



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

Congress And Court

A finding of the Supreme Court of the United States cannot, of course, be "unconstitutional." But there can be occasions when members of the legislative branch, or people identified with some particular interest, feel that the Supreme Court itself has, in effect, if not in legal fact, crossed the line of constitutionality in its interpretation of the Constitution When enough Americans, or enough

legislators, feel this way about some Supreme Court interpretation of the Constitution, they have an instinct to fight back with whatever methods and tools they can find. They think the judicial branch has stepped over its own proper boundaries and begun writing, instead of interpreting, the Constitution. They think the judicial branch has begun legislating instead of judging. So one of their own instincts is to have the legislative branch start crossing lines in retaliation. If the judiciary has intruded on the legislative, the legislative will push the judiciary back into its own

This is what has now come into view, in extreme form, in Washington, in the Tuck bill in the House of Representatives. This would be an outright attempt to nullify, by simple statute act of the legislative branch, the findings, rulings and orders of the Supreme Court in the matter of reapportionment of state leg-

This bill, if it got anywhere, would be a direct assault on the position of the judicial branch, and would produce such a direct confrontation between the two branches of government as to set up a national crisis, in which some state auhorities or parties might choose to follow the courts, some to follow the legis-

The Dirksen amendment in the Senate it Washington is a somewhat more civilized measure, in that it does not pose any outright challenge to the authority nd rulings of the courts, but merely seks some delay in implementation of ndividual state reapportionment rulings time tables. There are two reasons or wanting such delay. One is the feelg in some states that there ought to a reasonable amount of time to accomplish such an important and compli-cated task. The other is the feeling that he people and states of the country ought to have a chance to consider and idopt, if they so choose, a formal mendment to the federal Constitution which would permit the survival of systems of unit representation in one of the two houses of any bicameral state legislature. The first purpose is entirely legitimate. And the second purpose, that of providing time for the consideration of a Constitutional amendment before the Supreme Court has fastened its "one man one vote" rule forever on both houses of all state legislatures, can also

Even the Dirksen amendment is regrettable strategy, from the legislative side of things. But it can be forgiven just as the federal court system might be forgiven for its possible encroachments if it could become established that the American people were going to be allowed time to make their own grass roots decision on whether or not they want to throw out traditions and institutions which have always been part of the story of self government on this continent.
