# North Viet Repelled at Causes of Riots Cited

# Khe Sanh

KHE SANH, Vietnam (AP)-More than 500 North Vietnamese soldiers attacked the Khe Sanh combat base through the fog before dawn today. They got to the barbed wire ring around the base before they were driven back with at least 70 of their men killed.

The Red infantrymen charged behind three sapper platoons in the attack on the base's eastern perimeter, which is held by a battalion of 500 crack South Vietna-

mese Rangers. A flight of the U.S. Air Force's huge B52 bombers, Thieu Bid flying in direct support of ground troops for the first time in the war, dropped tons of ex-plosives only 750 yards in front of the Rangers' lines. For Power

WASHINGTON (AP)-A presidential commission demands compassionate, massive and sustained efforts -perhaps costing more money than the Vietnam war -to end the destruction and bitterness wrought by racial disorder in America's cities.

"Our nation is moving toward two societies, one black, one white-separate, and equal," declared the President's Commission on Civil Disorders. It condemned white racism as a central cause and warned:

"If we are heedless none of us shall escape thec onsequences." Unless immediate action is taken, the commission said, "large-scale and continuing violence could result, followed by white retaliation, and, ultimately, the separation of the two communities into a garrison

Shopkeepers shuttered their stores. Passers-by and lower grade school children fled to shelter in terror as the disorders spread.

Students screaming, "Revolution! Revolution!" bombarded police with paving stones ripped up from the streets. They overturned and set fire to police cars and buses. Ambulances with sirens screaming raced through the streets. It was the most violent clash

#### The Race Narrows

Governor George Romney of Michigan once had the advantage of seeming the cleanest, freshest Republican talent on ... the national scene. He is still, after an unhappy year of jousting with the press and with himself, one of the most genuine articles the party has. But some of ...., the elements of his genuineness, his relatively unsophisticated devotion to the simplest virtues, his corny mixture of the revival meeting and the corner store counter talk, his intense earnestness have somehow not transferred themselves to the national scene in the same way which has made them assets in his own state of Michigan.

Now that he himself has acknowledged that failure, and done the strategic thing which he considers best for he Republican party, he is likely to find his esteem and reputation in the nation . on the way up again. There are, indeed, likely to be many moments in the future of both party and nation when Romney may look awfully good, in theoretical comparison.

In withdrawing from the race, Governor Romney obviously intended to open the way for a potentially more efctive moderate Republican, namely Sovernor Nelson Rockefeller of New York, to enter the race openly in time to deal with the growing threat that former Vice President Richard Nixon would have it won before the national convention even assembles.

The Romney withdrawal is, in fact, timed to try to draw away from Nixon some of the benefit he seemed about to gain from a poll-predicted victory over omney in the New Hampshire primary March 12. Now Nixon's victory there, if it materializes as predicted, will be over a candidate who has already withdrawn, but not over the candidate who is going to take his place in the relay. With Nixon's expected victories in New Hampshire and Wisconsin thus partially discounted in advance, Rockefeller could achieve at least a primary stalemate by winning the Oregon contest in

And beyond the primaries, of course, the Romney withdrawal is aimed at giving a Rockefeller organization time to work on state delegations not being influenced by primaries. The obvious hope is that, this time, in 1968, the moderate, liberal wing of the party will concentrate its drive and support for one man, instead of wasting it among several, and not lose again by its own divisions. And in its appeal it will try to reach

into all areas of the party, including the most conservative, with the pragmatic theory that, although some Republicans may love Nixon, they should love Rockefeller's obvious better chance of winning the more.

The Republican party is, it now seems, in for a re-play of its 1952 contest between Taft and Elisenhower. It is to be hoped that, for the good of the party and the country, both of these 1968 replace ments develop character and stature comparable to those of the late great conservative Ohio Senator, of the great Eisenhower of the Presidency.

#### **Can Nations Avoid Power Politics?**

We who believe power politics balance of power games are sheer folly should at least attempt, now and then, to figure out how, if we were heads of state, we would cope with specific situations which invite everybody with power to play the game.

