Action Seen Within Month On Revision

HARTFORD (AP) -Three federal judges pondering Connecticut's legislative reapportionment problems refuse to say how long it will take them to make a decision, but one of them says it may not be as long as a month. The judges have the responsibility of deciding what to do about reapportioning the House and redistricting the Senate now that the ball has been tossed back to them by the General Assembly. The most pressing problem is the election of legislators. J. Joseph Smith, the presiding judge on the three judge panel which ordered the reapportionment, said yesterday there could be no election for the General Assembly Nov. 3 unless it was held at large. it was held at large.

If an election at large was held, Smith said in response to questions by newsmen, it would have to be ordered by the court.

Another alternative, he sald, would be if the present legislature redistricted the Senate and reapportioned the House in line with the federal constitution. There was little chance this would happen in view of the fact that the legislature spent from Aug. 3 to Thursday night in special session and failed to come up with a reapportionment solution.





The right course for responsible politicians is not to deny it, at to handle it with as much dignity as possible. And ultimately the burden falls on the voter to turn a deaf ear to tuperation.

The Latest Virus What might be the most important

bad news of the century was published in the Wall Street Journal the other day, in its description of the arrival of a new virus in our land-a corn virus. Or it may, in the actual event, prove to be an alarm which is conquered before too much real damage is done. But the trouble is that corn is something that feeds a lot of the world, and that a virus is a kind of thing which inhabits a special world all its own, where it may or may not ever be reached by the science of man. Sometimes man suceeeds in a direct attack on a virus; sometimes he is able to find it has some natural enemy he can use; sometimes he can breed immunity to it; but sometimes man, as in the case of the Dutch Elm disease, for instance, or the chestnut blight, has to admit he does not know how to fight.

This new corn virus, when it hits stunts the plant and queers its yield. It has been present in the important cornfields of the big corn belt only since 1962; in this brief period it has demonstrated its capacity to survive cold winters and has demonstrated that it spreads through contagion, certainly through the agency of leaf hopper insects who take it from one plant to another, perhaps merely from the passage of farm machinery from one field to an-

acres. That is a statistic which does not represent important acreage in itself, out which is important as an indica tion of a possible rapidity of spread for the virus. If it keeps on like this, it could go like wildfire in another year or two. And so far there is no check or weapon of any kind that can be used against it; any number of ventures are racing the sun trying to test and breed varieties of corn which might have an immunity. But it may take a number of growing seasons to pursue this kind of experiment; the virus may be follow-
