

Will Chinese Really Love Bomb? The Western world has judged that emmunist China is now so close to a suclear explosion of some kind that it has become good strategy for Western statesmen to start predicting the Chi-

Their purpose in predicting the Chinese bomb is not to disconcert the Chisene, or to demonstrate their own superior apy network, or even to incite their own governments or legislatures into

he expenditure of more money and energy on nuclear projects. The purpose of Western statesmen who have begun predicting some kind of Chinese nuclear explosion is to deadm and diminish the propaganda impact f that explosion when it does come.

we ourselves have been preeting it, we rob it of the element of t, we get ourselves accustomed

then we can even begin taunting them with being slow and behind schedule for such fine distinctions as that? So, in the Western world, the main kind of preparation for the concededly inevitable moment is a propaganda type of preparation. We want to take the comes, for our own people, and for the people around the world who might

otherwise be too much impressed. Nobody in the West, at least, is worried about, or speculating about, the effect the attainment of nuclear status might have on the Chinese Communists

But that, too, could be something very interesting, and we find ourselves wondering whether the Chinese Communists have begun preparing any propaganda softeners or antidotes for use among themselves.

Up to now, the Chinese Communist line has been that nuclear weapons really don't count, especially in any sitnation where China is concerned, because China has such a huge dispersed population that it could be virtually sure of being the only major world power likely to survive a nuclear war.

This has all been before China has the bomb. And, with its declaration of China's willingness to face nuclear war, it has been the most alarming verbal But we have an unworthy suspicion that after the Chinese get the bomb,

their respect for it will begin to increase. We expect that, in order to threaten their neighbors with it, they may have to admit that the nuclear weapon can be quite a thing, and might even be able to win a war against And, if the Chinese have the same

experience other nations have had with the bomb, which is that the more bombs you make, and the bigger bombs you make, and the more you try to frighten other people with them the more frightened you yourself become-if the bomb comes to mean to the Chinese what it has meant to other nations, then perhaps it is going to sober the Chinese down too. They might even come, some day, to a kindly view toward some kind of world system which might have a chance of putting everybody's atoms under some kind of control which might make general survival possible instead of general annihilation. In short, although this is not really much more than fantasy, it could be, it just about could be, that the bomb is going to be the first civilizing influence that has hit China since Confucius.

Outside of school, a man who fails as butcher may later find his proper ity" as a butcher would not really have enefited him. So failure may promote the best allocation of an individual's r sources, just as it helps direct the resources of the economy to their most

Once the individual chooses his most promising area of competition, success or failure still is an issue he largely tles for himself. Some men may count themselves successes though they may reckon themselves as failures though they toil in luxurious executive suites. With each of us it is a matter of personal goals, our assessment of our own abilities, our own initiative.

Each of us has the right to expect to be allowed to compete on a fair and equal footing, and it is a proper function of society to guard that right. But what if society goes on to promise everyone that he cannot fail?

Anyone who accepts this promise is surely tempted to slacken his effort why run if the goal is within grasp? The result is a reduction of the indi-vidual's initiative, a lessening of his
