Talks Seen 'Useful' By Vance

SEOUL (AP) — U.S. presidential envoy Cyrus Vance left for Washington today saying his talks with South Korean leaders had been "good and very fruitful."

Vance promised the South Koreans "immediate consultations" whenever their security is threatened. But he balked at the demand for a pledge of immediate relations with the government and opposition parties were critical.

The official spokesman for the ruling Democratic Republican party said it is his belief that the contents of the communique would eliminate the people's worst fears about the American presidential envoy came.

Vance and South Korean President Chung Hee Park would have four days of bargaining sessions with a joint communique which announced the "increasingly aggressive and violent actions of the North Korean Communists over the past 14 months in violation of the armistice agreement."

Vance and Park pledged that their governments would consult at once to determine what action should be taken under their mutual defense pact if Communist aggression in Vietnam should occur.

At a news conference, Romney also took a look at New York City's garbage strike. He said "there are things you could do to get the city out of the garbage crisis."

### Court Affirms Decision in Fainrui Suit

NEW YORK (AP)—A three-judge federal court has ruled to reverse a lower federal court ruling that Fainrui Bearing Co. of New Britain, Conn., infringed on two patents of a revolutionary Teflon-coated ball bearing which needs no lubrication.

The U.S. Court of Appeals unanimously affirmed Wednesday the decision made Dec. 4, 1966 by U.S. District Judge T. Emmett Clarke that the firm infringed on patents owned by Charles White of Palmdale, Calif.

White, an inventor, and his firm, American Metal Products Co. of Detroit, Mich., brought suit against Fainrui.

Judge Clarke ruled that the patent holder had to prove to worth millions of dollars, belong to White.

PICK RIGHT TIME TO GIVE UP TRICK

One of the great advantages of stopping at a small slam is that you can afford to give up one trick. All you have to do is choose the right trick and by right time, but you may have to take a second look at some hands.

The whole thing is as significant as last week's weather report, a substantial plot. Whenever a hint of more than the superficial sneaks in, off we go on wild tangents or bit of hilarious stage business.

The sustained appeal derives from Simon's shrewdly devilish observance of contemporary behavior and the Nichols knack for securing dialogue with a suave, improbable action.

In "Visitor from Manhattan," Scott and Miss Stapleton thrash out the precarious concerns of 23 years of marriage. "Visitor from Hollywood" concerns a confrontation of a pair of high school romantics 17 years later. The final item, "Visitor from Forest Hills," turns out to be an ultimate slay-off of a couple's frenzied efforts to get their suddenly reluctant daughter wedded.

Right about here there is a temptation to offer samples of the buffoonery that kept first-nighters in a state of sustained guffaw. But what you should do is see and hear for yourself.

Rounding out the precision assets are sharp little vignettes by the trio of supporting performers, Claudette Nevins, Bob Balaban and Jose Ocasio. Oliver Smith's smart setting and the attractive costumes provided by Patricia Ziprod, particularly for Miss Stapleton.

Persons feel guilty about taking pills that free them from their customary tensions or anxieties. So intense is this feeling among some persons that they refuse to take drugs even while their doctors strongly recommend it.

Balter believes this attitude may stem from the so-called Puritan Ethic which has always pervaded American society — the notion that any good experience one has must somehow be paid for.

Although both Levine and Balter condemn indiscriminate drug-taking, they point out that in almost all cases, a person receives a drug because his doctor feels he should have it, and that doctors are in the best position to know their patients' needs.

There is, of course, the danger that, having obtained his prescription, a patient may abuse it—that he may exceed the prescribed dose, either for "kick" or to believe that he can obtain greater or speedier relief.

Whether this actually happens or not with any frequency, no one really knows. It is one of many questions the study needs to answer.

On the basis of preliminary data, Balter thinks that, on the whole, people are conservative in doing themselves—that they

### Cut Your Own Taxes—12 Mortgage, Loan Interest Deductible on Tax Return

By RAY DE CRANE

THE value of home ownership is readily apparent to income tax time. All those interest payments made on your mortgage during 1967 and all the year estate tax payments made last year are fully deductible on your tax return.

In addition to interest paid on a mortgage, you may deduct all interest paid on home improvements loans, personal loans from banks and credit unions, auto purchase loans and installment purchase.

Not all the purchase charge on installment loans is deductible. To arrive at the hidden interest charge, total all your monthly payments for the year, divide the total by 12 to learn the average unpaid balance and multiply that figure by 6 per cent. This will give you the interest you may list as a deduction.

Where payments are made over a period longer than one year then only the proportionate interest in 1967 is deductible. For example, a 24-month auto loan will have the total amount of interest added to the original balance. If you make six payments on the loan last year you may claim only one-sixth of the total interest charged.

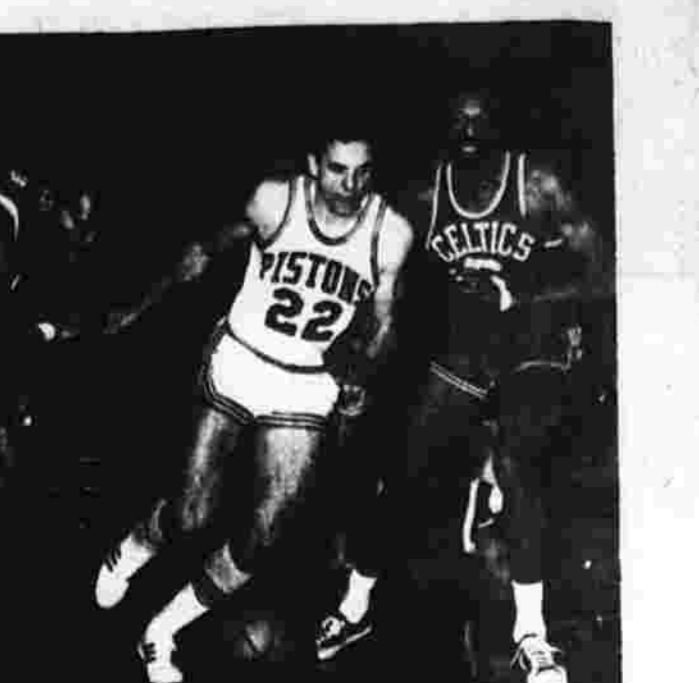
