NASA Finishing Fire Tests in **Apollo Cabins** By THOMAS O'TOOLE

The Washington Post WASHINGTON - The Nation al Aeronautics and Space Administration has decided to substitute a mixture of nitrogen and oxygen for pure oxygen in the cabin atmosphere of the Apollo spacecraft at the time of launch. this week, when it completes the last 2 of 140 flammability tests it has run inside the cabins of the Apollo Command Capsule and the Lunar Landing Craft.

"We've decided," explains an Apollo official, "that there will be no more Apollo fires — not even little caps that can be my







LEEDS, England (AP) — A 210-year-old railroad is still doing the work for which it was built in 1788—hauling freight for local industries over a rusty mile of track past old-fashioned factories, scrapyards and clay

The Middleton Colliery Rail-way, which local buffs claim is the world's oldest, ploneered a system which revolutionized freight. On Aug. 12, 1812, two steam

locomotives, the Salamanca and the Prince Regent, went into regular service with a top speed of 10 miles per hour. The rack cog wheel railway designed by John Blenkinsop is still em-ployed in different form on some mountain railways with

very steep grades.

Despite its trail-blazing, the Middleton was not preserved as an ancient monument. In fact, the sidings of history, giving George Stevenson's "Rocket" all the glory.

Shortly before its bicentenary the line, which had carried mil lions of tons of coal, lay derelict and abandoned. Rusty, broken and overgrown with weeds, i was in danger of disappearing without trace.

Local railroad buffs, however got together and in 1969 formed the Middleton Railway Trust. Their aim was to preserve the ancient line by operating it on a commercial basis.

The Middleton celebrated its reopening in June 1960, by carrying 7,500 passengers, mostly hildren. Profits were donated to a Leeds University charity lrive. Since then, the train, operated solely by amateurs is their spare time, has carried an average of 10,000 tons of scrap iron, steel girders and general freight each year. It carries the freight one mile; then links up with British Railways.

Dr. Fred Youell, a physicist at Leeds University and chair-man of the trust, explained, "We had a lot of knowledge about running railways when we first started. And we have learned a lot as we have gone along. If we ever really get stuck, we can fall back on British Railways for expert advice. "The railway runs for about a mile, but with sidings we have about four miles of track. We operate strictly according to the British Railway book of rules Safety is the prime consideration. If anyone breaks one of the 211 rules, he can be suspended. After all, with engines like the Great Marquess, which reighs 69 tons, we can't afford steam locomotive at age 17,

"The maximum amount o freight we have moved in any one year is 12,500 tons," said Dr. Youell. We charge 24 cents per ton, which is competitive and covers our costs. "Nothing can now threaten the Middleton Railway. It is here to stay."

GRAVY POT ROAST Prepare for cooking: Chuck, Shoulder Clod or Bottom Round. Trim off the excess fat and rub the meat with A-1 sauce. Season and lay the meat on a sheet of aluminum foil. Dilute slightly on (8-oz.) can of cream of mushroom soup and pour over roast. Sprinkle the contents of one package of dried onion soup over the roast and wrap the meat in aluminum foil. Place in roasting pan and bake in a medium oven (about 350 degrees) until meat is tender (about 3 to 3½ hours). Omit the A-1 sauce if you wish.
