Progress Partly to Blame For Tokyo Water Shortage F YOU HAVE BEEN ADVISED TO EXERCISE JOINTS WITH ARTHRITIS, CAN YOU OVERDO THE EXERCISING

EDITOR's NOTE — Most pecopies, splashing in the shower or quenching their thirst at a fountain, take their water supply for granted. It's a different story in three of the world's major cities, with a total population of 16½ million. Tokyo is on the brink of aridity; Rome is in short supply; Hong Kong still is in trouble though conditions have improved. Here are reports from AP correspondents.

TOKYO (AP) — Tokyo is rationing water, and officials say progress is partly to blame for the worst shortage in history.

"We've got too many air conditioners, washing machines, flush tollets and, of course, the world's largest population," said one official. "And they're





tion of himself to his new High Commissionership, the official in question made a public promise that he intended to give the people over whom he was about to begin his rule more to say about their own affairs than had been permitted them in the past. He also promised that, beyond consult-

ing the people themselves, he would also consult with the government of the nation which had previously held sovereignty over them and which was still maintaining its claim to such sovereign-

What the new High Commissioner was attempting to deal with in such inaugural promises of kind and lenient treatment for his subjects was illustrated by the fact that 11 of the 18 members of the territory's legislature had just decided to organize themselves into a new political party dedicated to defiance of complete rule by the new High

Commissioner and his nation. Worse than that, the top political leader of the people of the territory had just recently resigned his office, refusing to serve as part of what he considered a puppet government, subservient to the High Commissioner's nation. So the new High Commissioner, reaching his new office, made what pleasant

promises and assurances he could. But one thing he did not do. He did not promise that his nation would take its soldiers and guns and tanks and planes and ships away from the territory. He said no word which the people of his territory could regard as a promiss of their own real freedom. The new

High Commissioner is supposed to create a gentler impression than the other general who was his predecessor. But his main task is still to hold the territory involved fast, for the nation which took it away from its previous owners.

All this would seem to make a fairly routine story for our times. The spectacle of the big power holding subject some territory outside its own borders, pretending to honor its own individuality, but never getting willing to let the territory go, and alternating severity and leniency in its administration of the territory-all this is familiar spectacle.

This particular story becomes mildly disturbing, true, when we realize that it is a story in which the big nation is the United States, and the territory Okinawa and the Ryukyu Islands, for whom our new High Commissioner is Lieut. Gen. Albert H. Watson, Jr., who is entitled to promise the Okinawans almost anything except that we will get out and let them go back to the Japanese nation to which they think they belong. It is mildly disturbing when we realze that we, rather than somebody else, are the big nation in this particular story. But we soon recover our equilibrium and our philosophy. When we do something like this, it is different, because we are better than others, and do things like this for better reasons. Things are hardly ever the same, when we do them.

Who Pays The Scientists?

It would certainly have made news if the Council for Tobacco Research had reported the other day that the scientists it had employed for the past 10 years to study the possible connection between cigarette smoking and health had come up with proof that such a connection was definite.

The Tobacco Council is in business to further the interests of its industry. It is interested in proving that it is safe and healthy to smoke. One presumes that when it hires scientists to study the problem, it has some inclination to hope they come up with favorable find-

But one could not say much more than that. One could not say that either had proved its own case so conclusively there is no longer any need for study and analysis to continue.

unity. Both President Eisenhower and Vice-President Nixon had urged the GOP candidate to clarify his views, and this has now been done. But Goldwater has still made his point in the South. There, and amongst John Birch Society nembers, it is known where the senator's heart lies. This is all typical Goldwaterism. First he had his doubts about Social Security, then he said it should voluntary, finally he said it was a great help. On the UN, he said we should leave it, then he said we should leave under certain conditions, now he maintains we should strengthen it.

On the record, "Goldwater is moving toward the central road of American beliefs, but he is also making sure that ne is recorded on a number of sides of number of extremely important issues. This is not a return to the old virtues of America, it is an adoption of the slickes Madison Avenue techniques that abound anywhere.—MIDDLETOWN PRESS.

HYPERTENSION IN FAMILY? KEEP SALT INTAKE LOW By WAYNE G. BRANDSTADT

Newspaper Enterprise Assn. Just as you may toss salt over your shoulder for luck, you should pass up the salt An adult should get about one gram of salt a day, but most of us eat nearer 10 grams a an excess of salt causes high blood pressure. Recent studies now appear to suppor this idea. Eskimos of Alaska get less

than three grams a day and show no tendency to high blood pressure but in Japan where the salt intake is higher even than in the United States (about 26 grams a day) the incidence of hypertension is about four times as great as it is here. A curtailment of salt intake is now believed to be even more important than a cutting down of calories because weight reduction without salt restriction will not lower the blood pres sure. There is apparently a hereditary factor at work also because some persons who regularly take in large amounts o salt do not develop high blood

Pressure.
The moral of this story is that, in a family in which several members have developed hypertension, the salt intak should be limited to the body's minimal needs in childhood. Waiting until your child comes of age before restricting his salt intake is likely to prove futile because it is applied too late. Q—Our 6-year-old daughter recently had a boil. What causes boils? Can we do anything to prevent a recur

rence? Q-Boils are caused by the common infection germ, the staphylococcus. The best prevention is frequent washing of the hands by all members o the family with a soap that contains hexachlorophene. This is especially important after touching the nose or going to the toilet. It is also wise to scrub toilet teats, washbowls, and bathtubs frequently with this same antiseptic soap. Changing the underwear daily also helps. spite of these precautions, your doctor may want to use one o he newer antibiotics such a
