Let these judges realize, one implores, the depth of the roots to the past they are seeking to cut; let them pushise some of the endless refinements and important subsidiary considerations which must be involved in any attempt to install and operate a new order, even when it is done from the bench; let the judges try to avoid any greater travesties on the ideas of political justice and dair representation than have ever been involved in the imperfections of the past.

What a monstrous thing it would be, for instance, if the federal judges should now order a state at large election of all members of both House and Senate. and thus decree that the next General Assumbly would most probably have to consist of 294 representatives and 36 sonators all of one party, all Democrats If that party should happen to carry the state on Nov. 3, all Republicans if that party should carry the state.

One of the trite assnirances the free wrid occasionally gives finelf-that the Communists never have won a free election-is not strictly true. They have won many free local elections in Italy and in France; they might win free elections # ome nations if free elections were ever sold there.

But a Communist victory in Chile would have been a major development comparable, in this hemisphere, to such a thing as the Communists of Italy coming out first in some national election

What has happened, instead, is t ictory of a man who, in his character and in his associations, is being classified as a "reformer of the democratic left," something like President Betan-court in Venesuela and the newly elected President Terry of Pers.

We suspect that it was a part of the andslide nature of President-elect' Frei's victory in Chile that the United States for all its diplomatic and hemisphere policy encorn with this election, had brains enough to keep its anxiety and its wishes and its voting advice to the Chilean people somewhat restrained and muted until the votes were in and n harm could be done.

Political Allies

The reversal this year of nature political alignments is illustrated in a reverse way in the Arkanses guberna torial race where the decision over whether Barry Goldwater is an asset or liability seems to be a key in campaign stratery.

There Republican candidate Winthrop Rockefeller has embraced Goldwater, thus reducing the possibility that Democratic Governor Orval Faubus might do

Faubus, whose appeal is chiefly to the ardent segregationists, is understandably reluctant to endorse President Johnson. If he does so, the alignments will be along party lines, but will apparently run counter to the sentiments of most of the voters.

Supporters of Faubus are generally the same voters who would support ers of Rockefeller, a moderate in race matters, seem to be the ones who would support President Johnson.

In stealing the Faubus thunder, Rockefeller has robbed him of an ally, but he has taken on what may also proys to be a political burden.

line embraces Goldwater too ardentiy when the presidential candidate makes visit to the state at Rockefeller's invitation, he may allenate some of his own supporters. Negroes, for instance, who may generally vote for Johnson in any case, may not bother to split their votes for Rockefeller if they see a close tie between him and the top Republican standard bearer.

Thus we have the prospect of the candidates presenting themselves to the voters in Goldwater-Rockefeller and Johnson-Faubus teams and the voters going to the polls divided into Goldwater-Faubus and Johnson-Rockefeller camps.

Those Discarded Beer Cans

Many of them have no objection to littering the highways and the byways with whatsver they don't want. Apart from the assthetic consideration, there is the very practical matter of the many thousands of dollars that are spent by towns and cities and states to clear up roadsides, pionic areas, and other spots where the public gathers and debris ac-cumulates umulates.

Rubbish of any kind is had enough. Rubbian of any and is bad enough, but heer cans are the worst. They are long lasting; they don't dissolve in the rain or blow away in the wind. They stay where they are tossed, unsightly by day, headlight-catching at night. What is more, one beer can invites another, and where one is thrown, others are likely to follow.

The brewing industry spends a good deal of money on its containers. It equips deal of money on its containers. It equips them with all sorts of easy opening gad-gets which speed the contents into the unsisked throats with the minimum of effort and implements. But nothing has been done to produce a disposable bottle. It's probably asking too much of the industry to expect it to monitor the con-duct and money of the enterers duct and good manners of its customers, aspecially after they have consumed its products. But as a token of concern, if for no other reason, the beer people might in their ads and on their contain

Things like this happen every day, and in every part of New York City, because finance companies, with no specific laws to slow them down, go after people in debt some time as if they were chasing dogs of the sidewalk.

People borrow money from finance companies because they happen to need it. They are supposed to pay it back in monthly installments. The installments are not cheap. For a loan of \$800, spread over two years, the payments are \$40.27. At the end, the finance company gets back \$966.48, or a profit of \$166.48 on the loan. Mos of the time they have to keep the matter secret because very few men want wives to know they borrow money.
