10-Cent Parking For 2,000 Cars

HARTFORD (AP) - A million-dollar proposal to Hartford was made today by Louis Morganstern. head of Resolute Insurance Company.

The proposal, presented to a group of business and city officials at a luncheon today at the Greater Hartford Chamber of Commerce, is for a 5.8-acre tract of land in the Windsor St. Redevelopment area on the northeast corner of Main and Morgan Sts.

It would provide parking an estimated 1,000 feet from downtown department stores at prices less than half the general cost of downtown garages.

Most garages now charge 35
cents an hour for the first hour, and 10 cents each additional half-hour.

Mr. Morganstern proposes offering parking at 10 cents an hour for transient customers, and five cents an hour for allday employe parking.

"Such a parking facility," Mr. Morganstern said, "will assure the economic vitality of downtown Hartford for decades to come.

The Hartford financier, whose Capitol Motors headquarters is Capitol Motors headquarters is on Main St. near the proposed parking site, stressed that he does not consider his parking plan a money-making venture.

"I would be most pleased, and perhaps a little surprised, if such a project would return six per cent simple interest on my investment," he said.

Perhaps the one thing Americans have voluntarily admired most about Soelet Russia has been Russia's eager adoption of an historic American view about public education.

As we Americans did almost from the moment we landed on these shores, Russians began their new existence after heir Revolution with a tremendous zeal for education. It is the one thing we two nations have worshipped in common. Both of us have believed that the more of it we could have for the more people, the better it would be.

As soon as it felt able to do so, from the point of view of teachers and faciliies, Russia, back in 1931, made seven years of schooling compulsory for all tussian children.

Russia finally, in 1962, took another step forward, according to the ideals seld by both our nations, when it made eight years of education compulsory, from the age 7 to age 15. That moved Russia another year

ard its announced long-term goal, which it hoped to realize by 1970. That would have been to have 11 years of ducation, both primary and secondary,

toward less or more education. Our current situation here in this country is that we don't know what to do with our young people when they get out of school, wherefore we are doing everything we can to keep them longer in school. One basic reason we are driving for more education is that we have

Russia, on the other hand, loves and admires education as much as either of us ever did, but its crying need is for people to fill its jobs. It has to be for less ducation, then, for the basic reason that it has more jobs than it can fill at the present rate of school graduation. Another way to put this difference between Russia and ourselves is to define the economic situation which it re-

Russia, quite obviously, has the blessing of full employment, something we no longer achieve for ourselves.

But the United States, on the other hand, has that great promised good goal which supposedly supplants and succeeds full employment as a blessing -the beginning of a great tide of leisure time for us all. Russia hasn't got men and time

enough to make all the things it needs to make.

Sometimes it must seem, to many of us, that it would be a wonderful thing if we could go back to the stage where Russia is now, when we would all have to work all the time we could in order to produce the things we all want to

It would be a lot easier than trying to face forward to solve the problem of living with the leisure time we have now created for ourselves in this country. Obviously not even we can keep expanding the number of years we go to school in order to keep ourselves from going to work. Bight years of primary, four years of secondary, four years of college and three of graduate school would seem to be a sort of maximum.
