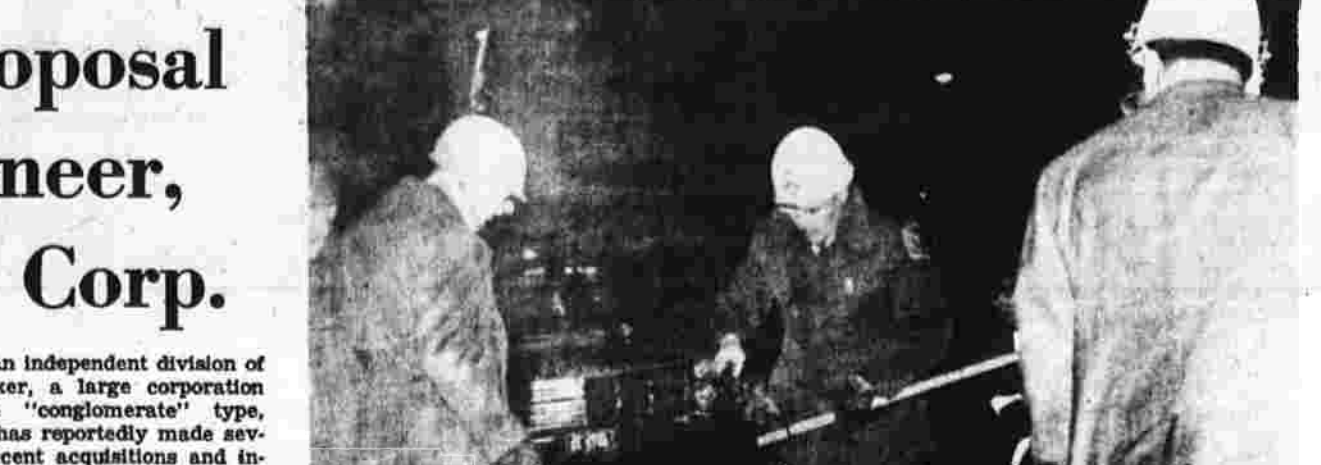

### Escape Spurs Criticism of New Program

**MERIDEN (AP)—**A state correctional officer has criticized a new program for transferring delinquent boys confined in minimum-security schools after eight such youngsters escaped Thursday.

One of the youngsters is from Manchester. None was identified.

Norman K. Morgan, superintendent of the Correctional School for Boys, said Thursday that the 1967 General Assembly's plan for moving "incorrigibles" to the Cheshire Reformatory was "a failure."

Morgan voiced his criticism after eight boys bolted from a segregated treatment area of an injured school employe.

Police found two of the boys 14-hours later walking in the outskirts of this city. The other two remained at large.

Morgan said the injured man, Miss Michalak, was apparently injured when struck by a large metal milk can. He was reported in good condition at Memorial Hospital suffering from chest and shin injuries.

"Most of the runaways shouldn't be here at all," Morgan said. "They don't fit into our pattern."

The correctional institution is organized on the cottage system with a minimum amount of restricted movement and an emphasis on rehabilitation.

The superintendent said that the boys who slipped out of the special-treatment area had been returned to the school this week after a previous escape. Two other boys with them refused to join in the escape, he noted.

Morgan declined to discuss details concerning his criticism of the transfer program. But he said that an unruly boy must be moved immediately for his benefit and the well-being of the school. The process now takes five to eight months, he said.

Five of the escapees were 13 years old, one was 14 and two were 17. Their hometowns were listed as Bridgeport, Hartford, New Haven, South Norwalk, Willimantic, Manchester and Norwich.

Years ago there were gang wars. Now the problems are things like narcotics, numbers running, illegal fireworks and dealing in stolen goods. There were five abandoned cars on the block this week stripped of all their parts, which junkies sell to support their habit. There are two empty tenements out of about 80 in the block. Junkies have stripped these tenements of plumbing, refrigerators, and anything else that can be moved.

"The garbage is just a part of the life here," he said. "It's not only the garbage, it's the people in bad conditions and on top of that the garbage is piling up in East Harlem. It's a social war that just take so much."

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"We don't talk about humaneness by the circumstances. The mood is not turned ugly yet because here we talk about survival."

### Auto Safety Standards Fight May Shift to Supreme Court

**WASHINGTON (AP)—**The hidden defects and latent dangers over auto safety standards, now heating up again in Congress, soon may shift to the Supreme Court.

There the lawyer for an injured young ex-cellar is seeking a ruling that could force auto manufacturers to stop making cars that can run 150 and 180 miles an hour. If they did not, they could be held liable to innocent victims of high-speed accidents.

