



Historical Unit Identifying Homes

The Manchester Historical Society is embarking upon a program to identify and mark he construction dates of Manchester's oldest homes with wood plaques similar to the one in the upper picture, which reads: "Watkins Homestead, 1764, Manchester Historical So-

This, the first home selected for marking, is a rambling, gambrel-roofed colonial farm house at 234 S. Main St. which has belonged to the Watkins family since 1867 when it was purchased from a Halsey Hollister at its already venerable age of 103 years. . It is now the home of R.

Bruce Watkins, president and general manager of Watkins Bros., Inc., and the great-greatgrandson of the purchaser, the first member of the family to settle in Manchester. In the picture above, Edson

In this case, establishment of the construction date was simple, since the date, "January A:D 1764," was carved into the stone lintel on one of the home's three fireplaces. The home, shown in an overall view below, was "guest" for its 200th birthday party, staged

by all living members of the Watkins family in 1964. An account of the event appeared at the time in The Herald. In their program of dating and marking homes, society members will first compile

list of homes which appear t have been built around the middle 1800's or earlier, said Bai-

Next, the society will attemp to authenticate dates of con struction by searching deeds land records or other means of identification.

The task may prove difficult Bailey said, because Manchester was not incorporated until 1823, and many of its early records may be non-existent of sketchy, or located either in East Hartford or Hartford municipalities of which the area was formerly a part.

Any residents whose homes may qualify for the program and who would like to have them dated and marked are asked to contact Bailey, Griswold, or other members of the historical society.

Parade Of The Giants

The list of giant members of the "media" which have, in the last few days, taken pointed editorial positions against any more escalation of the war n Vietnam is an impressive list. The arguments presented have been varied, but might all be summed up as proceeding from a rather common assesament of the present situation in Vietnam as one in which we cannot hope to achieve anything better than a military stalemate, not that is, if we hope to leave any life at all in the country we are supposed to be trying to save.

The recommendations for what our present and future policy should now be are also varied, but might all be summed up as heading toward one degree of de-escalation or another, ranging from abandonment of the "search and destroy" strategy in favor of a "clear and hold" strategy, to an absolute cessation of the bombing of North Vietnam. One thing on which all these giant members of the American media agree is what Life Magazine, the most recent joiner of this parade of opinions, took for the title to its editorial: "Let's Not

Have More Of The Same." The Wall Street Journal was first in line, in this parade of reexamination. and reassessment of our policies in Vietnam. Its now widely circulated editorial made the assertion that Americans had perhaps better begin to accustom themselves to the idea the war in Vietnam was not going to be won, ever. The CBS network followed, with Wal-

ter Cronkite's impressive assessment, as a result of his personal survey in Vietnam, that we had come to a point where stalemate seemed to be the best solu tion we had a chance of getting. NBC followed, with its own survey of the state of the war, and a similar conclusion that the kind of victory once

hoped for had become an impossibility. Next came Newsweek magazine, this week, taking the second editorial position of its entire career, in favor of reassessment, new strategy, new aims, and against the escalation which has seemed so likely to be the routine decision of the White House.

And now Life Magazine joins the parade, openly favoring de-escalating the ground war in South Vietnam, and halting the bombing of North Vietnam, first because it has been questionable in its military effectiveness anyway, second in order to test, by action, Hanoi's willingness to enter negotiations.

This impressive parade of media gi ants should make it quite clear that never in our history has a question of war and peace produced such a formidable disagreement between private observation, study and analysis and the official policy-making procedures which go on inside the national administration And all these voices suddenly raised together, at a time when the Johnson administration is still relying on its stock comeback question-"So what would you do?"-do have an answer, They say not to escalate further, either in manpower or in territory taken in by our operations. They say to de-escalate, in one degree or another. They say to make it sure and clear to the world that our own interest in negotiation is genuine, and not merely an evasive strategy. The bigness and fame and brain equipment of such institutions in the national communications field do not make them right, any more than the fact that yndon Johnson is President can make him right, or any more than the fact that ours is the country which is loing what it is doing in Vietnam makes t right.

And one thing bothers us. This sudden tide of important public opinion in one direction seems to have resulted uite directly from the factual experience of the enemy's Tet offensive.

