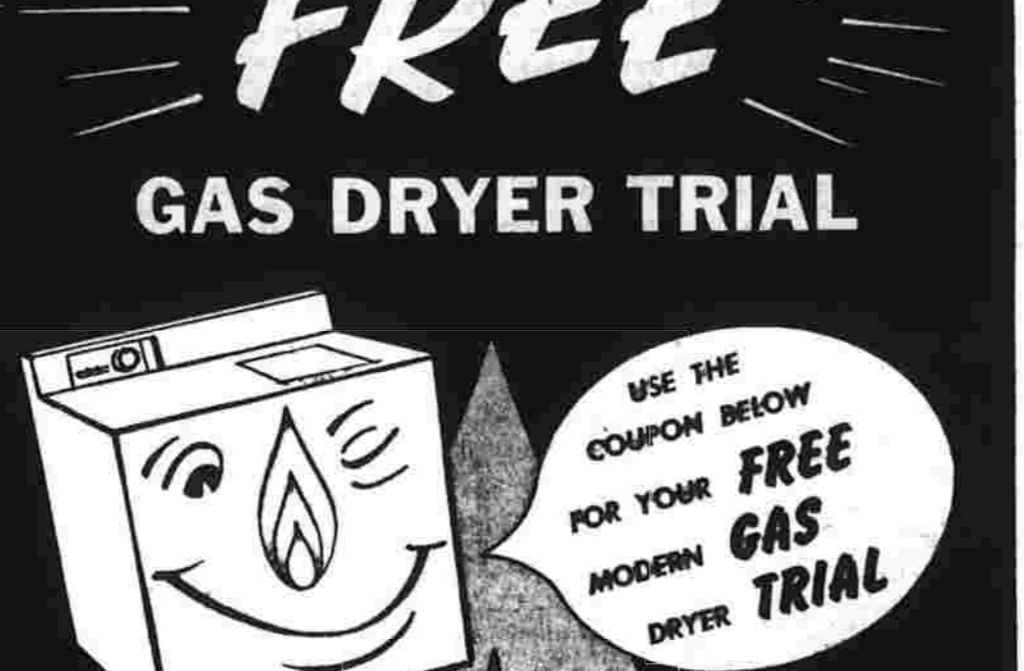

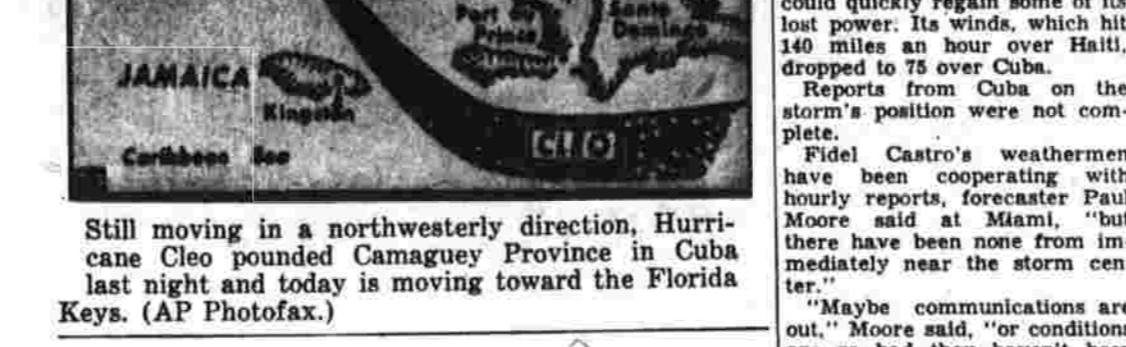

Stalin Pact Ushered In Second War

Twenty-five years ago two world foreign ministers signed a nonaggression pact and raised the curtain on World War II. Exactly 25 years before that, the guns of August 1914 had heralded World War I, bloodiest conflict in history. Today, 25 years after the pact, the world apprehensively eyes little wars and perilous crises which could signal World War III.

While Joseph Stalin, in his plain tunic, favored the 1939 scene with an inextinguishable smile, the bristly confident Nazi foreign minister Joachim von Ribbentrop, and the efficient and unimaginative Soviet foreign minister Vyacheslav Molotov, signed a 10-year treaty which permitted them to carve up Poland and agree on spheres of influence.

Neither party had any illusions about the other. Both were coldly cynical.

Hitler's Germany, by entering the agreement it would break in less than two years, sought to protect its eastern flank as it entered into war with Western Europe.

Stalin bought time and the eastern third of Poland as a buffer. A vast blood purge had just ended in the Soviet Union. About 20,000 Soviet military officers were in prisons. Thousands more had been shot. Soviet army morale was low, no condition to stand up to the disciplined savagery of the Nazi legions. But Stalin probably had other reasons. Apparently he had nursed the hope that he could look on while Europe laid itself waste and readied itself for a Communist takeover.

The pact signaled World War II, but didn't cause it. The war would have come anyway. Europe long had been on the verge of catastrophe.

Technically the U.S.S.R. had been neutral. The Communists had been denouncing both Germany and the Western Allies.

