





Polly's Pointers

DEAR POLLY — Although the Women's Page is supposedly off-limits to us men, I manage to peep in on your column. Each week I discover a few new ideas and that is good enough for me. Recently you wrote about "save the wax" and what you mean is paraffin. That idea is not new to me but I would like to add to the uses of paraffin wax. There is always a piece in my tool room. Last week when cutting off a dead 5-inch limb from a tree, I had to go back and get the paraffin to rub the saw blade, for that makes such a job much easier. I also use paraffin on all sliding drawers where wood rubs on wood. The tracks of our overhead garage door work with less effort when so rubbed and are protected from rust. Window tracks and slides, weather strips on door — they all work better when waxed. If you have no paraffin, use a candie. — M.B.

It is always good to have you clever men around.—POLLY DEAR POLLY — The women who sew may be interested in the way I hem sheer nylon. I use a raveling of the material and draw it carefully over a cake of wax to make it easier to manage. This way there is no trouble in hiding the stitches. Hope this helps someone else as it has helped me.—MABEL GIRLS—Mabel sent a sample of hemming done this way and the stitching was practically invisible. My personal thanks to her for an idea that I know is going to make my hand sewing on nylon much neater.—POLLY

DEAR POLLY—When I want to find out if a fabric is color-fast, I sew a piece of it on a piece of white cloth and for the testing place this in a glass of water and let it stand overnight. The fabric is colorfast if the water is not colored and the white cloth is not stained. — E. A. R.

#### Khrushchev And Erhard

The concerted, almost single-minded frive Premier Khrushchev has been making, toward what would seem to be the classic military and political tactic of securing his Western flank while he makes ready to confront the Chinese Communist challenge to the East, has now crystallized into a proposition that the Russian leader should visit Dr. Laidwig Erhard, chancellor of West Germany, early in the new year.

Just this prospect makes the world's political seismographs tremble and jump. It reminds everybody that Russia and Sermany twice reached private understandings with one another, once after the Russian revolution when defeated Germany and Red Russia defied the Allies and made their own peace, and even more fatefully, although some historians have considered it an inevitable sequel, in 1939, when Hitler and Stalin agreed to fight Poland together instead of fighting each other.

It alarms and enrages Communist China, which regards any kind of peac with the capitalist world as treachery. And likewise, of course, it disturbs at least some of the foreign offices of the West, and particularly that of Washington, to think that, after 20 years of basing our own foreign policy on alliance with Western Germany against Russia, Western Germany and Russia might suddenly go off in a corner by themselves and settle things by themselves. But all this apprehension is caused more by the fact that the policy possi-

bilities are not of our own precise mak-

ing than by what they actually contain. It should be obvious, by this time, that the West have no plans at al for the future of Germany or for the reunification of Germany, or for making s formal peace close the books on World War H or for removing the first and biggest bone which lies between Russia and us in the cold war. We have nothing to give Western Germany except the possible curse of its own atomic force. We souldn't possibly make any great understanding of our own with Russia which left Western Germany in the burch and Eastern Germany in the Rus-

But Russia could, if it wanted something else badly enough—something like omplete stability on its own Western front—sell out that Eastern German satellite, gently and tactfully, of course. Russis can do something we can't possibly do, which is to wave a wand and make possible the reunification of Ger-

This may be the way it is going to sappen, and we ourselves may, long ago, have decreed that this has to be the way it is going to happen. But the main reason why we need

not be too much alarmed by such prospects is that, when and if Russia ever makes its peace with Western Germany, Russia will then be making peace with us too. Certain things-like the reunification of Germany, and the accompanying withdrawal of both East and West military force from their present confrontation in Europe—have to happen before it can be claimed that any kind of peace has succeeded World War II. ## Bolton's New School Pairs Thrift and Taste

The new Bolton Junior-Senior High School opened its doors to about 256 students in Grades 7 through 10 right on schedule, Sept. 10. The class of 1967, now sophomores, will be the first graduating class. The present Grades 11 and 12 will finish their education at Manchester High School, which has, until this year, housed Bolton students in Grades 9 through 12. The school, with an eventual capacity of 570 students, was designed by Architect Arnold Lawrence and built by Jack R. Hunter for \$678,100. An \$800,000 bond issue was floated for the furnished school. was floated for the furnished school.

According to figures from the state department of education it is one of the smallest secondary schools built in the state recently and one of the least ex-A budget of \$43,500 was adopted for fixed equipment, and movable equipment ran above \$40,000.

Administrative offices are to the left of the main entrance. Behind a large general office and waiting room are small offices for the superintendent and the guidance director, as well as the nurse's room. The interior offices are illuminated by "bubbles" in the roof and painted a vivid pale blue.

The three hallways form a "T with one arm lower than the other. Hall floors are white tile, with a tan and green pattern every so often, and the ceilings are white and well-illuminated, giving a general air of lightness along the halls, which are lined with lockers.

The library to the right of the main entrance has a capacity of 50 students. The furniture is dark brown, the table tops light green. The library has allotted \$5,000 to purchase books, mostly references. Each year, it is planned to add \$5,000's worth more under the general operating budget.

The library also contains a small office and a room for the storage of audiovisual equipment.

The gymnasium, with bubble-shaped skylights, is readily accessible from the main entrance. It contains two standard-size basketball courts which can be separated by a movable partition for gym classes.

Collapsible bleachers line the walls, and a small collapsible stage is stored at one end.

Baseball, soccer and field hockey can be played outdoors, with room to spare.

The school has no cafeteria. Milk is sold

The shop is equipped for sheet metal and woodworking equipment. It also has a safety button by which the instructor can stop all machines at once. The home economics room contains cooking and sewing areas and all types of appliances, including a disposal in one sink. A unique feature of the room is a three-way mirror which folds into a wall of

but lunches must be brought from home and are eaten in a double classroom. These rooms will be needed for classes the year after next, according to the superintendent.

Also not being used for its ultimate purpose is the physics-chemistry lab, which is not yet stocked and serves as a purple room.







But at many a state capitol and city hall across the nation the search will be pressed still harder for more kinds of taxes, or hastier rates, or more hand-outs from the federal government, or more borrowing.

Some state and local officials are hoping the federal authorities will release some forms of taxation to them. This would let the local collectors spread into fields now held by Washington. Others are plugging for more aid to states and communities from the federal tax collection which they think will rise considerably if rates aren't cut

siderably if rates aren't cut further.

Both President Johnson and Treasury Secretary Dillon have proposed that next year federal excise taxes be revised and some lowered or dropped. Dillon says, "We have about 75 categories of such taxes on the books today, and their labyrinthine complexity requires, not the randem repeal of a few taxes, but a thorough-going revision based on a comprehensive study of them all, which the Treasury already has well under way."

The President says some excise tax cuts, yet to be spelled out, will be proposed to Congress if he is elected.

The Republican candidate, Barry Goldwater, proposes further cuts in individual and corporate income tax rates. As a goal, he suggests a 25 per cent cut for individuals spread over five years.

Both the President and Dillon talk of possible income tax cuts, but without naming figures or giving flat promises.

Counting in highway counstruction and welfare payments, the U.S. Treasury is paying out more than \$10.5 billion this year to state and local projects.

Congress is considering other projects which will mean still more financial aid for locally based programs. And some Washington officials are now proposing that the federal government increase payments to states, without naming specific projects.
