The Same Old Charter Changes

Last May 19, the voters of Manches ter went to the polls in a special election, to decide the fate of 14 questions. One of these questions, by which the voters were asked to authorize \$679,000 for an addition to Robertson School, the voters approved by a vote of three to

voted almost three to one in favor of what is now known as the North End Renewal Project. An affirmative answer to both these

questions represented progress forward

for Manchester. On that same referendum day, the voters of Manchester also rendered their decision on 12 other questions, consisting of proposed amendments t the Town Charter.

Some of these changes were unimportant and harmless, some were beneficial, and some were downright mischievous in their attempt to launch an underhanded assault on the managercouncil form of government as it was established in Manchester by the new 1947 Charter.

All of these proposed Charter changes, the good and the bad, lost en that referendum day.

The reason all the Charter changes lost was that, in the special referendum, not enough people came out to vote for them. The requirement for the adoption of a Charter change in such a special referendum is that at least 15 per cent of the town's voting population must come out and cast affirmative votes for

The easiest way to defeat Charter changes, in such a situation, is not to vote on them at all. So it was that, even when they did get to the polls that day, more than 300 Manchester people voted on the Robertson School and the Urban Renewal questions and still registered no vote on the Charter questions at all. Even with enough people at the polls, the Charter questions could not obtain enough favorable votes

for their passage. In proposing this same list of questions for the voters of Manchester at the town election next Monday, the Democratic majority of the Charter Commission and the Board of Directors is seeking the advantage of different legal requirements for the success of a Charter amendment. At a formal town election such as that being held Monday, a simple vote in favor, no matter by what margin, or no matter what the size of the total vote in favor, is suf-

ficient for enactment. So the voters of Manchester are being asked to handle the same 12 questions again. And this time there is no lasy way to defeat the 12 questions by merely failing to vote on them. This time, if they are defeated, it will have to be because people vote no.

The 12 questions were discussed exbensively last May, but we shall endeavor to recapitulate briefly.

Question 1 proposes to freeze into the Town Charter a perverse interpretation of state election laws which would make It possible for the Manchester Board of Education to lose the minority representation traditionally guaranteed on all boards of education. Why vote at all? If you must vote, make it the first

Question 2 would guarantee that the political party which controls the Board of Directors should be able to have all municipal appointments to boards and commissions under its thumb, so that the community might escape the igmominy of having some non-partisan expert on conservation, for instance, appointed to the Town Conservation Com-

suion. Vote no. Question 3 strikes at the heart of the manager-council form of government by providing for a "mandatory" review of erformance of the manager, a prowision which is not part of any manager-council charter anywhere in the country, and for good reason. Once it and

the following proposed change were adopted, there would be no managercouncil form of government. Vote no. Question 4 facilitates the procedure by which any political majority on the Board of Directors could fire a general manager, eliminating the present reuirement that any such dismissal should be for cause, with privilege of hearing. Vote no.

Question 5 reiterates the effect of Juestion 2, making sure it takes away from the General Manager the power to make Conservation Commission appointments. Vote no.

Question 6, requiring the General Manager to set up a six year capital

improvement program; Question 7 formally establishing a director of public works; Question 8, amending water and sewerage rules and regulations; Question 8, setting up a special planning department, and Question 11, naking it legal to have town bonds issued in \$5,000 denominations instead of the present 9, are all either harmless or eneficial. Vote yes, if you have patience for it, on Questions 6, 7, 8, 9, and 11. Question 10, however, goes back to braxen politics, with a Charter amendment designed to make sure that there should be no silly nonsense about which ever party wins a town election getting its own lawyer appointed town counsel, and Question 12 returns to the general assault on the spirit and letter of the 1947 Town Charter, removing those delagations and divisions of authority and jurisdiction which were intended to see that the Board of Directors remained a legislative body and a policy-making body and did not have its members engaging in trying to pave streets, or taking over personal management of the town's recreational facilities.

After all of these questions had failed of enactment last May, there was a brief period when it appeared possible there might be some non-partisan agreement to submit to the next decision of the electorate only those changes which were non-controversial in nature. The leadership of the Democratic party withdrew from this possibility, however, in favor of one more direct assault on the Manchester Town

these questions, thus leaving the worthy ones to be added to the Charter later on, than run the risk of adoption, next Monday, of the provisions in Questions 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 10 and 12. These provisions would rip up the foundations of the 1947 Town Charter and open the way toward an unabashed spoils system, an unabashed direct rule of town affairs by the town chairman of the victorious political party. We cannot afford to run the risk of doing this to Manchester. This is not charter revision. It is a grab

The main mission of the people of Manchester as they go to the polls in their town election Monday is to fulfill their own political function and privilege, to support the political party of their choice toward that degree of control and dominance over town af fairs which gives the party honor and function and responsibility without putting the taxpayers at the mercy of a political machine.

While the voters of Manchester are making their political choice Monday, they would do themselves a considerable non-political favor if they should, for a second time, politely and firmly refuse to approve the destruction of their Charter.

Drinks For Teen-Agers

The death of an early-morning aut mobile accidnet of a 17-year-old girl after teen-age parties in respectable suburbar homes at which liquor was served has led to a searching of law books in Darien and, we presume, a painful self-examination of adult conscience, A number of arrests have been made, based on a little mown Connecticut state law. The judge who invoked the law, which prohibits the serving of liquor to minors by persons other than their parents, quotes a medical report as saying that the 18-year-old boy also involved in the fatal

problem that is being dealt with here. It becomes unusual only because of a tragic death and a judge who decided something ought to be done about the causes tha sev and most of the other states in the Union forbid sale of hard liquor to young people under the age of 21. New York, which apparently thinks everybody else is out of step, allows sale to boys and

girls as young as 18, The guilt in Darien is undoubtedly a shared guilt. The parents of youngsters well aware that liquor was to be served many of them probably had served liquor o children other than their own at home themselves. This didn't make it right, or wise. And now they discover, along with oral question there is also a law that is almost as stringent against serving liquor free to teen-agers as for a bar to serve

What has become the social custom i Darien is repeated widely throughout the metropolitan area and elsewhere. Darien happens to have a death to remember, a punishment far more severe than the courts will-deliver. But Darien has also given the rest of us something to think about—and especially New York State with its law that uniquely sanctions the drinking and purchase of liquor by teenagers.—NEW YORK TIMES.
