said his mail is 20-1 in favor of his decision not to support Goldwater unless the Arizona senator withdraws his name from the race.

In Harvey, Ill., the Rev. Wilbur D. Daniel, Negro candidate for Congress, said he would not support Goldwater.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Differences among Republicans furnished a backdrop today for a Senate ceremony designed to honor Sen. Barry Goldwater's candidacy for the presidency.

Refusal of New York's two Republican senators to back the Arizona senator's White House bid failed to dampen enthusiasm among leaders for an ornate "welcome back" to their colleague.

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, who placed Goldwater's name in nomination at the convention in San Francisco, fashioned the tribute.

His idea was for others to join during the day in a welcome back to "one of our own" who has now become the leader of the party.

But what role if any Republicans like Jacob K. Javits and Kenneth P. Keating of New York, and others opposed to Goldwater's conservative bent, would play was a question.

Javits and Keating issued statements Tuesday in which they said they could "not support" Goldwater as the nominee. Both made it clear they were not bolting the party.

Each said he hoped as the campaign developed his position could change.

"But this will take some doing," said Javits.

The Arizona senator had no comment on the action by the New Yorkers. He spent the day at his Washington apartment, resting and talking with staff aides.

His office said this generally would be the schedule the rest of the week, with Goldwater coming to the Senate only for important votes.

An aide said he did not expect Goldwater to issue any statements this week as the GOP nominee.

Partners discuss the wrong mistake

Partner opens with two hearts (forcing to game) and the next player passes. You hold 10-9-8-2. Hearts, 4-3-2-1. Diamonds, 7-5-3. Clubs, 7-2. What do you say?

Answer: Bid 2 NT. Show the weakness first and a trump support later. Some experts have a special bid for a hand of this sort: a jump to four hearts. This shows trump support but no ace king, singleton ever the trump break 3-2, regardless of who holds it.

The discussion continued, with much reference to mathematics. It was all a waste of time because they were arguing about the wrong trick.

Declarer made his mistake at the second trick when he led the king of hearts. The correct play is to lead a low trump and try an immediate finesse with the jack.

If the finesse works, South can lead a trump to clear up the trumps. If the finesse loses, there will still be two trumps in dummy and even a trump return cannot stop South from finishing another diamond in dummy. Then declarer can discard two diamonds and two spades on dummy's clubs after drawing trumps.

If it is usually preferable to postpone a finesse for the queen, but not completely rule out the immediate finesse. It may be necessary to draw the trumps

Rockville-Vernon Radar Trap Is Proposed

Deputy Fire Chief David Douglas scored builders who leave the fire unattended in order to burn off brush and trees from developments.

Local officials will be asked to approve the proposal and to select one of two proposed methods of legislating the plan, either through current state statutes which are completely binding or through a special legislative act which would be presented in January and not as binding.

The vote of intent to be reported at the Aug. 4 meeting will be reported at a regional meeting Aug. 13 in Manchester.

Other towns included in the incinerator are Manchester, Bolton and South Windsor.

Funds for the incinerator, still considered to be far from settled, must be voted at a town meeting, possibly to be held in the fall.

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Local Scouts Scatter In Vast Camp City

(John Fletcher of 76 Irving St. is serving as official correspondent to the Manchester Herald for the Sixth Annual Boy Scout Jamboree which is being held this week at Valley Forge, Pa. The following is the first report received from the camp.)

"On Friday at 9 a.m. the newest unincorporated town in the United States was born. The village is also the strangest town in the world for the builder began only Thursday. I am speaking of the Sixth National Boy Scout Jamboree at Valley Forge. More than 52,000 scouts from the 50 United States and 42 foreign countries are attending this Boy Scout extravaganza.

"As soon as the some 3,000 flags were raised, signaling the opening, ten Manchester scouts set off in ten different directions, some to Hawaii, others to Arizona, Canada and even the European units. But one thing is certain, ever since the one of our ten, and 51,900 others had the time of their lives, and the best is yet to come.

A pageant was held commemorating American Heritage, and several esteemed leaders and founders of the Boy Scout movement spoke.

