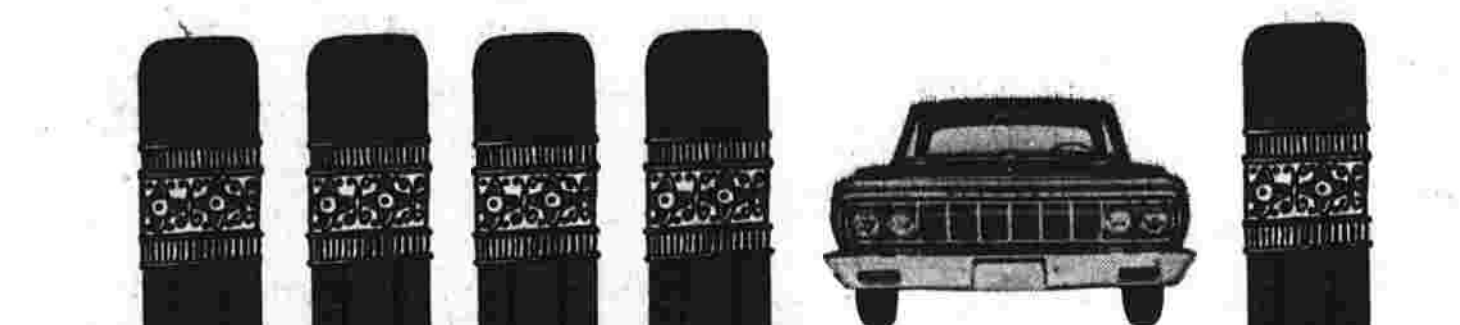

Just Right—Not Far Enough

A week now has gone by, and there is still no overt retaliation from North Vietnam or Communist China to the action of United States planes flying on direct orders of President Johnson.

This lack of overt response seems to indicate that the President's act and policy are becoming more and more accepted, or at least open to a free and relaxed kind of evaluation.

Two kinds of such evaluation are now apparent. One is that the President's action was a masterpiece, just right. The other holds that it did not begin, after all, to be enough.

The first view is that what the President did was just right—as expressed in easily quotable form by Drew Middleton, veteran news analyst writing in the New York Times from Paris.

"Until this week," wrote Middleton, "the United States has been rather chary in its attitude toward the President. . . . The change in attitude . . . is a result on their part that Mr. Johnson acted in a certain hour and that the President of the United States should act. He was firm, they say, but he was calm."

"Naturally," Middleton continued, "there remain those who believe that the United States has not done enough in the Gulf of Tonkin and that the Seventh Fleet, thousands of miles from its bases, cannot be considered an innocent bystander. . . ."

"The conviction that the President understands the basic rule of power politics—that power, however overwhelming, should never be pushed to the ultimate point—is something Europe has been looking for since last November. They saw this, and rejoiced, in President Kennedy's handling of the Cuba crisis. Now they are looking for a Vietnam strategy similar in vitality to temper strength with restraint."

Those Texas Towers

Those Texas Towers might, we presume, stand for some kind of story of our times. Ten years ago they were an urgent necessity, with the emergency expenditure of \$300,000,000.

The other day the list of the three great towers came crashing down. How much the cost of operating the three towers while they were operating, and how much the cost of wrecking them after they were wrecked, is not clear. \$50,000,000 nobody says.

There is one other thing on the debit side of the ledger. One of those towers was wrecked and toppled down, off New Jersey in January, 1961, and took 28 American lives with it.

An emergency necessity 10 years ago, a traffic canyoneer, now—how does the Texas Tower balance sheet come out?

What was the original necessity for the Texas Towers? It was to set radar out there it could conceivably give the mainland of the United States a few additional moments of early warning if an airplane started crossing the Atlantic toward us.

The Texas Towers monitored no incident air attack against us. Nobody, that we know of, has ever launched nuclear bombers at us across the Atlantic. Presumably, the Texas Towers never once got even a taste of the emergency in which they were designed to function.

Conceivably, then, the Texas Towers may have been nothing more, in realistic hindsight, than a very expensive Air Force boondoggle, an illustration of how foolishly we can spend our money.

Yet the premeditated planner can think of the kind of vindication he would like to have history come twisting up and besting him. There is a sure case, or at least open to a free and relaxed kind of evaluation.
