dous development purports to trace the department's progress, over the years, in this particular service. Being able to get a duplicate license in five seconds will, the department announcement says, be much speedier than the present system, under which

it takes a motorist five days to get a duplicate license - a time span now made necessary by processing and mailing time which the new computeroperated, remote-control typewriter will

The five day time span now required to get a duplicate license is, the story eveals, itself an historic improvement over the two week wait that used to be standard before the department began to employ the devices of the electronic

You can believe all this, if you choose. But would you, perhaps on the basis of some personal experience with the occasional berserk trend of the computer age, be willing to believe that the real and accurate order of the time progression might be something reversed? Would you believe that sometimes the ultra-sophisticated computer bureaucracy can take two weeks to deliver what the first elemental office mechanizations could produce in five days and what, before electronics even existed, ordinary human talent could produce and deliver on any single visit to the

office in question? Which way does the progression really nead-from two weeks to five days to five seconds, or from one day to five days to two weeks? We do not invite testimony from peo-

ple who have had personal experiences. We do not want to be swamped under a flood of anecdotes, all of which would be on the disillusioned side of the story.
