

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



No One "Escaped Unharmed" "Dr. King," said the line under the

There, in one sentence, was a nutshell prelude to what the summer of 1968, n America, the land of the free, could prove to be. It was a sentence which said almost as much, in its way, as all the thousands of sentences in the report of the President's Commission on Civil

And its one sentence sharpness under-

infiltration of salt and chemicals used lined the sharpness of that report. to keep the town's streets clear of ice What it said is that we're headed for things much worse, much more desperate, unless we make some greater, cleaner, more impressive start on action toward prevention and cure.

The most terrible thing the sentence from Memphis said was that there is not likely to be much life, in 1968, for the cause of moderation, or for the echnique of non-violence.

That minority of the minority which has dedicated itself to anarchy, to nihilism, to the destruction of moderate positions and hopes, the discrediting of the non-violent approach, has discovered how easy it is for a very few hoodlums on the fringe of a demonstration to turn it toward riot.

Ironically, the very techniques police departments have been rehearsing for the summer of 1968--- to respond instantly with decisive force and policy to the slightest beginning of trouble---plays into the hands of the hoodlums.

So, when the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King had some 6,000 non-violent marchers on the streets of Memphis, it was easy for some 300 Black Power commandos, or even fewer, to turn the day into a violent scramble from which Dr. King was indeed lucky to "escape un-

Only he could not really escape. He had to be caught in the shame of his own well-intentioned but tragic failure. He had to be caught in a fuller realiaztion of what he himself has obviously been suspecting for a long time--a realization of the possibility that the day for his kind of leadership and his kind of action may have passed.

Neither Dr. King nor anyone else in this whole country "escaped unharmed" from what went on in Memphis. The crisis grows deeper and hotter; our capacity for dealing with it does not grow, but dwindles.

Something Is Different

Now and then one of the nation's pundits earns his salt, and Columnist Tom Wicker of the New York Times earned his the other day with a simple paragraph which read as follows:

"The American people are not on trial today, in the way the President would have them believe. What is on trial is the leadership of Lyndon B .Johnson, towhom they gave an overwhelmingly mandate for peace in 1964, and who now presides over the fourth bloodiest war in our history."

Our situation is not necessarily that the American people have changed; away from their former worthier selves, so that they no longer respond to a President's call for unified patriotism in support of the course he has put the nation

to any man." The situation can possibly be that there is a difference between the course the President has put the nation on and other courses to which, in the past, the nation has rallied with patriotic unity. In this context, it is interesting, though of course, not conclusive in that it ends the argument, to take a look at the attitude of other nations toward our own course in Vietnam.

Many of these are our friends. Many of them have close reasons to want to stay closely associated with us. None have ever before, in this present span of history, openly opposed or publicly and ignore Senator Ribicoff -







Budgt Form

You will note that the following budget is presented in substantially more detail than in previous years. We have tried to show cost requirements in detail on a major functional basis as well as more fully explaining general programs.

Special Taxing District Authority Parking Fund \$25,600

With the beginning of the new fiscal year, we expect to convert our appropriation accounting and controls to E.D.P. This will make it easier to furnish detailed information for your analysis during the course of the year. Due to the conversion to the new format, some year to year comparison figures had to be based on estimates. Future format, some year to year comparison figures had to be based on esumates. Future budgets will be based on the new accounting system. As you analyze this budget, please bear in mind that its major objective is to furnish information required by you to make intelligent decisions and determinations. Your constructive comments on ways in which the budget presentation might be improved will be helpful in the future. Of course, further detailed information will be provided during work sessions, or on request.

Overall Fiscal Picture

As is readily apparent to everyone, we are in the midst of perhaps the most severe inflationary pressure since the end of World War II. This is reflected in the household budget whenever one visits the supermarket or clothing store. It is also made obvious to the town when we go to the market place to buy either commodities or services. In discussions with employee organizations, the increased cost of living was a major consideration.

Most local governments in Connecticut are fighting a similar battle against rising tax rates in the midst of inflation. If the property taxpayer is to receive any substantial relief, it appears that the entire state tax structure must be reviewed and perhaps revised in order to funnel more revenue to local government.

Our industrial promotion program is producing some results in that we have succeeded in persuading seven industries to relocate in new facilities in Manchester, or to move here from outside of town. However, the real fruits from this program should become evident as we extend utilities into prime areas adjacent to good roads. The impact of major state highway construction will also be an important factor in industrial development.

Negotiations with the Firemen's Union and the AFL-CIO representing all but police force and supervisory employees were completed by me prior to the preparation of this budget. As you know, the Firemen's Agreement has been accepted by you and the AFL-CIO Agreement is in the process of renegotiation.

A two year package was agreed to with the Firemen providing a 14.1% increase with increases to be made at 6 month intervals totaling 8.3% in the first year and 5.2% in the second year. Although no Agreement has yet been reached with the Policemen, this budget provides for a similar wage package.

