North Korea Gen. Pak Chong Hae, acting commander of the North Korean forces, said he was not afraid of U.S. nuclear weapons and that he would use them if it should come to that.

Pak added that it would come to war unless the United States appeared to "take your bloody hands off Korea and withdraw from South Korea."

The only mention of the Pueblo in a charge by Pak that the United States was taking advantage of the incident to make full preparations for war and create a climate in which hostilities could be touched off "at any moment."

It seemed unlikely that the Communists had any intention of apologizing for the attempt on President Park; and the American posture indicated little intention of bowing to a Red demand for an apology for the Pueblo's alleged intrusion into North Korean territorial waters.

Manchester in Days Gone By

Open Air Schools all sides which were closed all during driving rain. The space was divided into two parts by a low partition. One side was used by the girls, one by the boys. After lunch each day, the pupils rested there for an hour.

The Ninth District Open Air School was opened on Jan. 24, 1910, with Miss Ava Tarr as its first teacher. She was succeeded by Miss Emma Borowski, who taught there until the school was closed for lack of pupils in 1920.

During the spring and fall the sunshines and gentle breezes made teaching in this school a delight, but winter brought problems. The children sat all bundled up in park-like sleeping bags, their hands in gloves or mittens, and their feet in over-the-ear slippers. The warm part of the town, varied in grade level from one through six. The pupils were children from New York State, was in charge as a method of treating respiratory diseases. The Boards of Education in Manchester felt that the health of some of their children could be improved by releasing them from heated classrooms and providing them with a facility in the open air, supplemented by nourishing food and bed rest. In 1910 the Ninth District Committee voted to establish such a school. The site chosen was south of the high school building, near the now-vanished Teacher's Hall. A two-story building to house the new school was erected by the Cheney Bros., which at that time owned all the schools in the Ninth District. It consisted of a classroom with windows on all sides which remained open all day. This room was equipped with desks fastened to movable runners so that they might be pushed around to follow the sun. A small cupboards to house supplies stood in the middle of the room like a sentry, flanked by the teacher's desk and a movable blackboard. Above this room also had windows on

At noon, the class retired to the "Cottage," a small house located between the school and Teachers' Hall. This house served as a laboratory for the Household Arts course required of all girls at Barnard, now Bennett Junior High School. Here, the children at the north end of the cottage had a four-course midday meal for the group and cleaned up after it. Meal time was a high light of the day for this class. Miss Borowski stood at the dining room door and nodded satisfaction as each youngster, now out of his heavy wraps, extended his two hands, palms up, palms down inspection. Each child sat in his assigned place and ate with eyes glued to the plate before him, as the teacher, sitting at the head of the table, said grace. Forks flew, and the food was plentiful and nutritious rather than fancy. The rule, "everything on the plate must be eaten before being excused," was carried out to the letter. Thus all appetites were satisfied and nothing was wasted.

Today the Methodist Church parsonage and the Bennett Junior High athletic field occupy the space where the Open Air School, the Cottage and Teachers' Hall once stood.

Among the many factors which led to the abandonment of the open air schools were improved public health services, newer methods of treating health problems, and higher wages which made for better housing and better nutrition.

Although all visual signs of these schools have now vanished, many a Manchester adult recalls with affection and gratitude the happy days spent at open air school.

Congress Goes on Vacation

WASHINGTON (AP)—After three weeks of work, Congress is taking the first in a series of scheduled vacations that will do little to improve the Aug. 1 adjournment its leaders claim is possible.

This recess, which began last Thursday, is in honor of President Abraham Lincoln's birthday anniversary three days ago. Republicans traditionally spend the week making speeches in honor of the first president of their party.

The Senate, which met for five seconds on Monday, meets today to resume regular business. But with a respite in progress against civil rights legislation, little if anything is expected to be accomplished.

The House, which met for 33 minutes Monday, plans a token session in a filibuster in progress until next Monday, when legislative business will be resumed.

Next week will also be a short week, because Washington's birthday falls on Tuesday.

Although the leadership of both houses talked optimistically of adjourning before the start of the political conventions Aug. 5, little has happened since to warrant that optimism.

While most presidential messages detailing proposals outlined in the State of the Union message have come to Capitol Hill faster than in past years, accompanying legislation has not always been ready. As a result, committee work is just starting.

The Senate's first order of business for the year was to decide on vacation dates. Deliberation since has been confined to civil rights.

A handful of bills have been passed in the House, including the interest disclosure measure passed last year by the Senate. Although the official vacation dates announced in the Senate showed no layoffs for as long as a week, the actual schedule is likely to be more liberal.

