



### Space Made More Comfortable

Our unofficial experts in space matters have begun to tell us what was significant about the Russian passenger jaunt, and it seems that two things the Russians demonstrated were interesting

First, they put their three men into space ship and let them do their urney in it without putting them in adividual space suits. This meant that he men had more freedom and mobility. it meant that the Russians have achievod a high degree of confidence in the structural and functional reliability of their space cabin.

Second, the Russians demonstrated, in their landing, the technique which still lies in the future for us-that of achieving the soft landing on a hard surface by means of special rocket motors facing down and blasting a cushion between the ship and the earth. This is what we will have to do when we land on the moon; we know how it is to be done; the reason we haven't tried this brand of landing is that the presence of these additional motors involves a weight problem we can't solve easily until we have reliable launching power compar-

able to that the Russians have, In these two respects, both of which show the Russians actually practicing something we are not yet ready to put the test with actual human lives incolved, the Russian flight was impressire and offered something new.

It now seems, however, that the blast-off power the Russians used in launching their space bus was probably obtained from the same large rockets they have had for some time. This was a more sophisticated, improved space flight than anybody has yet made; but what it represented was natural progress rather than any startling big leap ahead. As one can be sure any scientist would tell us, it is hard work which pays off, even in the exotic realm of space travel, and the Russians work hard and well, and are not likely to relinquish the lead they otherned with the first sputnik back in 1867.

For such reasons about 24 of these white soldiers fighting for pay went on mutiny the other day, or strike, they hemselves preferred to call it. The main point was that they stopped fighting Premier Moise Tshombe's battle against his own rebellious natives. And the military effect of this strike by 24 mercenaries was to set back the Congolese government's main offensive toward Stanleyville by "at least three weeks." That combination of statistics and ad-

jectives that a mutiny by 24 people could set back a "main" drive by as much as three weeks-illustrates what we mean about the kind of war a civilized world might be able to handle and withstand. If people who wanted to go to war could each hire about 24 men, and send them out into some jungle waste to conduct battles against one another, then we could have our war and our world, too. But the news from the Congo is disturbing. It's getting so you can't even depend on mercenaries.

### The Memory Is Pleasant

The memory of Eddie Cantor is the more pleasant because he, perhaps for a combination of reasons, managed to become one of the comedians of his generation who did not keep returning to the spotlight in any forlorn effort to perpetuate his career beyond its natural limits and appeals.

The little man with the big capacity for the arts of song, dance and daugh can be remembered, and mourned, pretty much as he was in his hey-day. It is the image of Eddle Cantor when he was good which has flashed into mil-lions of American minds along with the news of his death. He had his talents: he stopped using them when they began to creak; he had his standard jokes; he stopped telling them before they were 40 years old. He had his public; he stopped claiming it when he no longer had quite a full measure to give it.

Some others of his generation do not, alas, take age with an equal grace. They appear, after hours in make-up parlors, as if they still owned their old audiences. They repeat, performance after performance, the same standard jokes, expecting us to join in the canned laugh-

ness is something that gets in the blood, like politics, and the people who hang in it may not be able to help themselves. But one way or another Eddie Cantor managed the dignity of retirement, and this makes the current memory of him one that remains fresh and pleasant even though one has to go back a number of years for it.

### Mid-Campaign

With the campaign about half over, the post-convention fears of what an all-out right-wing campaign based on simplistic ideas could do to the country have not been borne out. If the polls are anywhere near correct, the electorate has been a great deal more sophisticated in dealing with the Goldwater phenomenon than most analysts had told us to expect. Senator Goldwater has done his part. After five weeks, he has succeeded in developing only one major issue: Goldwaterism, and the uncertainties about it have taken hold in the most unlikely corners of the nation. The country does instinctively want in a President the balance, poise, restraint and grasp of facts that Goldwater so conspicuously lacks,
Goldwater has made every possible tactical mistake. The sweetness now

being poured in vain over Republican moderates like Keating and Romney might have been productive if it had occurred to the Senator around convention time. The presence of William Miller on the ticket has neutralized the moral crusade against President Johnson. (The Reporter notes that Mr. Miller

For a man hailed so often as one who would not change his views to court election, Goldwater has been ex-traordinarily flexible. NATO, which he belittled, has become his fixed star; the Risenhower foreign policy of which he was so contemptuous has become his

was so contemptuous has become his model; since the campaign began, Goldwater has also switched his stand on the draft, tax-cuts, farm subsides, extremists, TV debates, support for the United Nations, selling TVA, recognizing the Soviet Union and negotiating with Red China.

Through all this, President Johnson continues to let his opponent have as

continues to let his opponent have as much rope as he wants, and the more the Senator speaks, the better the Presi-dent looks. The President's decision not to debate with or even reply to Senator Goldwater was obvious enough, but seems to be paying off spectacularly; it is helping to make Goldwater seem even more brash and irrelevant than he really manages to be.

The problem for Johnson is to keep

his camp from believing how bright the picture really is. The swing-over of lican newspapers and Republican voters in auburbs and farm areas has been emphatic. The polls suggest that Goldwater is further down than any candidate has been at this stage since modern polling began in 1936. Goldwater has still not found an issue that the people are buying; only a major foreign disaster is likely to give him a chance to make up much ground quickly, and even then the tendency might be chance to make up much ground quickly, and even then the tendency might be

The Dow Jones rail, utilities and 65-stock averages also dropped abruptly.
