Except as hereinafter specified, no person shall, within the Town of Bolton, peddle or sell upen the streets, sidewalks, public places or from house to house, or at public or private sale, any goods, wares or merchandise, without first having been duly licensed so to do, by license issued to him by the First Selectman of

Expiration of Licenses. Each license herein provided for shall expire on June 30th of each year.

Exemptions from Licensing Requirements. This ordinance shall not apply to such persons as are by statute laws of the State of Connecticut excepted, or to churches or charitable institutions, or to the marketing of farm products by the farmers of Connecticut raised or produced by them on and from their farms, or to wholesalers selling and delivering their goods to the merchants of Bolton, or to vendors of newspapers, or to goods, wares or merchandise of residents of Bolton sold by the maker or manufacturer thereof.

Applications shall be in writing, and state the name and address of the licenses, the nature of the business for which granted, and the date of its beginning and of its expiration. Such license so issued shall be exhibited for inspection to any person with whom licenses offers to do business and to any proper officer on demand. Any person, firm or corporation operating more than one vehicle for the purpose of so peddling shall be required to secure a license for each vehicle so operated.

The summer was better than usual on many counts. But even the most optimistic forecaster has to take note of some disturbing trends in, the final weeks:

—The auto industry had better than usual sales — but also a labor pact that some fear might spread inflationary fires to other sectors of the economy. And the final days of the quarter were marred by walkouts at General Motors plants and a contract impasse.