The nonaggression pact burst with stunning impact on a cringing Western Europe, and spread wild confusion among the world's Communists, unready for the weird spectacle of a wedding for forces believed to have been implacably hostile to one another. Communism was Hitler's chief whipping boy, and nationalism and fascism were Stalin's favorite targets.

But extremes tend to meet. The two were closer than many had imagined. Each system was distorted form of socialism. Each considered Western democracy the arch-enemy. The Soviet Union needed German goods and the Germans wanted Soviet raw materials. They saw to this with a trade pact signed in advance of the nonaggression treaty.

Recovering from their initial shock, obedient Communists abroad performed a neat about-face. No longer denouncing Hitler, Communists in the United States pushed a no-war, no-intervention line, with the slogan: "The Yanks are not coming."

At 8 a.m., the Nazi war machines mounded its fateful first offensive into Poland.

The Russians moved, too. Stalin was intent upon sharing the spoils. The Soviet Union annexed the eastern third of Poland, while the Germans quickly reduced the western two-thirds. Once again, bleeding Poland was partitioned.

The pact left the Russians free to annex the Baltic states—Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia. It also provided Stalin with security while attacked Finland on the pretext that the Finns were planning to attack the U.S.S.R. Stubborn Finnish resistance to invasion humiliated the Red army.

The pact and the invasion of Finland cost the Communist world movement heavily. In Western Europe and the United States, people who called themselves Communists and people who sympathized with the party's professed goals left it in droves.

The quick collapse of France before the Nazi juggernaut was a rude shock to Stalin. He had wanted the Western war to last a long time while he got ready. He jockeyed with Germany for advantage in the Balkans.

Hitler gave him only until June 1st before he invaded the Soviet Union.

Only then did communism abroad begin to recoup some of its losses. The hard core of the party, schooled in cynicism, got a line that would be more popular.

Demonstrations against U.S. intervention on the Allied side stopped abruptly. The war suddenly had become a "just war." The slogan "The Yanks are not coming" was buried. The Communists now hoped the Yanks were coming.

Communists in the United States and the West appeared as superpatriots until the war was over. Then the line changed again, as the cold war began.

The Soviet Union had lost millions in dead and crippled, cities were devastated, industries wrecked. Millions were homeless. But propaganda was revived for world revolution, and the U.S.S.R. had of the Eastern Europe in an iron grip.

Perhaps, from Stalin's viewpoint, the Nazi-Soviet pact paid off.

Peking Bests Russians in Asia Moves

The Red Chinese have won an important round against the balked and frustrated Soviet Communists in a battle over who calls the shots among Communists of Asia and Africa.

Moscow virtually has thrown in the towel after a long struggle to force its way into the Communist-backed Asian-African solidarity organization.

The outcome has important meaning for Asia. Peking has enjoyed considerable success in keeping the door to Asian communism closed to the Soviet Union. This means the Russians have little influence, for example, on what takes place in a powderkeg situation such as the Middle East.

The Kremlin, with little choice, had to bow out as gracefully as possible. To insist upon being recognized as an Asian nation and then be voted down by a Red Chinese majority would have been painful.

The fight concerned who would participate in a conference planned by the organization for next March. The first such conference was held at Bandung, Indonesia, in 1955, and the Russians attended.

Moscow says the Chinese opposed the Russians on racial grounds and even pictured the U.S.S.R. as it were in the same category as "colonial powers with possessions in Asia and Africa." That stung badly.

"Trying to make the best of it," Moscow sent messages to Asian and African governments, saying "the Soviet Union cannot ignore the question of its invitation to be embarrassing for Afro-Asian countries, and especially its use by anyone for sowing discord among them."

The message said Moscow didn't take the initiative in raising the Soviet case to the attendance in the first place. Perhaps it didn't, but the Kremlin obviously wanted an invitation, and complained the Red Chinese blocked it by "a dishonest game."

This battle has raged a long time. The Soviets dating it to 1953 and what they call "the tragic conflict on the frontiers" between Red China and India, and Red China's "narrow nationalism."

Early in 1963 at Moscow, Tanganyika, the Chinese, apparently with unlimited money at their disposal, tried to seize control of an Asian-African meeting and had a fierce clash with the Russians. It seemed pretty much a foregone conclusion that the Russians tried to ram through an approval of their partial nuclear test ban treaty. They were defeated in a meeting of the solidarity organization at Nicosia, Cyprus.

In April, the group held another preliminary meeting in Indonesia. Soviet participation was proposed. Russian-Minister Chen Yi engineered the burial of that proposal, but the Russians were furious. They took their case directly to Asian and African governments with special messages.

They have just done this again in what appears an attempt to go over the heads of delegations whose Communist members seem to be in the hands of the Chinese.

"It is obvious that if some forces, proceeding from their national goals, do not want the Soviet Union to attend the conference, the Soviet message must be rejected," this harsh, the national liberation movement.

Evidently Red China, North Korea, North Viet Nam, the Japanese Communists and others ganged up on the Russians. If Moscow were invited, they would refuse to attend the meeting, and there would be no solidarity meeting.