William Haddon Jr., director of the National Highway Safety Bureau, observing that accident victims often can be attributed to high speeds, remarked last August: "We would like to see cars built so that they cannot exceed a certain speed, say, for example, 60 miles an hour."

One of 47 safety standards proposed by the bureau last October were 117 equipped with devices to limit their maximum speed.

At the moment, the governing law on auto accidents is far different from the ruling sought in the appeal of Philip Schemel (Schemel, the injured ex-cellar from Springfield, Ohio).

Early one April morning in 1964, Schemel, then 15, was stretched out on the back seat of a car traveling a highway outside Oakland City, Ind. Suddenly Impala slipping along, according to papers in the case, at 125 miles an hour.

The young sailor was temporarily paralyzed below the neck and later got a medical discharge from the Navy.

His appeal contends General Motors, manufacturer of the Impala, is legally negligent in that it can go so fast. (2) For designing a "speeding" speed" in advertising.

But there have been dissenting voices, including Judge Roger J. Killey, of the Chicago Court of Appeals, who ruled against Schemel last July.

"In my opinion," he said, "General Motors, as any other person, is chargeable with the duty of reasonably foreseeing the potential dangers of a design and the advertising it has chosen."

If the Supreme Court takes this view, automobiles may never be the same.

**Petitions Ask Vote On Busing School**

Two petitions are on file in the town clerk's office but each has any names on it. One asks for a referendum on busing and Project Concern, and the other for a referendum on the building of the new school.

The busing petition asks that two items be put on the voting machines for a referendum vote:

1. To consider and act upon a proposal that the town enter into a contract to accept out-of-town students into the Bolton school system under the Project Concern program.
2. To consider and act upon the adoption of an ordinance to become effective immediately establishing the requirement for a referendum vote of the qualified voters of the town for the use of Bolton schools for the education of other than children of legal residents or children whose legal guardians are Bolton residents.

According to the town clerk the names of 20 qualified voters are all that are required to ask for a town meeting on a question. The town clerk must sign the petition before it is circulated, signifying that it is in order legally. When the petition is returned, the town clerk must certify that the names are those of qualified voters.

It is not known whether there are copies of the petition on the community or not. Many forms people say they are aware that a petition is being, or was being, circulated, but no one could say exactly where one could be located. The information volunteered the information that copies were in her office.

The petition is a result of recent school board action. On Feb. 25 the board voted 4-1, with one abstention, to participate in a Project Concern type program with the Hartford Board of Education on a one-year trial basis.

The number of pupils to be bused was not specified, but class enrollment seemed to indicate that there might be as few as three, probably in the first and second grades.

A lawyer in the town clerk's office this morning glanced at the petition and asked, "Is it legal?" It is such an ordinance was passed, excluding all but Bolton children from Bolton schools, would it be binding, or could the state overrule it? He added that it's easier to ask questions than to answer them.

The petition on the building of the new school requests that "all items pertaining to a vote on the proposed new elementary school be placed on the voting machines."

**School Petition Academic**

This petition is purely academic at the moment since the date for the town meeting for the proposed school has not been set, and, as of today, exactly what will go on the call is still undecided.

It had been hoped that the town meeting would be held Feb. 26, the Monday after school vacation. But the selectmen's clerk, Mrs. Shirley Riley, said this morning that this appears doubtful.

Mrs. Riley is also town treasurer. She said that the Board of Finance must meet and decide on the financing of the school before town council can be asked to draw up the call to the meeting.

There are two proposed methods asking for funds: A sum for final plans and bid documents (which would necessitate a later vote when the bids come in), and a sum for the issue for the entire estimated cost of the school.

The finance board can choose to put either of these on the call to the meeting, or both, to give the town a choice.

If the bond issue goes on the call, Mrs. Riley said, then time must be allowed for the making of attorneys to make sure everything is legal.

The delay at the moment involves the finance board. One member has resigned and has not been replaced. One member is away on vacation, and a third is away on business off town. On an attempt to obtain a quorum under these conditions failed recently.

The Democratic Town Committee is not expected to name a replacement until its regular meeting night, Feb. 16. Meanwhile, the Board of Education is hoping that the school, to house kindergarten through Grade 4, will be ready for occupancy next January.

**3rd Petition for Apartments**

There is one more petition in town. This is being circulated quite openly, and residents of South Rd. have been holding meetings on its subject at the building of apartments on that road.

The petitioners have been invited to the Zoning Board meeting Feb. 12. The meeting will be held in the Community Hall to accommodate the expected crowd.