"Lady Helen-Powell, the widow of the founder of the entire movement, spoke on the true meaning of scouting and the motivating spirit behind it. Joseph E. Brunton, Jr. and Thomas Watson, chief scout executive and president respectively, gave talks on the purpose of the jamboree. The ceremony ended with 15 minutes of fireworks.

effort to keep the violence from spreading up the Malay Peninsula.

The curfew, ordered Tuesday night after bloody fighting between the two groups broke out on the predominantly Chinese island, was lifted at 4 a.m. It was reimposed four and a half hours later, after reports that a mob was surging through the city overrunning vehicles.

Chinews which had flared throughout the night appeared to decrease after daylight. Singapore's General Hospital said four more injured were admitted after the night curfew was lifted, and that 41 persons injured in Tuesday night's violence were in critical condition.

In one Chinese quarter hundreds of Chinese massed in the streets. Troops with fixed bayonets manned barbed wire roadblocks at major intersections.

Deputy Prime Minister Tun Abdul Razak flew to Singapore and went into conference with Premier Lee Kuan Yew of Singapore.

Prime Minister Tunku Abdul Rahman, in Williamsburg, Va., prior to talks with President Johnson, expressed concern over the riots. He said he believed the situation was a result of Communist or Indonesian attempts to stir up trouble. Indonesian President Sukarno has vowed to crush the Malaysian federation, labeling it a ruse to perpetuate British colonial rule.

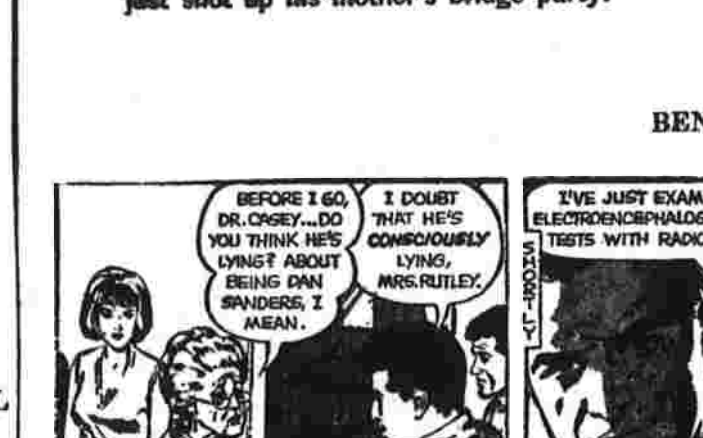

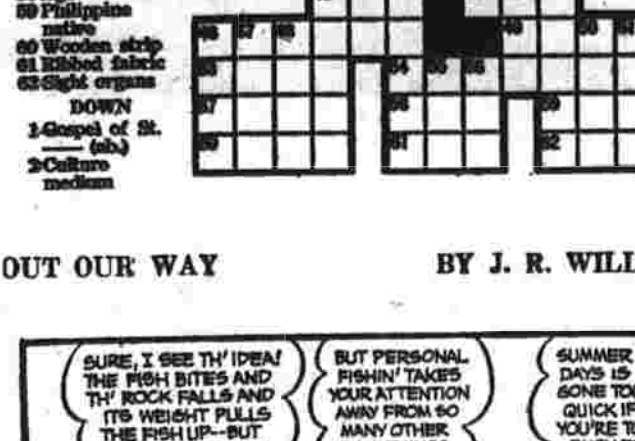

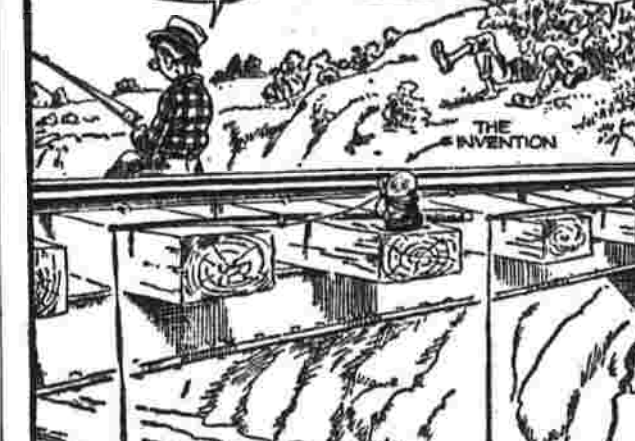