The Russians lost, and they know it.

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Building demonstration of democracy
building itself this hemisphere has been
privileged to watch in our troubled century.

talents of his successors perhaps fail to
keep his people as united and purposeful
as they have been in the past 16
years, there may come the cry, there
may appear to be the urgent necessity,
for some emergency man to step in.
Munnos himself, to authority and responsibility
and power.

Should that emergency cry arise, and
Mr. Munnos still manage to say, to say no, he
would indeed be setting a precedent. One
would spare him that test and hope his
teaching and example have worked well
enough to build in his people their own
strength.

Skill Mortal
Anybody who was expecting, or perhaps
even hoping, that the Democrats, when
they got to their national convention
business, would appear in such a
democratic robes of pure reason and apolitical
tactic that they would simplify the
choices of voters this November have
already, of course, been disappointed.

Another Lively Ball?
We are grateful to Gardner Mulloy, that
durable veteran of the national tennis
circuit, for at least a partial explanation
of our declining fortunes on the courts.

off in all directions. The ball was a lot
softer and easier to handle when I was
starting out. . . . The server today is
too much on an advantage. If he removed
the air pressure and thickened the
cover, the player with the better
all-around game would have a better
chance."

It so happens that Senator John
Forsythe, of our neighboring state of Rhode

one of the best keynote speeches on
record, it was probably one of the worst.

In his preliminary procedures, then,

Martin Weighs Issue Of Rec Bookkeeping

General Manager Richard Martin wound up a review of Recreation Department James Herdic's performance yesterday afternoon pronouncing "to try to come up with a decision (about the department's management) shortly."

Martin said during a nine-minute session early in the afternoon that he could no longer have confidence in the procurement or personnel practices followed in the Recreation Department in the light of the fact that "you (Herdic) went quite a long time paying very little attention to the rules, even after getting reminders from the controller."

"Nobody questions your competence in recreation matters," Martin said, "but almost everyone — including me — questions your competence in this part of the job."

The afternoon session was a wrap-up to what was called a two-hour lunch break.

The sessions are the upshot of a series of events going back to 1963, when the town's auditors began to prepare the 1963-64 town audit. In the process of gathering the accounting data, auditor Robert Macri double checked the Recreation Department after directors Frank Blawie and Atty. Richard Woodhouse complained to General Manager Martin of reported irregularities there.

When the annual audit is turned over to the town — and to the State Tax Commissioner's office — in November, it raised so many questions about the Rec's pay practice that Herdic had promised them they would not be going as planned.

Finally, Martin announced last week that he and Herdic would meet for two days — to determine how well proper procurement and personnel practices are being followed. The sessions began yesterday morning, then resumed for lunch at noon.

When Martin and Herdic returned about 2:05 they were accompanied by Controller Joseph Clementino and Assistant Controller Thomas Moore, who also attended the morning session. Also in the Municipal Building hearing room was Robert Macri of the town auditor's office.

Martin, speaking so softly that it barely could be heard over the noise of the air conditioner, opened the session.

After some introductory remarks, he said to Herdic, "It seems clear to me that you went quite a long time paying very little attention to the (personnel and procurement) rules, even after reminders from the controller's office."

"Regarding your technical ability, I don't see how anyone who is responsible for the (town) departments can have (any) more confidence in what is going on in the Recreation Department."

Recalling a recent strike threat by town fireguards — who were asking for a set weekly wage instead of their official salary — Martin said: "If the proper (personnel) forms had been filled out when they (the fireguards) were hired, there wouldn't have been a problem at all."

The Recreation Department's difficulties "keep going on," Martin said. "At the moment, I have no certainty that something won't crop up again, in some other Recreation Department."

"You have told the state tax commissioner that all the recommendations (in the special audit of the Recreation Department) were carried out; I can't be sure they have been."

"Nobody questions your competence in recreation matters," including me — questions your competence in this part of the job (personal and procurement accounting) to get this part of your job sprung up. I've tried to give you a leg up on this decision shortly."

"If you had some suggestions," he said to Herdic, "go ahead."

Herdic replied, "I think you're right in what you try to do something right and make more errors than before. I've learned a lot since the audit; before I couldn't see the forest for the trees. Now I understand seasonal where my fault lies."

There was a short silence.

"Where did you get that? That's it and I guess we'll adjourn, and I'll let you know what I decide."

Idle Claims Dip By 13 in Week

Unemployment compensation claims filed in Manchester last week dropped by 13 or one and a half per cent below the claims for the week ending Aug. 15.

A total of 860 checks were issued locally last week, compared to 883 for the previous week.

Claims in all of Connecticut rose by 524 to a total of 51,482. During the corresponding period last year, statewide claims had totaled \$3,187.

The Hartford office ranked first last week with 4,843 claims filed, followed by Bridgeport with 4,241, New Haven with 3,678, and Waterbury with 3,152.

The Manchester office was in the 14th spot among the state's 20 offices. The week before it had been twelfth.
