The South Vietnamese army, and the United States forces, for their part, have little hesitancy in compounding the civilan misery and tragedy by going into civilian districts with bomb and shell whenever they think Vietcong may be hiding there. The logistics involved mean, then,

hat it is our side which probably does most of the actual killing of civilians and which does most of the destruction of home and property. This put us in the horrible, but no longer novel, position of destroying more and more of the country we have come to save. Under such conditions, everybody wonders how the ordinary civilians are

At the present stage of the enemy of fensive, a few conclusions seems to be shared by many observers.

The Vietcong have not yet produced any mass civilian uprising or revolution against the government. But, on the other hand, they have not yet really called for that. It may follow the next round of action in the cities, if there is such a next round.

If the civilian population has not risen up against the Saigon government neither has it, on the other hand, done anything to repel or resist the infiltrations of the Vietcong. To the contrary, there are some signs that it has given the Vietcong some degree of welcome and concealment. In the main, however, the judgment about the civilian popula tion is that, so far as loyalties are concerned, it wishes to remain uninvolved.

The civilian population apparently has divided emotional reactions to what has been going on. There is some blame of the Vietcong, for precipitating war in their homes. There is some blame and contempt for the Saigon government, for not being able to protect its own cities There is inevitable resentment of the American military power which, in its pursuit of the Vietcong, is killing mnocent civilians and destroying their

Among all such divisions of mood there is probably one great common denominator. The poor people of Vietnam must now consider peace the only cause, the only ideology, the only condition that can have much real meaning for



Chief Reardon had this to say about the incidents: "We want to alert all parents to the facts that this type of equipment can kill or cause great injury, and that possession of such materials is illegal in this state. "Implements of this nature can easily be utilized in the

perpetration of various crimes, although to the best of our knowledge the boys presently involved have not done so. "In cooperation with the state fire marshal, we urge all parents to refrain from purchasing such equipment for their children or allowing their children to possess it." One of the firms offering this merchandise advertises its wares in a leaflet which tells

how the components may be purchased separately or in kits such as the sky rocket kit, volcano kit or stink bomb kit. Powder may be obtained in quantities from \$3 worth to \$30 worth. Casings run from the five-inch size to that of the cardboard equivalent of a mortar shell at prices from \$2.25 to \$25. As much as 1,500 feet of fuse may be obtained for \$7.50. In the kit form, prices range from \$4 to \$200 complete with instructional manual entitled "Pyrotechnitry," telling the voungsters how to construct such delights as cherry bombs. ash cans, bazooka launchers, and the like.

In New York, the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Com-

mittee (SNCC) referred to the violence in South Carolina as the "Orangeburg Massacre" and threatened revenge. The committee's chairman H. Rap Brown, said, "if we seel redress of our grievances through peaceful and so-called legal means, we will be sho down and murdered. "If we must die, let us die with the enemy's blood on our

hands. . . let us die like men, fighting back."
From 5 p.m. Friday when the curfew went into effect, streets in the city of 17,000 were virtualy deserted except for police and National Guard units. All places of business, including drugstores and service stations, were closed until dawn.
