Heresy In Pasadena

Precisely because it has been the acledged leader in the business of ing freeways, California now shows as sign of also becoming the first ate to raise some substantial public mand that freeways should be evaluted in comparison to certain other eleents of American life, like, for intance, homes for people to live in. The California State Highway Com-

nission held a public hearing in Pasaena the other day on plans for one more iew freeway. Most interest seemed to center on the

slans for carrying the new freeway through the rather small and compact munity of South Pasadena. The area of South Pasadena is given as something just under four square miles, something oughly two miles long-and two miles wide. In order to traverse this area, one of the proposed new freeway plans would have to wipe out 40 acres of residential omes, the public library, a hospital, and at least one public school. Or, to alculate it another way, this new road brough South Pasadena would itself and up occupying about one-twelfth of he total area inside the city's boun-

What is thus beginning to dawn on some communities in California is the thing that is beginning to be sugested in Connecticut. That is, if you ave everything solid, you will have all ads and no homes, all traffic and no life, all movement and no rest, every-, here to go but nowhere to stop.

In fact, with such prospects, the Mayof South Pasadena dared declare, in erhaps the first great heresy of the su-er-highway age, that he didn't expect proposed freeway to be of any benet at all to his city. This was undoubtly anti-modern, anti-progress, antic spirit treachery. But his fellow citins, who have been watching the strips a which people live grow narrower and ower in between the highways, supated his statements with applause. may have constituted something uned of in the course of freeway conlos to date-a turning point nobadly own mins.

Yet, in order to get Eisenhower's vacuous blessing, Gold-water was capable of a tongue-in-check erasure of his infamous "extremiam" slogan, a statement that was not written in haste but with extreme care, and gone over time and again by Gold-water before he uttered it. These words can, and should, forever symbolize the total fraudulence of his claim to be a true conservative: "Extremism in the defense of liberty is no vice, and . noderation in the pursuit of justice. o virtue." That statement deserves t e the "Rum, Romanism and Rebellion o virtue." of this election, and Barry Goldwater deserves to be defeated for it alone, no matter how much he tries to clown it away. He knew what he meant by it, and so does every John Birch fanatic and Ku Klux vigilante.
