"The best than can immediately be hoped for in Vietnam," solemnly suggests the Christian Science Monitor, "is that the situation there can be contained until after the presidential election in the United States."

This is indeed a thoughtful suggestion, and we hope it commends itself to the students, to the general, and to the Communist guerrillas over in South Vietnam.

But we are not too sanguine about the courtesies the normalities of the American political process can expect from people abroad.

We can remember that Britain and France, our best friends, had President Eisenhower the hot potato of the Suez crisis just a few days before we gave American voters something to think about on their way to the polls in 1950. After that, we can remember that the Russians were rude enough to shoot down an American spy plane just before the political conventions of 1960. And, for that matter, the students in Saigon didn't seem very anxious to cooperate with the fact that the administration in Washington wanted a week off in order to hold a political convention at Atlantic City.

A Real Toughie

While everybody, including Senator Goldwater himself, seems urgently concerned over the possibility of rather explosive interchange of ideas and principles between Goldwater and some of the more dangerous elements surviving in German national life, along comes a French general who makes everybody else look relatively tame.

...Mr. Dulles later came to indulge himself in all kinds of uncertainties. General Allieret, at the moment, has only two, only one of which he conceals. The French general concedes it might be something of a delicate problem, de facto, but he would like to see a Russian movement could be judged adequate provocation for the nuclear blast on Moscow.

The other uncertainty is one no French general could ever be expected to admit, or any secretary of state, or even any commentator, for that matter. It is the uncertainty over whether Russia really wants, or has ever really wanted, to launch an attack on Western Europe. The presumption has always been, in every quarter, by every analysis, that of course Russia has been dying to attack Western Europe, so much so that only the atomic bomb has stopped her. Just about everything everybody does or thinks is based on the assumption that Russia would attack if Russia could, and our whole Western scheme of life and thought would collapse if we ever seriously entertained any thought to the contrary.

As for the French general, says, it is probably going to be impossible to halt the first phase of the Russian attack by meeting it out in the field. The way to fight this kind of war, in the way colleges is thus and so. As for the colleges on both sides have fought the thing out for people enough times, all the generals and secretaries of state and the commentators got the real thing, which turns out not like the stuff studies at all, but something strangely different.

Leading The Pave-Solid Race

Last year the voters of New Jersey, in one of the great common sense decisions registered by people at polls in our time, rejected the sugar daddy proposition recommended by Governor Richard Hughes. That was a proposition to keep tolls on the New Jersey Turnpike indefinitely in order to finance routine expenses of the state government.

Most amusingly, the voters of New Jersey turned down this supposedly free proposition. So doing, they indicated some belief that tolls ought to be used only for the road or bridge projects they themselves finance, and not be perpetuated beyond that. The Republican party, and an encouraging number of elements in the state life all helped defeat the Hughes proposal.

That was that, but now Governor Hughes has rebounded, proving that if he can't perpetuate the tolls one way, he can do it another. He has now announced that 20 miles of the New Jersey Turnpike including the section between the Lincoln Tunnel Interchange will be widened from six to 12 lanes at an estimated cost of \$340,000,000.

Reading Between The Lines

Past political campaigns have honed a fine edge on the American voter's ability to read between the lines, but this ancient art remains unreliable at best. The current arguments about defense policy epitomize the problem.

When Senator Goldwater charges that our nuclear retaliatory capacity may drop 90% in the next decade, he seems to imply that the Administration is showing a callous disregard for national defense. The typical voter isn't about to believe that, but he has to pore between the lines to see what worries the Senator is the lack of plans for new manned bombers in particular.

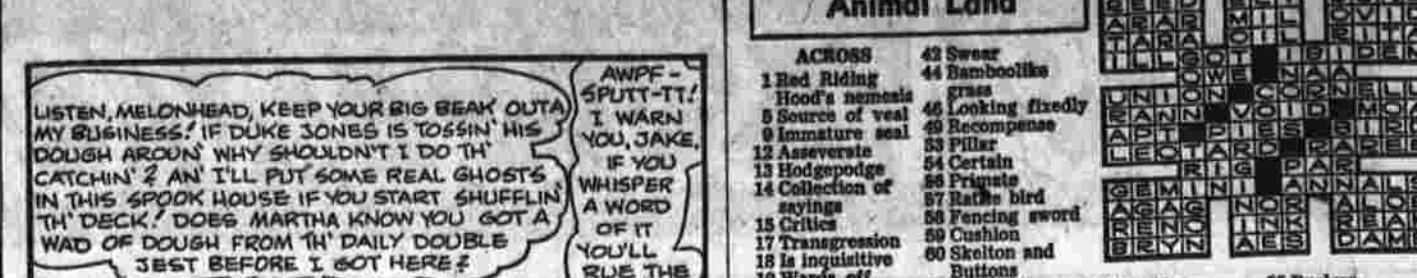

JFK Terms Followed in Book Series

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — One new television series will start its season well after the rest of the pack. "Profiles in Courage" will not debut until Nov. 5, because that's the way the late President John F. Kennedy wanted it.

After Kennedy's election to the presidency, many producers sought his best-selling book about moral courage in American politics as basis for a series. But not until Robert Sautdek made an inquiry did Kennedy begin serious consideration. He had made two appearances as a senator on Sautdek's "Omnibus."

Kennedy established stringent terms for the series — approval of script, final film, casting, director, even the press releases. And to avoid any political repercussions, the series was not to go on the air until after the 1964 elections.

Sautdek and NBC have continued to follow Kennedy's instructions since his death. All details of the hour films are cleared with the estate. The scripts are reviewed by former Kennedy aide Theodore C. Sorenson, who will receive screen credit.

"Bob Kennedy has seen two of the finished films," reports Michael Ritchie, associate producer Gordon Oliver. "Ted Kennedy has seen four or five of them, and both are ecstatic over the results."

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Elizabeth Taylor did it for London, Grace Kelly for Monaco, and Sophia Loren will be giving television viewers a tour of Rome Nov. 13.

Now Inger Stevens is joining the lovely traveloguers. She'll show Americans her native Sweden.

The blonde star of "Farmer's Daughter" will take off Sept. 1 for three weeks of shooting in Sweden. The special will appear on ABC Jan. 23.

"My aim is not just a travelogue showing the pretty sights of Sweden," she said. "We'll have some scenery, either permitting. But most of all I would like to feel the pulse of the country. I want to talk with people from all walks of life, to show how they live and what they are thinking about.

"We'll have some famous names, too. I expect to take a stroll with the king; he was kind enough to participate, since this is the kind of project that would do Sweden good.

"Birgit Nilsson will take me on a tour of the Opera House. Max von Sydow will be taking me to the theater where he will be rehearsing 'After the Fall.' And I was also lucky that Ingmar Bergman has agreed to an interview; this is the first time he has done anything on television."

She also has lined up Ingemar Johansson for a chat. That's a potent combination: Inger, Ingmar and Johansson.

The actress has a mother and six brothers and sisters in Sweden and is looking forward to her first trip home in four years. She left Sweden when she was 13 and says the Thomas Wolfe title holds true: "You Can't Go Home Again."

"Some of my happiest memories are of my Swedish childhood — skiing through forests, picking mushrooms in fields, climbing green hills," said Inger. "But when I went home four years ago, I found everything had changed. The forests had been sawed down, and housing developments stood where I had wandered through fields.

"It's the same in Sweden as it is in this country: Nature is being pushed back further and further by man. It is progress, I guess."
