





Marine Magic at Khe Sanh **Divining Rods Hunt Tunnels**

explanation for it, but the U.S. Marines are using something very close to magic to help their defense of Khe Sanh in northwestern South Vietnam. The strange part is that It

does seem ready and able to do the job. This technique is the use of divining rods, often known as It has long been a popular folk method for locating likely places to dig water wells. The Marines hope to use it to locate tunnels the enemy

might be burrowing into Khe Sanh. So far, they have not discovered any proven cases of enemy burrowing, but they lo-

ated hollow spots and have made divining rods almost a respectable subject. There are several types of divining rods. The Marines use two slender metal rods, bent at right angles ,one side about two and a half feet long and the oth-

er only about six to eight inches. The dimensions are not critical, and almost any kind of metal is supposed to work. The operator loosely holds one a each hand by the short end, pointing the long ends forward like a pair of hose pistols, hands held motionless close to the center of his body. Then he walks forward. When he passes over a hollow spot, the ends of the rods are supposed to swing inward until they cross each

other -sometimes continuing to turn until they point almost to the sides at nearly right angles to their original position.

Do they really work? By the ordinary evidence of eye, brain and camera, the answer is yes -they do work. Whether they would detect a Viet Cong tunnel I cannot say, but I saw the rods cross four or five times when Staff Sgt. Jesse McCormick, 26, of Sar Francisco walked repeatedly across a small culvert under one of Khe Sanh's dusty roads.

More surprising, they worked equally well for me three times in a row when McCormick handed the rods over and said "try it yourself." Deeply skeptical even after

seeing his performance, and feeling about as psychic as a ham sandwich, I took the two rods, held them loosely, aimed them generally forward and marched down the road over the

SAIGON (AP) - Nearly 1.000 North Vietnamese troops armed with flamethrowers and rocket-pro-belied grenades attacked an American artillery base in the central highlands of South Vietnam today. The attack touched off the heaviest fighting on that critical front in four months.

The U.S. military command said 121 enemy soldiers had been killed so far in the battle. U.S. camualties were not immediately disclosed.

Near Saigon, allied forces pushed through rice paddies and edgerows pursuing a battered Viet Cong force that broke off a sharp 24-hour battle shortly be fore dawn. The Viet Cong death toll was put at 284. The U.S. Command said 10

U.S. soldiers were killed and 71 wounded in the fighting. South Vietnamese casualties were described as light. The attack in the central high-

lands was launched under the cover of darkness by two or three North Vietnamese battalions against an artillery up-Hons against an artillery sur try Division 19 miles west Kontum City. Headquarters said the North

Vietnamese troops, operating only 20 miles from their Cambo dian border sanctuary, stormed the 500 American defenders and drove through a portion of the perimeter.

Four hours later, headquar ters said, U.S. infantrymen had pushed the enemy troops back and restored their defense line The North Vietnamese began withdrawing toward Cambodia as dawn broke and American reinforcements poured in. All cavalrymen made a helicopter assault into the battle zone in an attempt to block the enemy's

How Sick Can We Get? Our national sickness over the issue of Vietnam was illustrated, in unpleasant ways no one can welcome, in

two circumstances last week. First, the fact that the President's son-in-law had gone on active duty with his Air National Guard unit produced a crisis in morale in that unit. Some of the members of that unit took the view that the arrival of the President's son-in-law meant that the unit itself would soon be sent to Viet-

Their inference was that things would be shifted out of their routine in order to make it possible for the President's relative to get closer to the war. Their inference, further, was that this was all somehow part of a White House play to "revive flagging public support for the Administration's Vietnam policy," which was the language one airman used in a letter to a Washington

This, then, was one sample of the way our national atmosphere has been poisoned by the deepness and the bitterness of the Vietnam division. It had become impossible for the President's relative to put himself in position to be sent to Vietnam without creating suspicion that he was really part of some potentially sacrificial plot to infuse increased authentic emotional content into the President's oratory about the war. The situation in the unit the son-inlaw had joined was quieted, on the surface at least, by the action of its commander in calling a morale meeting, at which he assured them that the rumor that the arrival of the President's relative had anything to do with their own future duty status was false.

