Performance inside the system has been human and the political system just outside it has, over the years, felt less and less obligation to defend it. Seventeen years is a short time, but long enough to mean that there are thousands of voters in Manchester today who never paid taxes or watched town money and policy under any straight political system of government. It is natural and perhaps inevitable fact that there is some yearning in Manchester today, as there is in Hartford, and particularly in the ranks of the political party which considers itself most likely to dominate that return to straight political government which is usually called, nowadays, the "strong mayor" form of government, for a junking of the non-partisan, busi-

ness-like ideals of the General Manager-Board of Directors kind of Charter. Not even the Republican party, if we read its public temper accurately, feels quite as enthusiastic a good citizenship bligation toward the Manager-Board orm of government as it did when it originally helped establish it here.

can victory in the town election Monday will mean we concentrate on improving the system we adopted in 1947 instead of junking it; a Democratic victory will be taken, by the Democratic generalship, as license for the introduction of direct political controls to every phase of the town government. It would be difficult to imagine a

town election in which the town's whole future is more at stake. of Manchester present music policy "needs the direction and effort of a string major," who will concentrate in just this High's greatest cultural assets no longer exists. The school orchestra, at once a student activity and a classroom subject has been disbanded. For once, one cannot use any of the reasons usually given when an activity is vaporized. That is, it is not a lack of school

scivity is vaporized That is, it is not a lack of school spirit, a budget cut, or the want of an advisor that has forced Mr. Robert Vater, head of the Music Department, to make this decision. It is, in fact, the result of a foreseeable and preventable problem that has been growing in Manchester for many years.

It is not a simple problem, but one which goes all the way back to the character of an orchestra. An orchestra is based upon its string section: It should have at least twice as many stringed instruments as other instruments.

At its first class meeting, the school "orchestra" had four violins, no cello, no basses and no violas.

When asked about this deficiency, Mr. Vater replied that the problem was much deeper than scheduling or student apathy. Granted, some students could not schedule orchestra, and there were probably a few competent players who did not choose to sign up. But most important, the necessary number of string players simply does not exist in Manchester High.

This is not a problem that can be solved now, by the high school music department. In the three or four years that a student is in this school, he cannot become proficient enough

in this school, he cannot become proficient enough to handle the heavy demands that are put upon an orchestral string player. By the time a prospective orchestra member reaches high school, he must have mastered the must have mastered the fundamentals of his instru-ment. Therefore, the mat-ter is very much out of the





rduous duty" on the Warren commission, says the widow of Lee Harvey Oswald is "a baffling personality."

Russell, 66, a Georgia Democrat, told a newsman that serving on the commission which
investigated the assassination of
President John F. Kennedy was
"a sad and morbid experience"
in the "most strenuous" year of in the "most strenuous" year of his life.

The commission's report was made public Bunday night. It found that Oswald acted alone in the abooting death of Kennedy and the wounding of Texas Gov. John B. Conally last Nov. 22 in Dallas.

Marina Oswald, the assassin's attractive Soviet-born widow testified on three occasions. Each time she had her own Russian interpreter. A Russian linguist of the investigating group also was on hand.

Russell said she appeared shy and naive in her first appearance, testifying she was convinced her husband had killed the President. Then, said Russell, she appeared to defend Oswald — saying he had been kind to their children and had helped her with the dishes and other household chores.

In later testimony, Russell said, she appeared much more sophisticated and confident, saying that her husband had beaten her several times.

"she testified that she now believed Gov. Connally — not President Kennedy, was the intended target."

(The commission discounted the view that Conally was the target because Oswald knew that Conally was never concerned with the discharge, and Mrs. Oswald had earlier testified her husband "spoke well of him" while the Oswalds were living in the Soviet Union.

Russell said he reminded her of her earlier testimony.

"Oswald said then (while in the Soviet Union) that if he were in Texas he would vote for Conally. I asked her why she had changed her testimony.

"She replied that Oswald was mad at the governor at the time of the shooting."

"Russell said the young widow always used Russian in replying to questions, although she seemed to understand English and the questions.




