





An Unspeakable Division

Talk of either putting the civil rights issue into this fall's campaigning or keeping it out is ridiculous. The issue is going to be in the campaign, more openly in some sections of the nation than in others, but in the campaign to some extent almost everywhere.

Whether the appearance of the issue is veiled or open, whispered or shouted, a potentially very tragic political division on the issue seems likely to take This division threatens to label the

Republican party-imagine such a thing for the party which first arose as the foe of slavery-as the enemy of civil rights, and the Democratic party-imagine such an angelic role for a party which includes the hitherto entrenched political machines of the Deep South—as the champion of civil rights. This has been hailed, by some, as the

presidential campaign of the clear choice, not an echo. What a tragedy it will be, however, it the parties drift so far apart on the civil rights issue they ever seem to offor the voters of this country a clear

Even while we say that would be a horrible tragedy, signs multiply that it is developing, not merely in the party conventions and their handling of civil rights planks, and not merely in any sandidates to the civil rights cause, but at the precinct or grass roots level of American life, where people and parties gravitate in one direction or another in response to their own elemental in-

choice on that issue!

. The question of "backlash," of possible reaction to what some people consider the big city street excesses of the civil rights movement, is one of these questions likely to produce a reaction in which emotion, instinct, and intellect are all mixed in mysterious proportions so that even the individual himself may not know how he is finally going to feel or vote about it.

In California, and perhaps in other states, there is going to be a wicked division at the polls this fall on the socalled open housing issue. California now has a law, passed in the legislature last year, which forbids discrimination on religious or racial grounds in the rental or sale of housing. There is now before the voters of California a proposed amendment to the state constitution which would circumvent and negate the fair housing law by establishing the clear right of any property owner to refuse to sell or rent his own property as he himself might please, without answering to anybody.

This amendment poses, from one side, as the fair housing law poses from the other, the basic question of whether an American can any longer be master of his own house, or must surrender some great portion of his private property right to somebody's idea of a more important social good.

This is the kind of thing people fight over, and the kind of issue on which It is very difficult for head and heart to educate each other into agreeing with one another.

It is sad enough to have California voting on such an issue. What is sadder still is the fact that there appears to be developing a ghastly party division on the issue, which is pushing the label of anti-fair housing toward the Republican party, which finds itself unable to do anything to refuse the label and shove it away, and which is leaving the label of pro-fair housing to the Demograts, who cleave to it as if no Demoerat ever experienced a moment in which the right of private property seemed one of the most precious of all Ameri-

can rights. This open fight in California, which may play its part in the outcome of the presidential election, or which may make a mockery out of any result of the presidential election by declaring that the great free state of California has redrawn color lines once blotted out, may be paralleled in Illinois, where Real Estate Boards have now presented a petition for referendum on the open housing question.

And if, on the other hand, you have the rare experience of coming to the Center and finding everything in order for your smooth passage under the green arrow to the right, don't be so overcome by your good fortune that you forget to be willing to be the chicken when somebody else with a good green light comes

zooming straight at you. Some day the genius who designed all this will try to go through it, and that will serve him right.
