Although we have already dropped on that small country more bombs than we dropped in all of World War II, our targets have been communications, storage, industrial and military facilities, and we have been able to refrain from the direct destruc-

tion of cities as such. The Tet offensive by the Vietcong in South Vietnam has, however, drawn us into the direct use of all our most terrible fire power - air, land, and sea against South Vietnamese cities. When we leveled one of these cities, the explanation of our officer was that we had to destroy it in order to save it. As we are currently laying waste various areas of Saigon, calling down bombs on the city which is the very center of our own presence in Southeast Asia, we are doing it because we can't seem to rout out the Vietcong without such use of all

our fire power. As we destroy the ancient city of Hue, it is because that is the only way we know to deny possession and use of the city to the Victoria.

All this seems, to many observers, the last climactic insanity of our conduct in Vietnam. It does not matter that there happen to be some native South Vietnamese who go along with us in military strategy. Nor does it matter that the Vietcong, by taking their war into the cities, have confronted us with the situation which makes us feel we must destroy the cities we are trying

What matters is that the guns and planes and napalm and tanks and uniforms which are doing all this are ours. What matters is that, if there ever was any slight chance that American power and policy might obtain some kind of victory in Vietnam, that chance has now been lost forever. From our own hope of being the most civilized and helpful of outside presences ever to be in Vietnam, we have now progressed to the point where we are certain to have the reputation, with the very people we want to help, of being the most ruthless and savage invaders in all the long history of the country. That is how deep and how terrible our tragedy in Vietnam is becoming. And that is why, in mercy to ourselves as well as in mercy to the people we want to help, we should give total welcome, rather than uneasy resentment, to any third party efforts to steer this war toward truce and cease-fire and negotiation, why Secretary General Thant should be considered potentially the most valuable man in the world for us.

The Prisoner Pawns

The clash between the American peace advocates who were summoned to Hanot to take custody of the three American pilots being released by North Vietnam and the American State and Detense Departments was inevitable.

The professor and the priest who went to Hanoi were eligible for that honor because they are headline members of the American peace movement. Hanoi intended to give them prominence; Hanoi expected in return, to have its own gesture in freeing these three American pilots receive its maximum favorable propaganda exposure.

The moment the professor and priest and the three pilots came within reach of American officialdom, however, that officialdom had an official order for the three pilots. It was for them to leave their two pacifist custodians, and make the rest of their journey to the United States under the custody of the military services to which, they were reminded, they still belonged. This left Professor Howard Zinn of Boston University and the Rev. Daniel Berrigan of Cornell high and dry without their prized human exhibits; it threw an official protection

around the three pilots to keep then from careless interviews or public appearances with the wrong people. It hushed down public attention to the great humanity Hanoi was claiming fo

In all this, natural instincts were being revealed. American officialdom to put it bluntly, would probably have preferred not to have such a symbolic propaganda release of just three prison ers take place. When it did take place, that same officialdom had to hope that the pilots in question had not gone soft and abandoned the proper code for American military men taken prisoner in order to win special consideration from the enemy. If there were evidence the pilots had even tacitly cooperated with the enemy, our officialdom had to be ready with the theory that they had been brainwashed into it, and ready to see that the first thing that happened to them on their return was prompt exposure to a remedial brain bath.

The two pacifist leaders naturally had to be disappointed, first because State and Defense Department strategy cut them and their own symbolism out of the picture, second because they felt that such tactics would close off the possibility of more pilot releases by North In the midst of such events, and such

an instinctive clash of interests, the most

delicate and moving plight seems to us that of the three pilots themselves. Perhaps, in their prison ordeal, they did weaken. Perhaps they did realize that their own Defense Department would have preferred them to so conduct themselves as to discourage any North Vietnamese kindness and would, indeed, have preferred to have them refuse their own freedom. Perhaps, nonetheless, they could not resist behaving in a way which would heighten their chances of good treatment there and their chances of getting home ahead of their fellow prisoners. Perhaps they themselves can see and sense, in the eyes and bearing of those who have greeted them back home, the unpleasant ques tions about manhood and loyalty nobody will ever ask openly. And yet perhaps, all the way through, their own conduc was actually exemplary, and they were nothing but completely innocent pawns in Hanol's game of propaganda chess. That, we think, is the possibility that ought to govern both official and public attitude. We cannot afford to be less considerate and humane to our own pilots than was the nation they were bombing

Actually, on the record, it might prove to be that Washington was the first and last chief executive whose candor and probity were as strict as the cherry tree legend-if, that is, the historians are still willing to agree that even he didn't occasionally allow a life to some easy assumption a little short of the absolute truth. But, in some degree of orgiveness for all his successors, he was also the one President who didn't have to live by the political game. Admitting the frequent temptations and apparent necessities of that game, we still have no ideal more precious and universal than that of a leadership which is so genuinely honest with itself it could not possibly play even partially false with