The second development of the week which concerned the same war and, it happened, the same circumstance, came out in Wisconsin, where two Johnson Administration stalwarts, Vice President Hubert Humphrey and Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman opened the Johnson battle in the Wisconsin primary by repeating the President's own charges at Minneapolis, in which the critics of the present war in Vietnam were compared to Chamberlain at

Secretary Freeman, however, had a special ending for his particular speech. "Mr. Freeman more than once concluded his attack on appeasers," the New York Times reported, "by picturing the President 'with tears in his eyes' as the father-in-law of Airman 1st Cl. Patrick J. Nugent and Marine Capt. Charles S. Robb, who are expected to be in Vietnam shortly . . . "The thing that bothers me,' Mr. Freeman quoted the President as having told him, 'is that there are people in this country

who think it's all for nothing.' " There, not quite yet directly from the President himself, but from a Cabinet member obviously well versed in the kind of argument the President likes to make about the war-which is that the young men fighting in it at his command are wonderful young Americans and that therefore it must be a right and good war-was precisely the sick and poisonous thing the poisoned minds of the men in the son-inlaw's unit had suspected.

We unworthily suspect the unworthy thing and then the unworthy thing happens. There is so much unworthiness all around, there is so much guilt in everybody, that it also makes us all innocent, in that the evil seems more in the atmosphere, more in the circumstance, than it seems in any of us ashuman beings. A well-intentioned President, a well-intentioned Secretary, a well-intentioned son-in-law, well-intentioned airmen, well-intentioned opponents of the war, all seem to await and need some act of mercy which will deliver them from something that seems much more like a national disease than an issue.

Opinions Worth A Lot

The National Observer, in a recent issue, did a little exploring of the kind of fees being paid, by some of our imporiant commercial interests whose products concern the public health, for expert academic testimony before the ommittees of Congress.

"It found that a manufacturer or group of manufacturers of some product the covernment might be threatening to control or regulate could, without too much searching, find distinguished protessors of whatever expertise might be ppropriate who already shared the lews and opinions the manufacturer would like to have defended and who would undertake to lend their name and prestige to the necessary research and testimony at rates ranging up as much in \$1 200 a day.

That was rather high. The more rouline fee per day for a distinguished protessor from one of the nation's most distinguished universities would run at \$400 or \$600 a day. The committees of Congress, on the other hand, pay their expert witnesses

\$16 a day, plus transportation costs. When, of course, the committees hemselves investigate enough to find out what the special interests involved in a hearing are paying the distinguishad professors who appear in support of their case, part of the supposed effectiveness of such "expert" testimony vanishes right then and there. Still, one hopes the practice does not

lisappear completely. It is somehow reassuring to know that somewhere in this creat country of ours there is always some famous expert ready, for a suitable fee, to testify in favor of almost anything.

No Names Needed? We take the liberty of quoting from a

rather small and modest, but especially eloquent political advertisement which appeared in the New York Times the other day. The first paragraph we wish to quote

is this: "The responsibility of American Jntellectuals is to tell the truth. Always." The paragraph we wish to quote next

"The truth is: To be moral and remain moral, movements must always choose moral men and moral means." And another paragraph we quote is

"The truth is: The end never justifies the means. Never. If American intellectuals do not know that, they have learned nothing from history."

The precise political purpose of this advertisement was contained in two paragraphs we have omitted, which contained the names of specific political individuals.

But if the advertisement was as good as we think it was, it didn't really need to tell its readers which particular candidate it was for, and which against.

The Case Against A Tax Increase A great many people, both in and ou Government, contend that the gold crisis has made a 10% income surtax imperative. It is, however, possible to argue quite persuasively that a tax boost, far from solving the balance-ofpayments problem, could easily make t worse.

One man who does so is Senator William Proxmire, chairman of the Joint Economic Committee. "The surtax," the Wisconsin Democrat declares, "would weaken our balance-of-payments po sition. It would aggravate the gold out-

In the Senator's view the tax-rise talk is a bit paradoxical. "Consider," he says, "that on February 6, 1964, the then Secretary of the Treasury Douglas Dillon told the House Ways and Means Committee that the tax rec ommended that year . . . would help our balance of payments.

"He said that it would do so by making American investment more attractive relative to European investment, and help stop the flow of American capital and U.S. gold abroad. And Dillon was right. In the two years following the 1964 reduction, America's balance of payments did improve."

This year it is reasonable to assume that a tax increase would depress expectations of after-tax business profits in the U.S. and thus make investment in other countries relatively more attractive. Ironically this would come at a time when Europe's slower economic pace has been diminishing U.S. interest n investments there.

