Studies Show Moon with Warm Area LOS ANGELES (AP) -New

studies indicate the moon may have moist, warm areas—possi-bly conducive to microbial life a lunar scientist reports.
 Dr. Jack Green told a seminar of the University of Califor nia at Los Angeles chapter of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics Tuesday that evidence of moisture was found in specially filtered telescope pictures of an area near the crater Aristarchus. Aristarchus, in the upper le portion of the lunar disk, is the site of red flares—possibly indi cating volcanic activity-repor

Green said his belief that areas near the crater is based on apparent detection of sulfur with a filter, producing photographs in which that mineral shows up black. Large black areas several miles square were found in photographs recently made to investigate earlier indications, Green said.

cision is to be made by us.

Almost every word they signed, in this introduction, can be read for Manchester, Conn., and for Hartford, Conn., as much as it can be read for Newark, with one fortunate difference. Some communities have a few seconds more time than others.

The Lesson Of Newark

That this report had to be written in a manifestation of a deep failing in our society, for many of the problems that it analyzes should have been solved by now. Had we, as a society, made a more timely and determined effort solve them, the events that led to the establishment of this commission might never have occurred.

Nor can we plead ignorance about the nature of these problems. The shelves of government offices and academic intitutions are filled with studies that shed light on them and offer avenues for solutions. The question is whether we have the will to act.

The record of history does not augus well for action. Although violence has marked the path of many ethnic and social groups, the major issues that were in contention in those conflicts have long since been resolved. But one great issue remains unresolved. It is the place of the Negro in American so-

It is this issue that almost tore the nation apart 109 years ago. It is this question that led to the Chicago riot of 1919, the Hariem riots of 1935 and 1943, and the mounting disorders in our cities in the years since World War II. In the wake of the major racial conflicts of this century, commissions like this were established. They investigated the disorders and their causes and made recommendations. Many chapters

these earlier volumes read much like some in this report. Poor housing, unemployment and in-ferior education of Negroes figure prominently in the report on the 1919 Chicago the conditions in Newark in 1967. The mood in our cities clearly indicates that commissions like ours will action is forthcoming from their recommendations. Our disadvantaged com-

munities must see far more tangible evi dence of a commitment to change than has emerged so far, or the summer of 1987 is likely to become a prologue to tragedy, and the time for study and planning will have run out.

A 15-year-old high school student from Plainfield told this Commission: "There is a time the white person was accepted in the Negro community and he could just about go into the Ne The Negro couldn't go in his community okay. But now neither one feels comis how they have drawn further apart." It was a convincingly understated way of telling us that the distance between white and black is growing, and the distrust and anger are on the rise on

There is a clear and present danger to the very existence of our cities. Consequently, more is demanded than argument over the respective shortcomings responsibilities and prejudices of white and black. The way to use time now is or action. The burden of responsibility weighs

The central issue with which this nation has temporized for the last 100 vears - to make equality real for the black man-was found sooner or later to land on the doorstep of each of us. And had not the Negro been patient and forbearing, it would have landed there

We need fewer promises and more action from political leaders and govern-We need fewer press releases from police commissions on community relations and more respect by patrolmen for the dignity of each citizen. We need fewer speeches from employers and union leaders on equal oppor

tunity in the future, and more flexible hiring standards now. We need more principals, teachers and guidance counselors who want their students to succeed instead of expecting

We need more social workers who respect and foster a client's pride instead of treating him as an irritant or a child Suburban residents must understand that the future of their communities is inextricably linked to the fate of the city instead of harboring the illusion that they can maintain invisible walls or continue to run away. Such change is possible only when the

people in our more fortunate communities understand that what is required of them is not an act of generosity toward the people in the ghettos, but a decision of direct and desp self-interest. To bring about such change and the re-evaluation and revision of individual conduct and practice requires a climate

that must be created by extraordinary leadership on all levels of government and in the private sector. It requires clean, imaginative and sensitive administration in our city halls,

It requires broad opportunity for the Negro communities to convert into a force for prideful achievement the power that despair caused them to use for It requires the realization of the sim-

ple truth that people are a community's most valuable resource, and that to help people gain access to opportunity represents an investment likely to yield a better return than all the subsidies we now provide for scores of economic sectors in our country, from farms to petroleum, from railroads to publications. If the events of last July had one effect, it was to show that we can no longer escape the issue. The question is whether we shall resort to illusion, or finally come to grips with reality. The illusion is that force alone will solve the problem. But our society can not deliver on its promises when terror stalks the streets, and disorder and lawlessness tear our communities apart.