The usual formula advanced-in op position to the practice of big power games-is one for collective security inside world law, such as the world !aw of the United Nations ought to be, and would have a real chance of being if the world's greatest nations would surrender some of their own sovereignty to the international organization.

But not all the actions or situations of the power politics game can be fitted easily into even the theoretical framework of the collective security kind of world law. There is, for instance, no existing in-

ternational law, nor even a suggestion that there ought to be an international law, which would forbid the freedom of the seas to the navy of any nation. Yet one of the great visible power

politics maneuvers of the moment, oven in this modern, nuclear world, concerns. the bold, challenging use of freedom of the seas being made in the Eastern end of the Mediterranean Sea.

What is going on in the Mediterranean is regrettable, but it is real. And it is legal. The United States Sixth Fleet is in the Mediterranean as one replacement for and successor to the British fleet which used to circle the globe. And, last June, Russian naval units have been in the Mediterranean too, sticking their prows into the paths of American units, and signaling, not only to our ships but to all the nations watching around the shore, the presence in the Mediterranean of Soviet Russia as a big power playing a big power role. Should the United States have decided,

at the time it became apparent Britain was going to fade out of its long imperialistic role, to let the Mediterranean become a power vacuum? Has it been the United States presence there which has challenged and emboldened Russia to steam down and join' the game? Or would Russia have come down much sooner and much more insolently if we hadn't decided to be there all along? How do you stop playing the game of power politics when you have no way of knowing that the other fellow is going to stop playing it too?

Within the present context of world conditions, world law, and the standards of conduct which seem necessary to the rulers of nations, there are no good or easy answers to the questions we have been asking.

The only real answer you get is the answer of what happens. What happens is that both the United States and the Russian fleets are irresistibly drawn to the sea from which they can see the British fleet withdrawing. This, after all, is what fleets are built and operated

What would we do, if we were a ruler of state? Probably conclude we had no choice but to send our fleet where the confrontation is.

Is there, then, no answer, no cure? There is cure and answer, but it is fundamental, not incidental, and it requires change in laws and institutions, not merely a wistful effort to change human behavior under existing laws and institutions.

The answer has been posed often enough in theory. It is to reduce national armaments so that great powers don't have great fleets to play with any more and to create for the United Nations a United Nations police force which possesses the only real major armaments left legal in the world. Under such a system, the only major show of military force in the Eastern end of the Mediteranean could be one United Nations gunboat which would have more fire power than the Russian and United States navies and all the armies of the little nations of the Near East combined.

## Goddard's Reluctant Testimony

missioner of Food and Drugs, is an official who struggles to maintain sanity in an area where nobody else wants it. He admitted it to be a losing battle when he appeared before that Congressional subcommittee the other day and testified, reluctantly, in favor of the provision in the stiff new drug control bill which would make it a federal crime to be in possession of any of the modern drugs. He so testified, he said, because the administration of which he is a part, including the President of his country, have decided that such a proposal is necessary in order to make the provisions of the bill enforceable against any-

But he still insisted on stating his own point of view, which is "that it would be unwise to provide penalties which might mark a large number of young people just entering adulthood as criminals because they were found in possession of a small amount of drugs for personal use."

In making this reservation, Dr. Goddard is not being motivated by any tolerance for the use of drugs, but by his memory of the futility of prohibition. laws, and by his idea of the kind of atmosphere in which the best war against drugs can be waged. He would have nociety spend its energy not in having the law slap criminal penalties on individual users, but in educating all potential users to the fact that the worst possible penalty for using drugs lies in the effects of the drugs themselves. So far as penalties by the law itself are concerned, he would have them re-

stricted to those who traffic in drugs and profit from the degradation of other human beings. Dr. Goddard might obtain some com-

fort from the fact that it was his kind of view which prevailed in the new drug addiction law adopted by the 1967 session of the Connecticut General Assembly, although not without protest and opposition from that point of view which seems to have made Dr. Goddard its prisoner at Washington.