Although the petitioners request a public hearing, a public hearing as such cannot be held because there is no question of a change or other legality before the apartments are built. The area is already zoned R-2, and multiple dwellings are permitted, as long as they comply with zoning regulations.

His motion carried 6 to 3, along partisan lines. Schaller then offered a second motion, seconded by Republican David Odegaard, that the advisory referendum on the April 30 vot-ing machine.

Manchesters is one of five towns in the Hartford area which has participated in the two-year Project Concern exper-iment, which began September 1965 and is scheduled to end June 1968. Manchester accept-ed 62 of Hartford's children into its school system.

The town has a formal re-quest from the Hartford school board to continue the program for another year. Invitations to participate have been received by 16 Hartford-area towns.

In May 1966 when the Man-chester Board of Directors was Democratic-controlled, both boards rejected advisory referen-dums on the basis that the town charter declares it illegal. Atty. ORANGETOWN, S.C. (AP) — A dusk-to-dawn curfew and the exclusion of students from two predominantly Negro colleges Friday night brought Orangeburg its first racial peace in five nights.

Previously three Negro students had been killed and 50 persons injured, in violence touched off by attempts to integrate a bowling alley.

From 8 p.m. Friday when the curfew went into effect, streets in the city of 17,000 were virtually deserted except for police and National Guard units.

Only one incident was reported Friday night. Henry Lake, the governor's representative in Orangeburg, said four shots were heard by firemen who went to a grain fire on U.S. 608 a mile away from the colleges.

Violence began Monday night when a group of Negroes tried to enter the bowling alley, which they have been attempting to integrate for eight months.

They were refused admission and began marching through Orangeburg's downtown area, smashing store windows and overturning automobiles.

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Planes Raid Haiphong, First Time in Month

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. warplanes raided the Haiphong area Friday for the first time in a month, apparently ending a bombing restraint ordered by President Johnson while American officials looked into peace prospects.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk indicated that the peace probe ended after the Communists launched their biggest offensive of the war Jan. 30.

Fighting from that had camped against major South Vietnamese cities has died out in all but Hue and Saigon, where the allies reported some success in efforts to clear out Communist-held areas.

The U.S. Command said the Communist death toll climbed by 1,068 Friday, reaching a total of 27,706 since Jan. 29. The allied death toll was reported as 2,207, including 829 Americans, 1,133 South Vietnamese and 54 other allies.

Besides reporting an air raid on Cat Bi, four miles southeast of Haiphong, U.S. spokesmen gave a delayed report which confirmed the presence of 80-viet south I-28 twin jet fighters in North Vietnam.

Marine's Plane Hijack Foiled

Los Angeles Times—Washington Post News Service DA NANG, Feb. 9 — A young Marine tried to hijack a Pan American airliner at gun point at the big Da Nang Air Base yesterday and force the crew to fly him to Hong Kong.

For nearly three hours the civilian clothes, pointed a cocked .45 automatic pistol at the heads of the flight crew before the engineer was able to disarm him.

The gunman was later identified as Pfc. William Lee Clark, who is attached to an artillery unit with the 1st Marine Division.

At one point, base officials, at the request of the flight crew, gave the plane permission to take off for Hong Kong. But as the engine was warming up, a message flashed into the base.

The drama on Da Nang air strip began at 1:20 p.m. yesterday with the Pan American DC-83, a piston engine loading up with 82 Marines, sailors, and soldiers for a five-day rest and recuperation flight to Hong Kong.

