The Wicked Dove, Wall Streeet Here are a few Wall Street comments, culled from interviews by the Wall Street Journal, on the subject of what peace in Vietnam could mean.

"Peace in Vietnam would produce tramatic upsurge in the market-a psychological explosion that would push the Dow-Jones industrial average over 1.000. Instead of throwing government dollars down a rat hole, they could be spent more beneficially on the rebuilding of slums, highway construction, urban transit and on the neglected space program."

"The market really doesn't have any problem, relax the monetary situation,

"Peace would cool down inflation significantly, ease the balance-of-payments problems now that aren't related to the remove the need for a tax increase and eliminate the threat of economic controls. Not only would the threat of a tax increase be removed, but before too long a tax reduction probably would be pos-

"It's a myth that war has to be fol lowed by a recession, particularly in this day of a government-managed "Most basic industries would welcome

'Strange as it may seem, in view of the faster tempo of the war, there is a definite prejudice against stocks with a

national-defense emphasis. All these quotations from men high in the finance-experting field are presented by the Wall Street Journal in the course of a news article which begins with the statement that "one of the more impressive demonstrations of anti-war feeling is under way these days in about the last place that peace marchers would look for it-Wall Street.

"It's a demonstration without banners slogans, or draft-card burnings. But it's unmistakable. On the increasingly rare occasions that rumors of Vietnam peace negotiations circulate, stock prices go up sharply-and that's the only time they do go up. Whenever the fighting intensifies or threatens to intensify, investors sell shares in enough volume to produce a sharp break."

This anti-war sentiment President Johnson will, sooner or later, probably describe as unpatriotic and profitselfish. He may eventually glory in pronouncing that Wall Street is one of the domestic enemies who are adding to the

weight of the cross he has to bear. But some of the rest of us may content ourselves simply with the pleased observation that it is possible for even big money to have some intelligent selfinterest, which usually has to include some humanity.

Impulse To Wash His Hands? We don't know whether the world would run if everybody started acting the same way, as if principle meant something, but then we aren't quite sure that we can proclaim that the world has been well run up to date, with its general habit of smothering principle whenever it seems to mean something speci-

In any case, we welcome, as an experimental novelty, the actual decision of one particular scientist not to play a part any longer in service to causes and purposes in which he himself does not

This particular scientist is Professor George B. Kistiakowsky (all important professors, since the Kennedy era, have had names beginning with K) of Harvard. He is a veteran of the White Army's war against the Bolsheviks, a chemist, an adviser to three Presidents, and an inventor of explosives, a role in which he was one of the scientists father to the atomic bomb.

And what Prof. Kistiakowsky has now done is to end his 20 year service as a consultant to the Defense Department because he disapproves of the kind of war it is fighting in Vietnam.

For a scientist to withhold his genius from whatever uses other men and other authorities may choose to make of its products is a course of action frequently discussed as a possible ideal, but seldom followed in anybody's actual practice.

alty to what he fancies may be moral ity and principle is that it is neither the duty nor the privilege of the scientist to determine what use mankind may make of the products of his own genius. When he perfects a more powerful explosive, he is merely following the path and the dictates of pure science. If somebody takes this explosive and uses it t slaughter half of mankind, that is that somebody's action and responsibility. Sesides, if one scientist doesn't perfec the new and more powerful explosive, some other scientist will, and he, who knows, might put it into the hands of somebody else who would use it first. All this comfortable, impressive rationalization has been shrewdly developed, in these years of apocalyptic showdown for mankind, in order to make it possible for good men who are scientists to be able to live with themselves, no matter what use other men may be making of their products.

But once in a while there is a scientist who discovers that all this rationalization doesn't quite satisfy some troublesome inner part of himself, and who then decides that he, at least, wants to try to begin to wash his own hands to act as if the thing designed for evil use might also be evil in itself. We suspect the world can't afford too many such tender, sensitive spirits. But we would say that, at the moment, civilization has so much destructive invention already stockpiled it can afford to pretend it doesn't notice Kistiakowsky's impulsive sabbatical.

Too Many Flags

Last week I was remarking on the failure of mass communication to improve understanding between governments and the governed. There is an even more disconcerting paradox in the failure of a world-wide system of telecommunications to create a feeling o belonging to one world. Here we all are in Marshall McLa han's electronic global village, with the instant transfusion of news and pictures direct to the living room. Ours is a brand-new world of allatonceness, of the simultaneous happening, says McLuhan. Electronic technology is reshaping our lives in patterns of social interdepend-

ense, fashioning unification and involvement on a global scale bringing to an end economic and political parochialism. Is it? The media bring to me a very different message, no soothing massage. The electronics in my living room and in my office report a breakneck retreat into nationalism, insularity, and isolationism. France blocks the unity of Europe. Biafra breaks the unity of Nigeria. tland and Wales send nationalist MPs to Westminster. The British are old it is unpatriotic to travel abroad and so, too, are the Americans. What is currently going on in the Faroes I for.

The forces that disrupt our global vil lage are evidently stronger than the communications that bind it together ndeed, the antagonisms between Us and Them seem to have been sharpened by knowing more about each other. To see Them on the television screen is just as kely to excite envy or hatred as broth erly love, and the transistor revolution has made sure that the Have Nots know just what it is that Haves have. That is one of the roots of conflict in a world that is still far from being one world but it is not a full explanation. The cause of the most destructive conflict is nationalism and the nation State. The communications pundits have not reck oned with ethology, the science of man as an animal, a naked ape. Like other animals, we are told, man is territory conscious and, organized in groups, will turn out intruders or attack on threat of intrusion.

Instant communications aggravate th sense of threat, and inflame the collective feelings of the group. Overcrowd ing also makes the group more aggres sive, which is one certain consequence of the population explosion that is already upon us. Given that some human groups are nation States armed with nuclear weapons, the outlook is cataclys-

If man is the kind of animal the ethol ogists say he is, then I should say the rospects are hopeless, and the technology is merely hastening his self-extinction. However, I do not believe this because human history amply demonstrates that man is something very different: to use an arguable term, man is a spiritual being with free will to make moral choices and the intelligence to forecast consequences.

Most people will probably accept this as a platitude, but if they do some practical points follow. What is man's most dangerous characteristic. Judged by the recent record of cost in human liveswithout a doubt, nationalism. What ought we to do about it? Discourage it in whatever form it takes, whether it is the hysteria of Arab newspapers, the antiquated politics of Gaullism, or the relatively harmless triviality of I Back Britain Union Jack T-shirts made in Portugal.