Senator Proxmire is no more optimistic that a tax boost would counter the inflationary forces that are making U.S. exports less competitive abroad. In fact, a tax is a cost that would tend to push prices of America's exports still higher.

The Senator is probably close to the mark when he estimates that it would take more than a year for a tax increase to have any significant anti-inflationary impact on the domestic economy. Even that assumes the Government would not use any revenue gain as an excuse for stepped-up spending-a risky asumption at best.

In any case, the Government almost certainly cannot wait a year or more for improvements in the nation's payments position. Like the rest of the Administration's gadgetry,' the "twotier" gold market has given the U.S. some time to maneuver, but the time is more likely to be measured in weeks han in months.

Much more quickly effective, Senator Proxmire comments, would be sizable reductions in nondefense Federal spending. Cuts in outlays, furthermore, would be at least as effective as a tax rise in alerting other nations to the fact that the U.S. had finally awakened to its financial responsibilities.

For our part we would add that spending reductions also would take account of the circumstance that the payments crisis has been caused almost entirely by actions of Government, not Therefore a tax increase, in addition to its other flaws, would be more than somewhat unfair.


Even as a booster of Federal revenue, a tax rise could prove to be self-defeating. In the current uncertain economic situation the increase could deflate economic activity to such an extent that the higher levies would produce not

more but less revenue. Finally, on a politically pragmatic basis spending cuts look fully as good as a tax increase. There are of course potent pressures for maintaining or raising practically all sorts of Federal nondefense outlays, no matter how nonessential or ineffective the spending has been. But Congressmen shouldn't kie themselves into believing that the gold crisis has softened the public's antipathy to a tax rise in this election year. On all counts, then, the case agains a tax increase appears powerful. And, as Senator Proxmire says, the case is strengthened, not weakened, by the





Only a few days ago this columnist was writing that he had never before seen quite so spontaneous a political upris-ing as that embodied in the foCarthy movement. It had a glow on its face which derived rom innocence of purpose and restoration of belief in the political processes. Its meckness and mildness and unprofessionalism were its strengths. It was delightfully surprised at its own success. It thought and hoped it was going to have sense enough to stick by its own formula for political mira-

Now that happy, ruddy, innocent glow has been succeeded by the gray pallor of wound and realization.

No idealistic venture in the history of politics has ever come up against such a swift disillusionment. At first they could not be-

lieve, the McCarthyites of this crusade, that anybody could dare attempt to stab or steal a movement of such purity and beauty. Then, as the reality of the

stab and steal maneuver began to establish itself in their unwilling minds, they began to taste all its unpleasant elements.

The Kennedy entrance called on them to surrender their delightful amateurism to the very same kind of professionalism they had been so pleased

to have as their foe. It called upon them to give up their own standards and surrender their own activity and their own cause to the same kind of forces and the same kind of tactics they themselves had so much fun upsetting.

The appearance of Kennedy on the campaign trail offered them, in Connecticut, an appar ent opportunity to increase the strength of their own showing. in the primaries, in the state convention itself. The Kennedy entrance could be of such practical help to them in Connecticut because it offered them the use of the Kennedy muscle still running through the Connecticut body politic, because the Kennedy entrance made dissent suddenly respectable among even practical politicians. Bu such muscle, such respectability, were the very things the McCarthy movement, in its own pristine purity, did best with

Perhaps the McCarthy movement can rise out of its wounds, repair its damaged heart, and escape its own evnical acknowledgment of it own eventua submission to the more practical power, the pre sumably greater chance of going all the way, which has now begun trying to pound so ominously, so presumptuuosly alongside the lighter, more graceful McCarthy footwork around the campaign track. If so, that will be a kind of

second miracle, even more intoxicating, because even more difficult, than the first. Many of the craters have been filled in by the enemy. Near the Xe Pan River he spotted fresh trails leading

a cluster of gray thatched huts, long known to have been aban-doned by the local Bru Tribesmen. Two of the huts were freshly thatched. Jacobcik figured it was probably an enemy storage By radio he called for fighter aircraft. Two F-4 jets circled high in the hazy sunlight as

the forward air controller gave them instructions. Then Jacobcik bore in on the target himself. From a wing pod, he fired a 2.75 inch smoke rocket into the cluster of huts to mark it for the jets. As the spotter plane came out of the sky, several figures could be seen running out of the houses. The North Vietnamese apparently knew what was coming. The F-4 jets in camouflage paint swooped down and then climbed steeply. Their napalm landed on target. "Nice work," Jacobcik told the jets, as he