For the hourly rated employees represented by the Union, proposed increments vary from 10c to 35c, depending upon the position. The variation is due to adjustments required to maintain rates prevailing in the Hartford area for various skills.

Other employees represented by the Union were to receive a pay increment based upon one step advance in the pay plan on July 1 and a second step on January 1. This amounts to an overall increment of approximately 71/2%. A few positions in the pay plan were revised to reflect changes in prevailing pay rates in the Hartford area.

Salaries for Department Heads and Assistant Department Heads are in accordance with the pay plan recently reviewed by the Board of Directors.

A copy of the pay plan appears at the end of this budget message.

New state legislation has materially changed the manner in which local governments deal with their employees. The laws that established the right for collective bargaining have, in fact, encouraged the trend toward Labor Unions in the public sphere. Changes that have resulted from these new relationships make it necessary to review many of our traditional approaches to dealing with town employees. Such "institutions" as the merit system, position classifications and set pay plans have to be looked at anew in the light of changed relationships. Manchester has had a relatively long history of dealing with unions of public employees and I feel that we have maintained excellent relationships in arriving at equitable agreements.

The cooperative venture between the Town, Board of Education and Community College in the operation of a Data Processing Center is working well. The first program undertaken by the Town was the preparation of the Grand List, formerly handled by a service bureau at a cost of \$5,800 annually. In April we will be handling water billing on E.D.P. equipment and at the beginning of the fiscal year we expect to be operational with various appropriations, payroll and personnel functions. Several additional applications are projected.

The immediate advantage of E.D.P. to the town lies in our ability to delay the addition of personnel as the work load increases in activities involving repetitive operations. Furthermore, it provides us with the ability to utilize information in a more effective manner with a minmum drain on man power.

Departmental Request Highlights

The personnel services budget includes a "floating" clerk-stenographer who is assigned to various departments as required for temporary work due to sickness, vacations, or temporary overload. This account also contains funds for advertising for vacancies and conducting examinations previously charged to individual departmental

The purchase of two voting machines on two year lease purchase is provided in order to meet State law requirements on number of machines per registered voters. In the future, we should start a program to replace older voting machines that are

Planning and Zoning

An additional Planner is requested to make it possible to spend time critically needed in long-range planning that is now neglected. Decisions made by this Commission will affect the Town for all time. It will be to the Town's advantage to provide the required staff now, rather than engage a consultant on a crash program basis in a few years after mistakes may have been made.

For example, there are immediate needs for determining future school locations. This involves detailed population studies as to location and numbers. The impact of Route 6 on both housing location and traffic circulation, as well as, recreation facilities and utility requirements are other areas needing immediate attention. We are now facing another round of population explosion for which we should be prepared.

The major increase for this account is in the Data Processing function. With the many programs we will be operating, our half-time Programmer will be required on a full-time basis. Contractural services include \$10,000 as the Town's share for computer rental at the Data Center. A verifier is also required in our operation of the Town Hall. In the present budget \$5,000 was expended in the Assessor's budget that no longer appears. In the Water and Sewer operation we have been able to eliminate one full-time clerk as a result of conversion to E.D.P. operations.

The increasing crime rate has become a problem of national concern. This is a problem that has spilled over from central city to suburbia and is reflected in our own experience in Manchester. The Police Department has not kept up its numerical strength sufficiently to meet our current problems. Although the proposed budget shows a sharp increase for police services, it still leaves us short of meeting needs. Over %rds of the increase is for personal services. Thirty-eight thousands dollars is for the addition of 1 mechanic, 2 patrolmen, 1 civilian dispatcher and the creation of 2 new sergeancies. The budget for training has been doubled. This is still a modest figure due to the generous private contributions for tuition support for policemen in

the Community College. It is planned to send one officer to the F.B.I. Academy this year as well as assigning members to various training programs in the State and special Drug Training in Washington.

Two new police cruisers are recommended to provide for increased patrol in conjunction with the added personnel. The police maintenance vehicle is scheduled for replacement since it is no longer serviceable. This is used to traffic signals and controls maintenance and is now 18 years old. Minor alterations to the Police Station and painting, to follow heating system replacement, is provided. Increases in traffic control expenses are due primarily to higher power costs as a result of several new installations made in the current year.

Public Works

While the overall public works budget shows a significant increase, it must be borne in mind that in the past few years we have considerably expanded programs with little increase in cost—and no increase in number of personnel. In fact, there has been a decrease in personnel in the Highway operations. You are well aware of the public "demand" for improved services and their response to such new programs as leaf collection, berm installation, extended chemical usage for the control, and house to house sand distribution.

The only significant increase in this function, aside from normal salary increments, reflects the transfer of a part-time clerk steno from the Park Department to Public Works Office. This transfer allowed us to defer any request for additional clerical help. This budget also includes a request for a set of our aerial photos to be mounted on heavy paper for use by the general public.

Building Inspection Division

The major non-salary increase in this is a request for funds for the Town's share for structural improvements for the data processing center in the school administration building.

