





What Rockefeller Wouldn't Do? Although Governor Rockefeller's assessment of the practical odds against is candidacy may have been quite accurate, our theory would be that it was not the length of the odds in the quest for the delegates, but the distance he would have to travel to achieve the position on Vietnam being demanded by his own best supporters which actually turned the Governor's expected yes into

The Governor's front line supporters -the moderates and liberals of the party-had been pretending, for some time, that they had forgotten his last public position on the specific question of Vietnam and the general foreign policy

posture of the United States. In that last public position-way back in 1964 or 1965, Rockefeller had been as much of a "hawk" as Goldwater or Nixon was then supposed to be, or as President Johnson was soon revealed to

But for at least three years past Governor Rockefeller had said nothing definite on foreign policy. This absence of a recent record ap parently encouraged all kinds of nonhawks to think that the Governor was having his foreign policy mind retellored for him. One of those who supported him for the nomination was, for nstance, the same General Gavin who proposed the enclave theory of deescalation in Vietnam. Just a few days ago. Mayor Lindsay of New York, makng his own most forthright speech against the war in Vietnam, predicted publicly that Governor Rockefeller would be found taking much the same stand. Down in Washington, just last Tuesday, Senator Thruston Morton of Kentucky agreed to serve as national director of the Rockefeller campaign for the Presidency, and Senator Morton has been one of the Senate Republicans most vocal against the kind of military and

political policy we have been following in Vietnam. It was reported, as well, that the Governor had for some time been consulting his own chief foreign policy braintruster, Professor Kissinger of Harvard, who was himself a one-time hawk who had recently turned dovish. That the New York Governor should

thus take a position much less hawkish than his own last previous public stand was, therefore, very important to those Republican leaders most willing to support him. And it was, in actuality, the principal reason why there could be real importance and significance to his In the press conference announcing

his withdrawal, Governor Rockefeller answered one question about Vietnam, with language which was a talented exercise in obfuscation, but which seemed to leave one thing relatively clear. The Governor was leaving himself in political position to join in campaign criticism of the policy of the Democratic President. We suspect he will be posing as neither hawk nor dove, in

the months ahead. In that role, he may prove willing to abandon his own previous role as one of the more extremist hawks on the national scene.

But we do not think he was willing to become the candidate himself with a cote of doves around him, or with any real relaxation of his own old-time ferocities for the advancement of American anti-Communist power in the world. And that, we feel, was the final determining factor, which tipped the scales in which the practical chances of his winning the nomination had also been placed. He did not choose to make the personal shift of position which would have been part of the bargain with his own most enthusiastic supporters. He did not choose to try to put on dove's feathers for the campaign. This is a supposition which is flattering and complimentary to him, and a tribute to his character, even from those who may think his position itself mistaken. \_\_\_\_

# What Next From Giap?

Ever since the subsiding of the socalled Tet Offensive, there has been continual speculation as to what General Giap is planning to do next. Is he going really to attack at Khesanh? Is he going to launch a frontal battle for control of Hue and its surrounding countryside? Is he going to repeat the Tet offensive, this time without the benefit of surprise?

Some of the people who ask these questions have varied interpretations of

the Tet Offensive itself. There are those Cassandra-like analysts who perhaps exaggerate its success. And there are those observers who, trapped in their own commitment to the war, always have to have us about to win it somehow, and who contend, therefore, that the Tet Offensive was the last desperate dying gasp of the North Vietnamese and

We don't know which view of the Tet Offensive is more nearly accurate, Nor do we know the answer General Gian is making in his own mind, to all the questions the world is asking about what he is going to do next.

But, from our own position, having shifted our armchair into its generalship posture, there is only one practical, logical answer for General Giao, no matter which version of the Tet Offensive may happen to be closer to the Whether it was a first thrust of new

vigor or the last gasp of an old strength, it succeeded in wiping out and destroying much of the accomplishment of three years of intensive application of American military strength in Vietnam. Except for the fact that we now have

There was never, on this first piping into the mist, any full release of the chorus which will be available, later on for some really warm spring night. And there had been, that day, only one robin on the lawn.

But the later amplification of the sights and sounds of spring is the one thing everyone has boundless patience for. Let it begin early, or at least on schedule, and then meander.

Networks are pretty ruthless about prime time programming. An evening series that fails to win or place in the Nielsen race is usually replaced at the earliest possible moment. The Saturday morning lineup apparently has involved the networks' precious images so something has been done.

The first vent was a midweek announcement by the educational network, in financial collaboration with two foundations and the U.S. government, that it would turn out a 26-week series of daily programs aimed at the preschool crowd and stressing the educational aspects of entertainment.

By extraordinary coincidence, less than 24 hours later, NBC said it would present "new concept" of programming on Saturday mornings starting next September—an hour of child-oriented programs that would consist of high grade cartoons, music and games, plus some repeat performances of special children's shows that have won good notices from adult critics.

Within hours, came word from CBS of "a major new creation" on Saturday mornings, also starting in September. That network plans to return to the old gentle "Bugs Bunny" type of cartoon-as opposed to shows starring monsters, spooks and supermen-for two and one-half hours weekly. CBS hopes to turn out some special travel and real-life adventure shows, too.

And both have plans for serials like those many-part cliffhangers that used to fill movie theaters with young on Saturday mornings.