The next vacation, for example, is the Easter recess, which is scheduled to last from April 11 to April 17, a Wednesday. If history is any example, activity will not be resumed until April 22, a Monday.

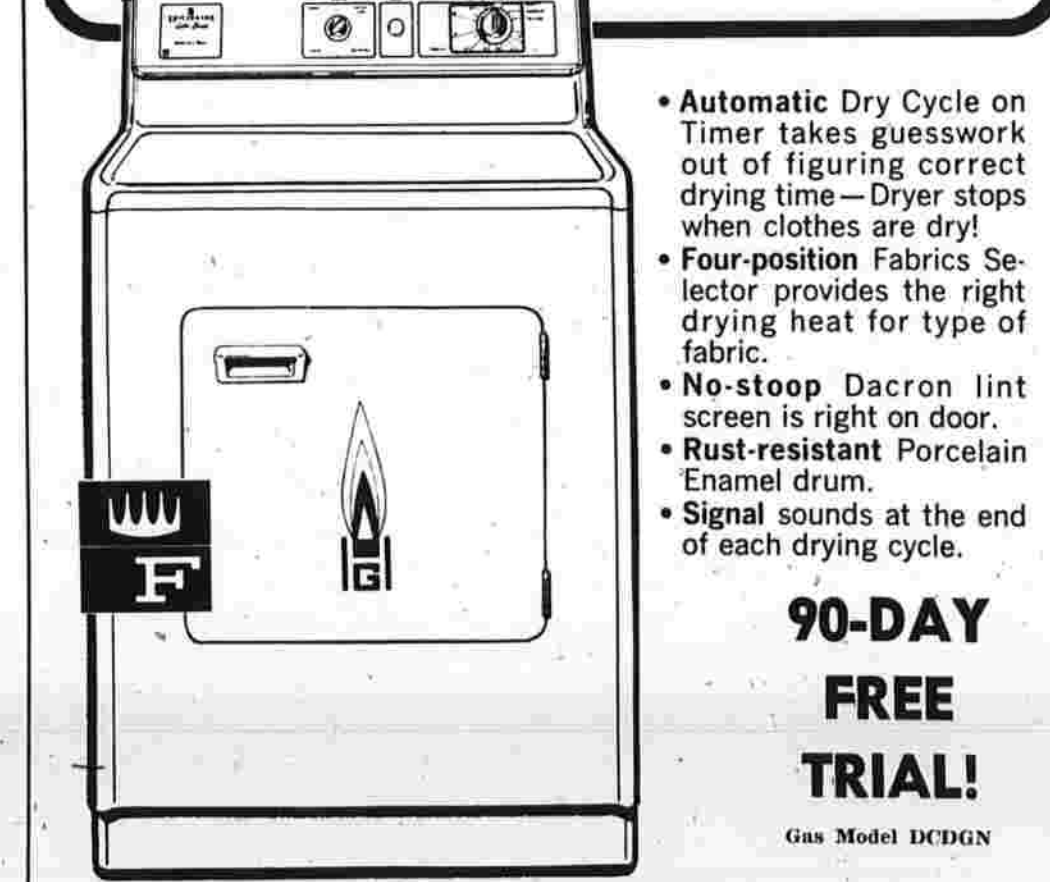

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Meany Seen Betting LBJ Will Accelerate Rebuilding City Slums

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—AFL-CIO President George Meany reportedly is betting that President Johnson—despite Vietnam war problems—will sharply accelerate rebuilding the nation's big city slums this year to ease the threat of new Negro rising.

Meany is very anxious that there should be a massive attack on the ghettoes, an informed labor source said, and he wants the labor movement to take the lead.

Meany, who supports Johnson's war policies, views slum problems as the nation's most pressing homefront crisis and believes the United States can handle both problems, the source said.

This thinking reportedly is behind the new pledges of 18 AFL-CIO construction unions to cooperate fully with federal officials in solving labor problems stemming from the federal model cities program, and to actively recruit more Negroes into the building trades unions.

The 18 construction unions representing some 2.6 million workers have long been the targets of racial bias complaints and charges of dragging their feet in settling labor disputes growing out of plans to rebuild the cities.

"A number of people think the building trades are the proper object of any kind of attack," Meany reportedly told a closed meeting of the AFL-CIO Building and Construction Trades Department.

"Maybe they (construction unions) ought to step right out and take the leadership in this massive attack on urban rehabilitation," informed sources quoted Meany as saying.

