Our Own Advice Turned Round There were Americans who suffered with France through its agonies in both Vietnam and in Algeria. And not a small share of the advice and counsel Americans offered from the sidelines was devoted to the idea that in Algeria France was engaged in a hopelessly brutal struggle it could never hope to win and could solve only by negotiation with the

Algerian revolutionists. Mout American interest in the Algerian problem turned to applause when Charles de Gaulle, brought back to power in a coup by militarists who thought he would lead them to a firm, victorious solution in Algeria, gradually turned himself and the militarists around until he produced negotiations which resulted in the French withdrawal from Algeria, followed by French withdrawal from the rest of its erstwhile empire in Africa. This was appraised as the summit accomplishment of de Gaulle's career. The late John F. Kennedy, when still a Senator, built character and reputation for himself with a notable speech in which he advocated policies for France similar to those which de Gaulle

subsequently succeeded in putting into Today the America which cheered when de Gaulle got out of Algeria, the his courage for liberating both France and Algeria from the mutual torture in which they had been locked together, stands itself locked into similar torture with another French colony, that of

And today the French, who heard, and sometimes resented, but finally took our advice both with regard to Vietnam and Algeria, are on the sidelines watching us. Sometimes, one hopes, they under stand some of the involuntary nature of the agony in which we find ourselves imprisoned. But mainly they are favoring us not with sympathy, but with advice. The advice they offer us in Vietnam is quite similar to the advice we offered them in Vietnam and Algeria. They tell us we are fighting a war we can't win even though we have military resources beyond what the French had They advise us to negotiate an honorable withdrawal, before all the rest of the world is drawn into the terrible maelstrom we are churning up in Southeast Asla.

Advice of this sort is never too welcome, for anybody, no matter what its source. When we were advising France to get out of its colonies, there were Frenchmen who strongly suspected that we and our CIA intended to move in as successors to the French. And when France gives us advice today, there are Americans who think France is doing it out of sour grape resentment over the fact that we have moved into territory we wouldn't help the French hold for themselves.

In addition to all this past history, and past advice. President de Gaulle has developed a number of policy and oratorical lines which are superficially anti-America, and it has become fashionable in America to classify de Gaulle as an

### Pitkin Street Needs A Light Another accident at East Center St and Pitkin St. suggests that our traffiuthorities take another look at this location, with a new consideration of the dvisability of traffic light there.

Both for motorists who may b strange to the road, or to those who know it familiarly, this is a sudden stretch of highway on which, due to the absence of any visible sign of approach ing traffic lights, there is apparently some kind of invitation to relax, either by taking one's mind off the chore of driving, or by putting one's foot more heavily on the accelerator.

A traffic signal light at the diagonal Pitkin-Cone location would not only serve to eliminate this sudden speed fling from driving on East Center St., but would also be a welcome assist to traffic trying to enter or cross East Center St. from either Pitkin or Cone.

If our traffic authorities take to plead ing that they already have enough traffic lights on East Center St., we would agree. But that does not mean they are in the right location.

There are too many traffic lights, too intricately timed, down at the Center There, by giving motorists split second opportunities to get through their light with any particular cycle, the complicated multiplicity of lights forces motorists to resort to sudden violent bursts of speed, often complicated by the fact that they find themselves in the wrong inne for use of the signal they need to follow in such a hurry if they are going to get through it on one try.

But a single signal, out at the Pitkin it. location, would slow traffic down in harmony with the uniform pace dictated by the existing lights at Lenox St. and it the Green, and contribute to the peace and safety of the route. The location ought to be re-surveyed, in the light of the kind of accident experience and near accident experience which has been recurrent there.
