

### Secret Pentagon Report

# Bombing North Vietnam Is Not Paying Off

SANTA MONICA, Calif.-(NEA)-The Pentagon has had in its possession, for slightly more than a year, a report stating that continued bombing of North Vietnam is of doubtful value from an economic and political standpoint. This report has just been declassified and its contents are being revealed here for the first time.

It was made by Dr. Oleg Hoeffding of the economic department of the Rand Corporation. His research into the economic and political effects of the bombing, sponsored by the Department of Defense, also suggests that there has not been a decisive reduction in the level of infiltration of men and supplies from north to south. "Although the bombing in North Vietnam," he writes,

raised the cost of infiltration, the level of infiltration has not been reduced sufficiently to prevent North Vietnam from helping to maintain a combat force in the south strong enough deny the prospect of a decisive military victory to the United States and its allies in the foreseeable future." The report, dated December 1966, is titled, "Bombing North Vietnam—An Appraisal of Economic and Political Effects."

It is a 35-page document which delves deeply into the subject, from every conceivable angle. Hoeffding is a specialist on the Soviet economy and an expert in propaganda analysis. In his conclusion, Hoeffding writes: "It becomes increasingly doubtful that the advantages of continuation or intensification of the (bombing) attacks out-

weigh the potential net gains from cessation or, at least, drastic and demonstrative de-escalation." (Hoeffding's position today, more than a year later, remains unchanged. He states now: "My own feeling is that my report has stood up fairly well. Escalation of the bombing has occurred and the effects-or lack of effects-have been what

Hoeffding directed his report toward answering two basic

questions: Has the bombing of North Vietnam had any appreciable effect on "the physical and organizational func ioning of North Vietnam as an economy and political entity?" And has the bombing had any effect in inducing Hanoi "to agree to negotiations, on initial terms acceptable to the

Hoeffding says throughout his report that the level of U.S. bombing has not been as great as Hanoi expected-or said it expected. Thus, the North Vietnamese have been-and areprepared for more severe attacks than they have yet under-

In terms of evacuations, diversion of the labor force to emergency repair work and training programs, Hanoi was ready for a great amount of destruction. It never materialized at least not to the degree that had been anticipated. Even if they had been bombed as heavily as they professed to expect, Hoeffding says, the effects would not have been catastrophic. For example, he writes that Hanoi diverted as much as 15-to-20 per cent of the agricultural labor force into war-related activities. Despite this, North Vietnamese agricul-

ture-and it is an agricultural country-has not suffered The country is continuing (or was, at the time the report was written) with such nonmilitary efforts as a large-scale program to expand irrigated acreage and a major program of resettling the rural population to less densely settled areas. Outgoing Defense Secretary Robert McNamara in his fina

message to Congress on the nation's defense posture reflected certain aspects of the Rand report when he said: "The agrarian nature of the (North Vietnamese) economy precludes economic collapse as a result of the bombing. More over, while we can make it more costly in time and manpower, it is difficult to conceive of any interdiction campaign that would pinch off the flow of military supplies to the south

as long as combat requirements remain at anything like the current low levels." Hoeffding says that Hanoi has learned to deal with the bombing attacks and suggests that a sizable portion of its war-essential manufacturing capacity has been moved "beyond the effective reach of any but the most indiscriminate end wasteful air attacks."

As to the matter of civilian casualties from the bombings Hoeffding says, in effect, that Hanoi could not have asked fo a better situation than that which developed. The U.S. combers exercised restraint-the casualty level is below World War II and Korean war levels-and yet there have been enough civilian casualties to keep the population's anti-

American feeling high. "In terms of its moral effects," he says, "the U.S. campaign may have presented the (Hanoi) regime with a nearideal mix of intended restraint and accidental gore." He believes that North Vietnam can withstand a long war, and that its allies-China and Russia-can continue to supply t with military and economic aid, no matter how severe the

bombing might get. "Hanoi's calculation," he says, "is that the United States will be unable completely to deny access overland to aid from or via China, and unwilling to deny access to aid delivered by sea." In summation, Hoeffding writes:

"The bombing specifically has produced enough incidental damage and civilian casualties to assist the North Vietnamese (government) in maintaining anti-American militancy, and not enough to be seriously depressing or disaffecting." As to any escalation of the bombing: "It appears likely that further escalation of the air-war

would involve the United States in increasingly serious conflict between the quest for greater effectiveness . . . and the credibility of the U.S. stance of asserted restraint in targets and objectives. It all adds up, in Hoeffding's view, to the doubtful value of the bombing. It remains to be seen when-or if-the







One thing, however, has not changed. This is the fact that nonconformity is still dreaded by the majority of Americans or at least those who have attained what is commonly called the "age of reason." It is a rather sad commentary on our

society that the word "egregious," which originally denoted something "good," someone or something that stood out from the ordinary - actually apart from the herd or flock-has degenerated into a term of opprobrium.

At any rate it is now considered an egregious fault for anyone to wear his hair long or to adopt a Byronic pose, faults we tend to find exclusively in the younger generation. We worry about these young "rebels" with whom "nothing can be done." We worry too much, perhaps needlessly. For, if we stopped to consider the matter seriously, we would come to know that most of them are not "rebels" at all, that they, too, feel the need to conform to the standthe same "uniform," to share the same -to us-vulgar taste in so-called popu-

True rebellion, of course, does not depend upon outward show. Thomas Mann, though decorous in dress and manner, was an intellectual rebel. As Nathaniel Hawthorne put it in describing the herome of "The Scarlet Letter": "It is remarkable that persons who speculate the most boldly often conform with the most perfect quietude to the external regulations of society. The thought suffices them, without investing itself in the flesh

and blood of action." Too soon our immature young "rebels": will grow up, will exchange their present conformity for a new one. That, at least, is the way it has always happened. And, in a way, it is a pity. Let us not, then, take them too seriously. Let them wear their badge of seeming nonconformity while they may .- WATERBURY