That would imply that; if there had been no Tet offensive, and military affairs still seemed to be going fairly well for us in Vietnam, none of these volces would have been raised against the Johnson policy. What is on view is, in other words, a revolt of the pragma-Hists, who are concluding that it is a bad war because we are not winning it

It has also always been, in our opinion, a war open to question from moral and legal points of view, a war which could have been bad and could have renained bad even if we had proved able to win it easily. It might be a war we hould refuse to lose because we are so right; it might be a war we deserve to because we are so wrong. Some-

sus among important opinions there may be floating along a few lonely, unoticed characters, like the New York limes, who were motivated, in their opposition to the war, by those casualties of principle which preceded and perhaps made inevitable the casualties of lost lives and missed military victories.

Secondly Mr. Nixon, asked if the iemonstration of anti-war sentiment in New Hampshire might affect his own Vietnam position, replied beautifully that he was never in the habit of finding his own position on great issues by consulting either position papers or the polls. There is, of course, an unnamed governor of a great state who has, for years, been guided by position papers and polls, Friendly Dick had managed a certain essential political business without calling a name.

A Man For This Season Senator Eugene McCarthy's cam-

paign is steadily gaining in strength and significance. His showing in the precinct and ward conventions in Minnesota last week was unexpectedly strong. President Johnson's refusal to run in nerson or through a proxy candidate in Massachusetts defaults that state's votes to Mr. McCarthy for the first ballot at the Democratic National Convention. These developments have heightened interest in Tuesday's primary in New Hampshire

Every serious political campaign represent an inter-action between the can lidate and the issues. Senator McCarthy, comparatively little known on the national scene is tapping a sizable vein of anti-war sentiment. He is winning support because he is willing to talk sen and calmly about Vietnam, the subject that is most on the minds of the electorate, and is willing to submit his beliefs to the judgment of the voters. The McCarthy campaign appears novel because so many Americans have become accustomed to political campaigns in which issues are ruthlessly subordinated to personalities. It is rare and refreshing for a man to be more concerned with his ideas than his image. Mr. McCarthy is not merchan dising himself as if he were a popula singer or a new brand of detergent; h is not seeking support because he ha an attractive wife or children or dog of any other irrelevancy.

What is remarkable, however, is that 30 many of Senator McCarthy's own supporters who agree with him on the Vietnam issue are so ready to complain about what they regard as his deficien cles as a campaigner. It is as if hav ing made up their minds on the subject of Vietnam, they only want a spokesman who will ventilate their emotion by shouting slogans and making fier attacks.


But surely the Vietnam debate is already too envenomed by passion and rancor. What is needed is a man who will, in Adlai Stevenson's phrase, "talk sense to the American people"-and that means talking sensibly and calmly and treating audiences as adults capable of comprehending complexity. That is what Senator McCarthy is doing and what he deserves great credit for doing If he underplays his points and occasionally trails off into vague inconsequence, that is-or ought to be-prefer able to the more usual escalations into bombast and simplemindedness. A man of wit and of learning and of decent respect for the opinions of others, he is a man for this season of emotionalism. Politics is normally defined as the art of the possible. It is the purpose of the idealist in politics such as Senator Mc-Carthy to expand the boundaries of what is thought possible. Regardless of the outcome in New Hampshire or in the later primaries in Wisconsin and Cali-'ornia, Senator McCarthy has no reaionable chance of winning the Democrat c nomination-as he himself has recog nized from the outset. But a series of McCarthy victories or near-victories i primaries and state conventions could conceivably alter President Johnson's perception of public attitudes toward the war and therefore his management of the conflict.

Like any man who has ever run fo political office, President Johnson has a nealthy respect for the ballot box. An sutpouring of McCarthy support may convince him of the deepening public conviction that the war cannot be won in the terms in which he is trying to win it. A Johnson change of viewpoint on the war is not probable, but it is more clearly within the realm of the possible than it was before Eugene Mc-Carthy began to campaign.

Senator McCarthy has succeeded in making a negotiated settlement in Vietnam a more credible alternative simply by campaigning for such a settlemen le has removed the issue of the war from the sideshow of controversy i the main tent of politics where the two great parties contend. For all citizens but particularly for students and young people, he has provided constructive po litical leadership in a hard, confused time. For that service alone he con mands the respect and gratitude of all who cherish democracy. - NEW YORK