Increases in this budget reflect the replacement of equipment and provisions for additional seasonal help. The added seasonal help will be used during the peak work load preceding Memorial Day. Additional funds are requested to provide loam and seed on the new section of Elast Cemetery.

Engineering Division

This budget includes a request for an engineering calculator. The present machine is inadequate for engineering use. Funds are also requested to compile a town street map that will serve the internal needs of the Planning and Public Works Departments as well as being made available at printing cost to the general public.

In order to get a fair appraisal of the requests of this division we must look beyond the percentage increase over last year's budget. For fiscal year 1966-67 this division was budgeted \$435,162. For fiscal year 1967-68 the approved budget showed
\$432,971. This showed an overall cut. Salaries were increased so that the full cut fell
against materials and equipment. The division absorbed these cuts while expanding
bern installation, and leaf collection programs.

This budget reflects a need to catch up and recover from the past two budgets.
The new equipment budget is cut to a minimum. Each of the items requested is absorbing excessive repair costs. Our present backhoe's poor condition prevents us from doing any meaningful storm sewer work.

Sanitation Division

The request for increased funds for refuse collection reflects an increase anticle.

The request for increased funds for refuse collection reflects an increase anticipated for a new contract.

The refuse disposal increase shows a 12 c.y. vehicle urgently needed to haul cover material. This will do the work of three of the highway dump trucks presently being used. The vehicle will pay for itself in labor and equipment savings. Increased funds for cover material are necessary in order to meet State standards at the Disposal Area.

Park Department

These increases reflect equipment replacement needs. This request has been cut to include only those items that are now non-operational or incurring excassive repair

We are providing for a minimum standby Civil Defense Program with this opera-tion showing a substantial reduction. Community Child Guidance Clinic

This Agency has a staff consisting of a child psychiatrist, two psychologists, four full-time psychiatric social workers and one part-time psychiatric social worker. Services are provided to emotionally disturbed children based on referrals from schools, physcians, the clergy and other social agencies. Approximately 52% of the support for this function comes from the State Department of Mental Health. Fees charged are based on ability to pay. The clinic serves 14 towns with local support based on a formula reflecting the deficit after State funds are provided and taking into consideration the number of clients served from each town.

Public Health Nursing Association

The Association has found it necessary to update salary schedules in order to attract or retain competent nurses. 1308 more visits were made this year than the previous year. Many cases are of a type that require more time than formerly and the number of those unable to pay is also increasing. There are also more mental cases being referred from Norwich which are also non-paying cases.

Becreation

The current recreation budget is actually less than of the previous year. Overall salary increases are 5½%. A major item of increase is in the staffing of the new swimming pool at Robertson Park. A start is recommended also toward the addition of playground equipment to existing playgrounds as well as providing limited playground equipment at the Globe Hollow Pool recreation area. A 32% increase in Recreation Department activity participation occurred in the past year. This represents participation of 376,272 people.

A detailed breakdown of recreational programs appears under the Recreation budget in a form that should prove helpful in your analysis.

Senior Citizens

The pilot program for operation of the Senior Citizens Center under the part-time supervision of the Assistant Recreation Director has proven successful. It is proposed that this be made permanent with this individual splitting his time between Recreation and Senior Citizens. A clerk-receptionist is recommended in order to provide full-time supervisor of this building in order to further encourage its use by all senior citizens.

The request of the Pension Board contained \$104,000 for Unfunded Liability for past service. This was in accordance with the Town's original intent to amortize this by 1974. It is recommended that this be spread to 1984 at \$11,000 per year. Improvements were voted in February for existing pensioners, costing \$4,040.

In the present year, the Board of Directors authorized the transfer of 3 Police cruisers to personnel extensively using private cars. This was in lieu of trading in the cruisers. Our experience in this has been very favorable and it is proposed to transfer 6 more cruisers to other departments this year.

The Grand List increase was adversely affected by the removal of property in the North End by redevelopment, by the new exemption for the elderly (totaling nearly \$800,000) and the inventory exemption required by State Law. In the next year or two, the redevelopment area should produce substantial new taxes and we will receive funds from the State to offset the elderly exemptions. We are now receiving State funds in conjunction with the inventory tax exemption.



The differences between them may have arisen by adaptation to different environments, although this is held in question by biologists. Dark skin might have evolved thousands of years Years will not darken or shadows in the past when chance mutation for added pigment may have been selectively of advantage in a tropical environment

Black skin acts as a filter against ultraviolet radiation. whereas people in more temperate fair-skinned areas of the world need as much sun as they can absorb to increase vitamin D production.

An American biochemist, Dr. Farnsworth Loomis, speculates that dark skin came first, and

as early man moved north from the equator, black skin filtered out too much ultraviolet radiation, Rickets, he thinks, caused crippling among male hunters. The darkest-skinned mothers died in childbirth because of pelvic deformity and gradually only the lighter-skins survived. Doctors have found that some immigrant children in Britain are shielded too well by their dack skin and develop rickets.




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