Meany is one of three labor members on a White House committee headed by industrialist Edgar Kaiser, appointed to

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Movies Draw on the 'Comics'

The movie industry, with an unquenchable thirst for source material, has turned its lenses once again to the popular comic strip.

Every movie fan worth his price of admission—and over 30—surely recalls when Elodie and Dagwood (remember Penny Singleton and Arthur Lake?) brought the Bumstead family to the big screen in a series of the films running through the late 1940s.

Then there were the old RKO-radio features, "Dick Tracy Versus Cebell," and the Mole Man, "Bill of course, there is the old Batman serials which Columbia put together for a three-hour-plus camp comeback a couple of years ago.

The latest entries which seem to emphasize the strip more than the comic) go by the names "Barbarella," for release next spring, "Diabolik" and "Modesty Blaise." Although these were bred in Europe instead of Dogpatch or Gotham City, the source still is the comic strip.

It is based on a French comic strip by Jean-Claude Forest, made popular by the so-called best generation of Europe, which picked it up as a satire on contemporary society.

The film version of the American movie audiences as the young lover in "The Russian Are Coming" plays Barbarella's guardian angel, Fygar—complete with eight-foot wings.

Law is the hero of another comic strip-based film, "Diabolik," in which he is the death-dealing blackcap thief who helps the weak and destitute with the aid of his trusty—and sexy—companion, Maria Mell.

Again, the film version of the originally Italian comic strip division has in the works a feature-length animated film, "A Boy Named Charles Brown."

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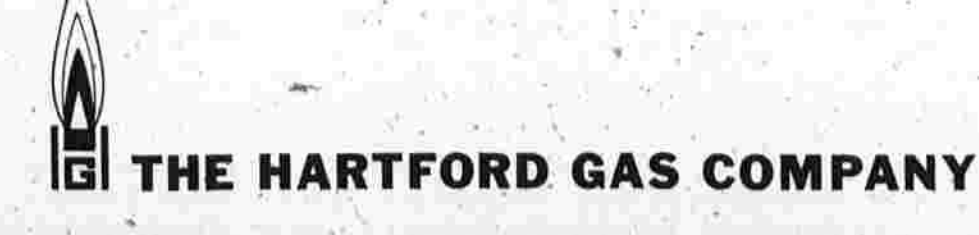