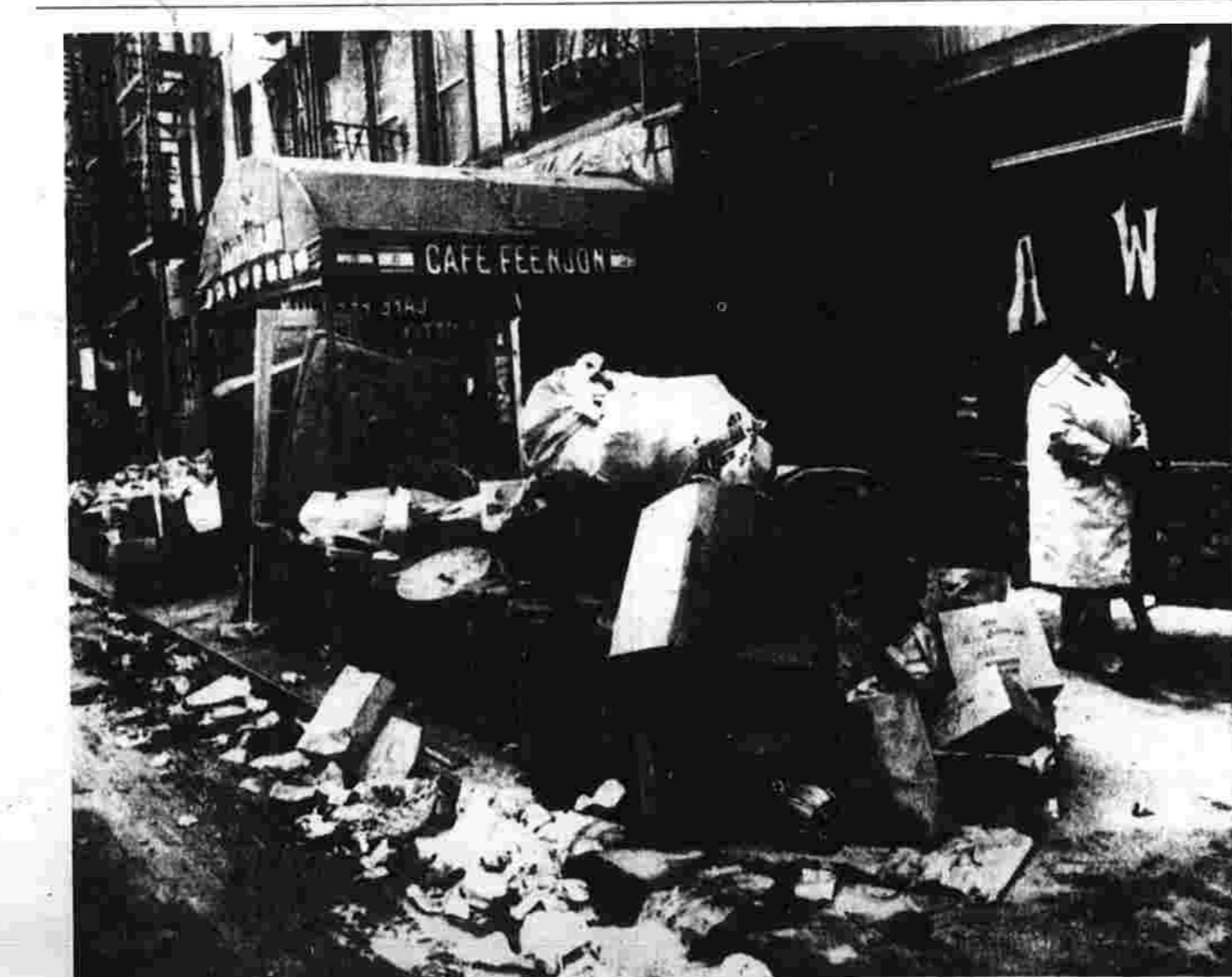

Garbage Pile-Up Deepens

NEW YORK (AP) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller today pressed his effort to end the now politically entangled sanitation strike without a National Guard call-up as the massive garbage pile-up grew and health and fire hazards mounted.

Holding out against Mayor John V. Lindsay's repeated pleas for a guard call-up, the governor accused the mayor of a breach of position in the strike and began new talks to seek a permanent solution to the crisis.

Second Attack Wave Expected in Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP) — Top U.S. officials expect Communist forces to launch a second wave of attacks against the cities and towns of South Vietnam but say enemy losses in the first offensive have been so heavy the new onslaught should be weaker.

The offensive which began Jan. 21 is considered by officials in Washington to have resulted in a costly military defeat for the Viet Cong.

This assessment is based not only on their reported casualties but on their failure to hold any of the 36 provincial capitals and 64 district towns they invaded.

On the positive side of the intensive fighting so far beginning with the Communist surprise assaults during the Vietnamese lunar New Year holiday, officials say no South Vietnamese military units defected to the enemy.

Ship Off N.C. Saves 24 from Life Boats

NEW YORK (AP) — Twenty-four persons were plucked from the sea today and a life raft in the stormy Atlantic today and brought aboard a rescue vessel after they abandoned their halting freighter some 500 miles off Cape Hatteras, N.C., the Coast Guard said.

Some 10 hours after the skipper of the 313-foot Charry out of Quebec, radioed he was abandoning ship, his crew of 22 and two passengers—a man and his wife—were reported aboard the Norwegian freighter Vink.

The Vink was the closest vessel to the Charry when the distress call went out.

Eight-foot seas and high winds still prevailed in the area. A Coast Guard spokesman said the Charry, built in 1948 and owned by North Shipping and Transportation, Ltd., was retrofitted listing badly but still afloat.
