

Chaos By Decree?

Conceivably, the political parties and people of Connecticut may find some cooperative and democratic way o comply with the instruction and timetable issued to them yesterday by the three judges of the United States District Court. Conceivably, if any sane and orderly compliance with these instructions proves impossible, the judges themselves may condescend to alter their instructions in the direction of some rea-

But any first glance at the instructions as they have been announced has to conclude that they seem to represent some historic extreme in the extent to which the judicial branch of government substitutes itself for every other branch including the ultimate vote of the people themselves. And a second conclusion, which one hopes can somehow prove unfounded, is that the plan and timetable by which the judicial branch is exerting this unprecedented authority is one by which the state of Connecticut is to be thrown into unparalleled and totally unnecessary political paralysis and confusion.

It would seem that the time ahead for Connecticut will require extraordinary good and patient and forgiving citizenship on the part of everybody-a citisenship which will be the more difficult to offer because the Court itself is already telling the free people of this state that they can really vote only one way, and that, although they are required to go through the motions of writing themselves a new Constitution. their own basic authority to do so has been preempted and voided before they even begin.

Good citizenship, in this period, will require abstention from efforts to obstruct and delay and confuse no matter how strongly it may be felt that the Court's instructions deserve such tactics. It will require a good and conscientious effort on the part of people and parties to remember that the important thing and perhaps the thing which may still be possible, is to try to bring this continental birthplace of constitutional democracy through this modern court martial over one alleged imperfection on into some survival of the traditions and principles it once helped give the entire country and would still like to be able to cherish for itself. Somehow, then, the Court's invitation to chaos, almost a direction toward chaos, must be resisted, and cured, and translated into constructive behavior.

The Commodore's Interview

It was quite an interview Air Commodore Nguyen Cao Ky, commander of South Vietnam's Air Force, gave some American correspondents the other day.

Apparently not all American correspondents heard precisely the same things. Some of them wrote as if the South Korean commander had declared war on North Vietnam in the name of the United States. Some of them apparently paid attention to the American officer who sat near Commander Ky and warned American correspondents not to make too much of what he was saying. Some of them reported things from the interview which other correspondents ignored.

The first result, in this country, was that there was a whole day in which some people thought there were sensational new developments concerning our involvement in South Vietnam, while other people were aware of nothing new or special, all of this depending on what correspondents were being heard or read.

The net results, however, even after various accounts of the interview and of the potential facts behind it began trying to balance themselves, remained one of lurid uncertainty regarding a number of points. Was the parachuting of commandos

into North Vietnam something Commodore Ky did once three years ago, or something that goes on all the time?

Is the United States now busily engaged in training the Vietnamese for all kinds of activities which would push the war across the border into North Viet-

Are United States officers really piloting Vietnamese Air Force planes into combat missions? Are American units included, except

at times when the training might be public, in the apparent preparations for carrying the war to North Vietnam? since such questions were raised by what Commodore Ky seemed to be say-ing, they were not answered by the nervus interpolations of the American officer sitting in on the news conference, asking American correspondents not to take them too seriously since Commomodore Ky might not even know Engish well enough to understand the questioning. Nor have they been answered by the subsequent statement of the Vietnamese government, on obvious American prompting, that it disassociates itself from the things Commodore Ky said.

But all these unanswered question have one thing in common. They all point in what has become a rather steady direction in South Vietnam-a direction of continually deeper and more direct involvement by the United States in which we get tougher and tougher and commit ourselves more and more irrevotably to war to the end, and all without even having elected Goldwater yet.

Steamers

Life in a steam bath creates certain voluntary affinities.

One is for clams, who come out of a similar element sweet and succulent. Another is for corn, which steams well too.

We also feel something in commo with ancient, doddering, paunchy tycoons who have to go into steam baths in order to persuade themselves they are still alive.

From our feeling of kinship an empathy with clams, corn, and tycoons, we progress to certain steam nostalgias, like teakettles, the steamers that used to lead out the fire departments, the calliopes that used to lead the circus into town, and the train that used to chug and whistle through the valley. The steamroller, too, used to be a

thing of steam. Now and then, in some stretch of summer weather, we can feel the moisture collecting, globule by globule, saturation by saturation until this valley of ours is soaked full to the hill rims. And then we can feel the pressure mounting, as if. sooner or later, sometime after everything had been cooked through several times, something would have to give out with a whistle, or shrick, or blast or ex-

The way we would like to exit from this present miasma is not like a teakettle whistle, or a calliope, or a limp clam or tycoon, but like a Finn, who suddenly and impetuously erupts from his sauna and dives, topless and bottomless, into deep, delightful drifts of snow.

Where The Ducks Are!

Senator Barry Goldwater's uniqu brew of fundamentalism has brought most Republican delegations in New England back from San Francisco in a dispirited frame of mind. An index of Connecticut Republi can politicians, when queried about th views on the nominee, either expre disenchantment, neutrality, or plead or time to make up their minds. Never in this century, with the en ception of Bull Moosiam, have Repu cans in New England so reacted to the action of a national convention. Com-pared to Goldwater, Alf Landon was manna from heaven, but the problem of course is where to go. This task has been made no easier over the weekend by the boast of John Rousselet, former California congressman and now an organizational director of the John Birch Society. He told the San Francisco Chronicle that more than 100 GOP convention delegates were members of the John Birch Society.

While this number is by no means enough to control the convention, i lends credence to the charge by New York Governor Rockefeller that credence to the charge by New Governor Rockefeller that extremists were trying to infiltrate the Republican Party, and indeed had done so. More and more Rockefeller has tended to emerge as the prophet and the hero -defeated though he was-of the con-

If it has been clear for some time, that Senator Goldwater was going to try to ride the backs of the white backlash into office, it has been by no means clear that he would try to thicken the rawhide of that lash by whipping up further ani-mosities. Arthur Krock, the conservative voice of the New York Times, looked at the Goldwater statement tha.



In Harlem, over the weekend, we have seen an example of the type of anarchism that extremism can bring. That these misguided people see their efforts as a defense of liberty in no way di-minishes the vice and the divisiveness of

their riots. The Arizona senator has long believed that victory at the polls by the Republi-can Party requires Southern support, without regard for its effect on the Negro vote. He told the press at the Republican Southern States Regional Conference in Atlanta in 1961: "We are not going to get the Negro vote as a bloc in 1964 or 1968, so we ought to go hunting where the ducks are." in his hunt, unless he is very careful the Arizona senator is liable to wind up shooting to kill.