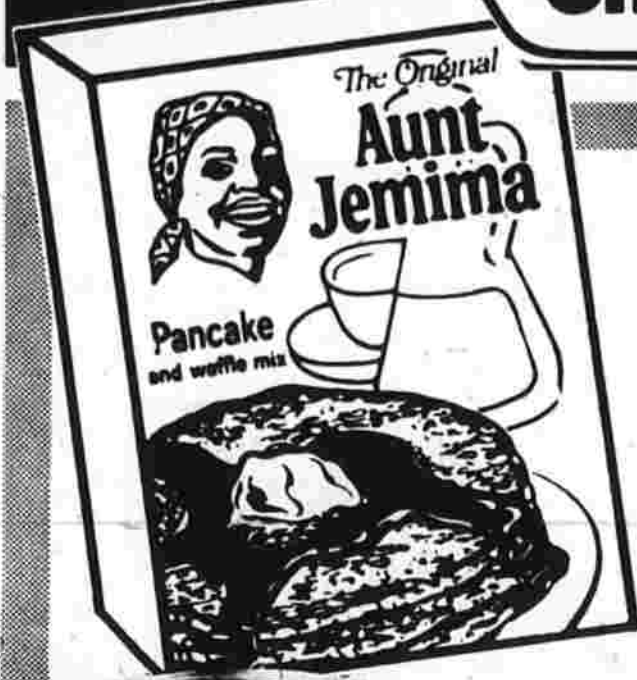

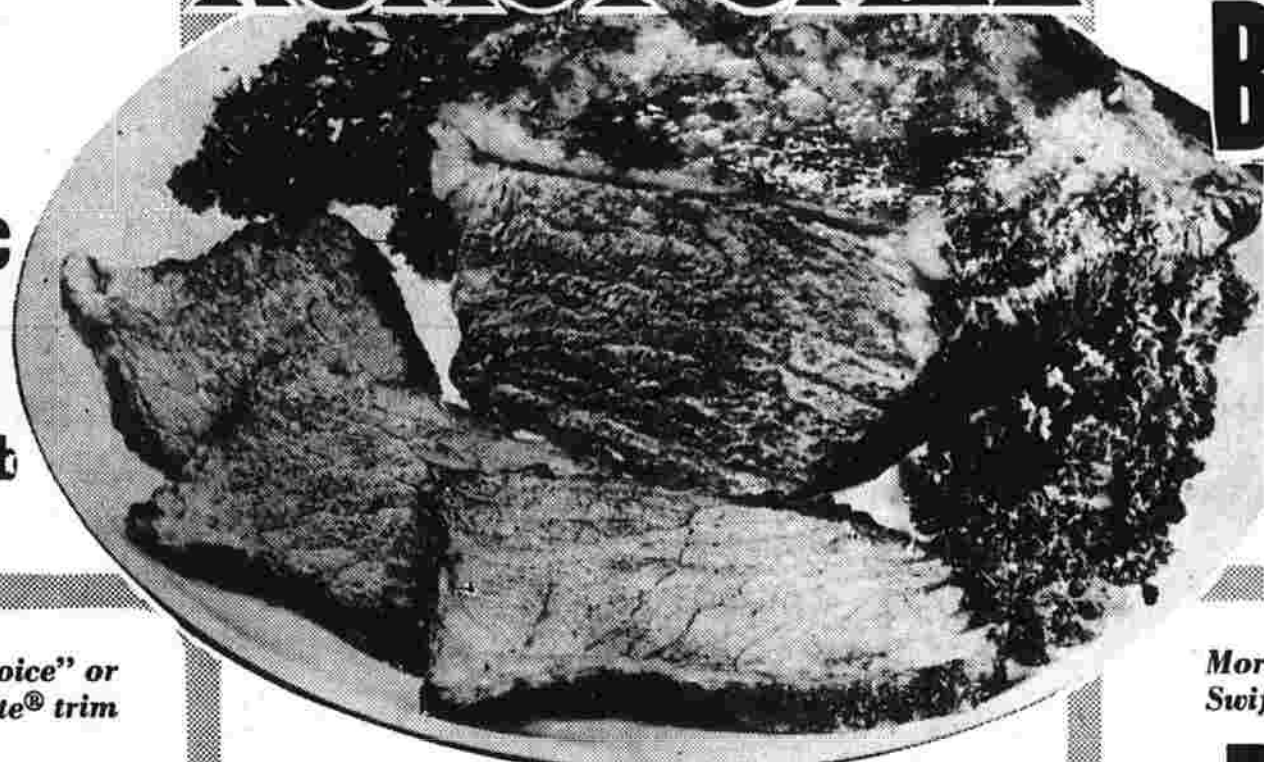

Cuban Seized In Florida Bomb Case

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Police announced today the first arrest of an alleged member of Cuban Power, a mysterious neo-Castro terrorist organization, on a bombing charge. Ricardo Morales Navarrete, arrested in an apartment raid, was charged with placing a bomb Jan. 28 that ripped into the office of a company engaged in shipping packages from Cuban exiles to their homeland.

A spokesman for the police intelligence agency said the husband, Michael Morales, was a member but not the leader of Cuban Power. The officer said other arrests were in prospect.

Cuban Power claimed that it placed a bomb which wrecked a plane Jan. 30 at Miami International Airport. The aircraft was loaded with supplies from exiles to relatives in Cuba.

A typewritten message, signed only by "Ernesto," was sent to news media making this claim. The organization denied blame, however, for other recent bombings in Miami, including the garage of British Consul Francis J. Pelly and the automobile of Mexican Consul Rafael Reyes Spindola.

Cuban Power contended that the commercial shipments fell into the hands of Castro and aided his Communist regime. The U.S. Customs office said 1,000 to 2,000 packages are sent to Cuba by exiles each month. All are routed by way of Mexico, Spain or Canada.

Morales, identified by police as a soldier of fortune who formerly served with the anti-Communist 5th Composite Brigade in Africa, denied any connection with the bombing. In the raid on an apartment in which he lives with his wife and three children, Morales claimed that the police "found nothing." "I am not connected with any bombing or any kind of organization," he said. "If my mother were in Cuba, I would send her things. That is a humanitarian thing. I couldn't be against that." The bombing in which he was charged occurred at Jose Valdes' Servicios Especializados of 1500 E. Flagler Street, in Miami's "Little Havana."

On the same night, the Cuban-owned All Cargo Travel Agency and an American-owned auto repair garage were hit by blasts. Other exile groups said Cuban Power "grew out of exile unhappiness over the lack of U.S. action against Fidel Castro, but most of them deplored the bombing tactics."