No group of people can better themselves by rioting and breaking laws that are enacted for the benefit and protection of everyone. Riots must be condemned. The cardi-

nal principle of any civilized society is law and order. It is vital to all. Without it no one will succeed or endure. The primary responsibility of govern-ment toward a threatened riot or mass violence is prompt and firm action, judi-ciously applied and sufficient to restore

At the same time, we recognize that in the long run law and order can prevail only in conditions of social justice. Law enforcement in our country is neither designed nor equipped to deal with massive unrest. Our police establishments should not be forced into the role of armies of oc-

cupation. Therefore, reality demands prompt action to solve the long-neglected problems of our cities. inherent in these problems is the virus of segregation. It cannot be treated with palliatives. It must be attacked at the source. It is rampant in urban bodies no longer healthy enough to fight disease of any kind and which will increasingly suffer frustration and disorder unless old and outdated approaches are abandoned and new solutions sought in the metropolitan and regional con-







PARIS (AP) - Pierre Cardiand Veuillot, a leading progressive and the Roman Catholic archbishop of Paris, died today of cancer. He was 55 and had been a cardinal only seven and a half months. The French prelate was the ninth cardinal to die since the consistory last June 26 at which Pope Paul VI increased the Sacred College to a record membership of 118. The Pope is expected to call a consistory, possibly before Easter, April 14, to

create more princes of Cardinal Veuillot, a former Vatican administrator, was named bishop of Angers, France, in 1959, and in 1966 became coadjutor to Maurice Cardinal Feltin, the archbishop of Paris. Cardinal Feltin, now 79, resigned because of his age.

Counterfeit U.S. Bills Seized in Australia SYDNEY, Australia (AP) -Detectives raided two houses today and reported they seized feit U.S. \$20 and \$50 bills which they said were "almost flaw-

less" copies. A senior detective said the police were satisfied the raid would clear up one of the largest worldwide counterfeit conspiracies ever handled in Australia. He said the investigation began with inquiries from the United States in 1957. In their raids in the Sydney suburbs of Kingsgrove and Balmain, police seized printing equipment, photographic material and printing paper and arrested a 49-year-old photographer. They also seized counterfeit Australian notes.

Actors' Strike in Rio RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) -Theaters in Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo were closed Tuesday night by an actors' strike against censors who took exception to the use of "cow" and "pig" as epithets in a Tennessee Williams play.

Officials in Brasilia, the capital, ordered a halt to the production of Williams' "A Streetcar Named Desire" on Monday and banned leading lady Maria Fernanda from acting in any play for 30 days. The actress got an injunction against the ban on ner, but censorship of the play was not affected. The strikers have won the support of most newspapers. Tuesday's Jornal Do Brasil said the censorship system "daily commits crimes against the nation's culture" and asked that the censors be restrained,





Cuban Seized In Florida **Bomb Case**

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) -Police announce dtoday the first arrest of an alleged member of Cuban Power, a mysterious new anti-Castro terrorist organization, on a bombing charge. Ricardo Morales Navarrete,

arrested in an apartment raid, was charged with placing a bomb Jan. 25 that ripped into the offices of company engaged in shipping packages from Cuban exiles to their A spokesman for the police in-

telligence agency said the husky, black-haired Morales was a member but not the leader of Cuban Power. The officer said other arrests were in pros-

Cuban Power claimed that it placed a bomb which wrecked a plane Jan. 20 at Miami Internaional Airport. The aircraft was loaded with supplies from exiles to relatives in Cuba. A tyhewriten message,

signed only by "Ernesto," was sent to news media making this claim. The organization denied blame, however, for other recent bombings in Miami, including the garage of British Consul Francis J. Pelly and the automobile of Mexican Consul Rafael Reyes Spindola.

Cuban Power contended that the commercial shipments fell into the hands of Castro and aided his Communist regime. The J.S. Customs office said 1,000 to 2,000 packages are sent to Cuba by exiles each month. All are outed by way of Mexico, Spain

Morales, identified by police as a soldier of fortune who formerly served with the anti-Communist 5th Congolese Brigade in Africa, denied any connection with the bombing.