Possibility 3 Faked Ill To Transfer

HARTFORD (AP)—Three of the six men who escaped recently from Norwich State Hospital may have faked mental illness to be transferred there from the Hartford State Jail, the state mental health commissioner says.

In the future, said Bloomberg, in the report, no inmates will be accepted from state jails until they have been judged to be "truly mentally ill" by a state psychiatrist.

Bloomberg said one man who later escaped gave evidence of bizarre behavior and hallucinations at the Hartford jail, but during the two days he was at Norwich the symptoms weren't discernable.

Among proposals for tightening security at the hospital, Bloomberg said, were to install an outer steel door in the locked front of elevators in the locked ward buildings and to open another ward in the hospital's maximum security unit to house jail inmates before their illnesses are diagnosed in detail.

The commissioner told Dempsey a complete review of the security at Connecticut Valley Hospital in Middletown is under way.

Dempsey ordered a review of security at Norwich after the fourth patient escaped last week. Norwich residents expressed growing concern over the escapes, which included the kidnapping of a nurse.

In a related development, representatives of state mental hospital employees pleaded for more staff to handle the situation in their wards.

Two psychiatric aides, Mary Didomo and Katherine Leary from Connecticut Valley Hospital cited understaffed conditions. These included instances in which one female worker staffed a ward of 40 male patients including the transfer from maximum security, they said.

Miss Leary said she had been working alone on a ward filled with 34 disturbed females.

They presented their appeal in a talk with Dr. Bloomberg, state personnel commissioner C. Perre Phillips and State Finance Commissioner George J. Conklin.

The two women are members of Council 16, Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO.

Talks Seen 'Useful' By Vance SEOU (AP) — U.S. presidential envoy Cyrus Vance left for Washington today saying his talks with South Korean leaders had been "good and very useful."

Vance promised the South Koreans "immediate consultations" whenever their security is threatened. But he balked at the demand for a pledge of immediate relations with the government and opposition parties were critical.

The official spokesman for the ruling Democratic Republic party said it is "not possible to believe that the contents of the communique would eliminate the people's worries about the American presidential envoy came."

Vance and South Korean President Chung Hee Park would up four days of bargaining sessions with a joint communique which announced the "increasingly aggressive and violent actions of the North Korean Communists over the past 14 months in violation of the armistice agreement."

This indicated that the United States had made some commitment in response to demands for modern arms and equipment, particularly heavy arms. Much of South Korea's arsenal is World War II vintage.

Vance and Park held their second meeting only 2 1/2 hours after the U.S. envoy had emerged from an all-night session with Foreign Minister Choi Kyushik.

Vance and Park pledged that their governments would consult at once to determine what action should be taken under their mutual defense pact if Communist aggression in Vietnam should occur.

They also agreed that the U.S. and South Korean defense ministers would meet annually to discuss security problems.

Park and his aides had tried to convince the United States to commit itself to "immediate military assistance" to the Republic of Korea, in the event of a major Red attack.

Vance arrived here Sunday to smooth U.S.-South Korean relations which were strained by the U.S. response to the North Korean attempt to assassinate President Park Jan. 21, and the seizure of the USS Pueblo two days later.

The South Koreans claimed that the Americans paid more attention to the ship seizure than to the attempt on Park's life and demanded quick action to beef up South Korea's defenses. There was strong criticism of U.S. policy.

Korean sources said Park was still not completely satisfied with the results of Vance's visit. The final communique said: "President Park and Mr. (See Page Thirteen)

Little Research Data Prescription Drug Use Studied

Los Angeles Times — Washington Post News Service "It's sad, man. The people out there dose themselves morning till night with vitamins, aspirin, caffeine, nicotine, diet pills, tranquilizers, cocktails and sleeping tablets. They get worked up because we smoke a little pot."

WASHINGTON — At some time during his life, about one of every two adult Americans has used a prescription drug. Two-thirds of the drug users are women. About three-fourths of the drugs consumed are tranquilizers.

These are among preliminary findings of a new, large-scale government study of the extent to which Americans rely on prescription drugs.

The massive project, sponsored by the National Institute of Mental Health, also aims to determine the nature of the ordinary emotional problems of the people, the ways they cope with them and their attitudes toward drug use, by themselves and others.

Research has generated vast amounts of data on the use and abuse of narcotics, psychotropic drugs and other substances obtained on the illegal market by a relatively small number of people. Comparatively little is known, however, about the far more widespread consumption of chemicals that are lawfully prescribed. The study is a significant segment of the population.
