WASHINGTON (AP) - President Johnson has ordered a halt in U.S. bombing of most of North Vietnam in a sudden new bid to de-escalate the war in Southeast Asia and get peace talks started in the immediate fu-



Manchester Apparently Not Affected

Local Governments Put Under One-Man Rule ten upon the entire country at

Supreme Court today put local government under its one-man,

one-vote rule. (Manchester, which elects it's nine-member Board of Directors at-large, does not appear to be affected by the one-man one-vote decision. since all electors vote for the candidates.

However, still to be determined is Manchester's minority-representation rule, since electors may vote for only six candidates, even though nine are elected.

Town Counsel John Shea said today that he couldn't and wouldn't comment until he has studied the Supreme Court decision.)

The historic 5-3 decision extends the rule to an estimated 80,000 units of local government

One of the dissenters, John M. Harlan, said the decision was "both unjustifiable and ill-ad-

Justice Byron R .White gave the decision in a case from Midland County, Tex., where Mayor Hank Avery of Midland City asked that the county governing body be apportioned on a population basis.

The landmark finding came in these words by White: "We hold that petition (Avery) as a resident of Midland County has a right to a vote for the Commissioners Court of substantial equal weight to the vote of every other resident.

The ruling extends a step taken by the court four years ago in interpreting the mandate of the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment to the Con-

It is that in elections for Congress and for state legislatures districts must be drawn so that the vote of citizens is substantially equal in weight.

"The question now before us," said White, "is whether the 14th Amendment likewise forbids the election of local government officials from districts of disparate size. As has almost every court which has addressed itself to this question, we hold that it

Again, White wrote: "It is now beyond question that a state's political subdivisions must comply with the 14th Amendment. The actions of local government are the actions

of the state. "A city, town, or county may no more deny the equal protection of the laws than it may

abridge freedom of speech, establish an official religion, arrest without probable cause or deny due process of the law." The majority with White comprised Chief Justice Earl War-

ren and Associate Justices Hugo

L. Black, William O. Douglas and William J. Brennan Jr. The dissenters were Associate Justices Harlan Potter Stewart and Abe Fortas. Justice Thurgood Marshall did not participate in the case.

Harland, who has been the court's most outspoken opponent of the "one-man one-vote" ideology, wrote that: "These adventures of the court in the realm of political science are beyond its constitutional pow-

The Transformation

Yesterday, Sunday, March 31, 1968, yndon Johnson had just achieved the lowest Gallup poll rating, for his general performance as President, and for his conduct of the war in Vietnam, yet recorded. He stood on the verge of a dramatic loss of a primary contest, in Wisconsin tomorrow, to a comparatively minor opponent within his own party. He was deep into a costly and ugly quicksand war. He had lost leadership of his party, of Congress, of his nation, and of the cause of law and order in the world, and he seemed to have lost control of himself.

Today, Monday, April 1, 1968, almost every condition in that paragraph has been reversed, or stands near reversal Any poll today would give President Lyndon Johnson a high rating. He has reasserted leadership in all the areas where he was losing it.

He has done this, first, by a decision for de-escalation of the war in Vietnam. This represents, if it stays as straight as he presented it last night, and if ! proves free of later gimmicks, a complete change of course for Lyndon fohnson's war policy in Vietnam.

The President accompanied his announcement of a policy de-escalation with the surprise announcement of his own non-candidacy for re-election as

This announcement has two special nportances in relation to what must still constitute the major development of the evening-the creation of new hope for peace in Vietnam. First, by presenting the President in an act of sacrifice of personal fortune, it provided the President himself with emotiona over for the sacrifice of strategy which may have been harder for him than the proffered sacrifice of office. We think the decision to offer not to run was easier than the decision to de-escalate

Second, and more important and more valuably, the President's personal gesture has the immediate effect of offering powerful reinforcement to the validity of his major cut-back in the bombing of North Vietnam, his call for a regonvening of the Geneva Conference. It may help convince the world that this is, at last, a peace move the United States really means, and, if so, the world may help convince Hanoi it must respond.

It may build additional credibility for the solidity of the President's peace intentions in Vietnam that he himself, throughout his discussion of achievements, conditions and prospects in Vietnam, seemed to be speaking as if the war were, psychologically, something already in the past.

The hopes the President has lit by his double-barreled restoration of his own leadership may flame high enough everywhere to begin to bring the nightmare in Vietnam to a close.

This is the great potentiality of last night's event. It outranks everything else in importance.

This speech of leadership was also a speech of politics. Whatever the intent of the President-and it does not lessen the major credit he deserves for his main decision, which was about the war, to guess that his own imaginative political brain had an idea what these political results could be-the political realities of the speech were these:

1. On the eve of the primary in Wisconsin, it offered Senator McCarthy a change in Vietnam policy apparently close to what Senator McCarthy had defined as his own single reason for being in the race.

2. It rendered the potential results of all such primaries meaningless, by its anouncement that the target in the White House was not participating, not fighting back. 3. Finally, the course of high policy

action the President has set for himself also constitutes the only way he could ever possibly make his own renomination and his own re-election irresistible. His reach for peace has to begin succeeding. Or it has to fail only because of the behavior and policy of some one dise. And even then he must hold to new basic policy of de-escalation. But if these requirements are met. hen the political underdog who was in

come the shining hero of a Chicago convention draft by acclamation. If the President's policy for peace works at all, the speech which announced it may also, some day, be rated as the greatest single political speech of all history, sweeping both a party and a nation in one masterful 40-minute effort. If peace comes nearer, Lyndon Johnson will have his second chance to choose between the Potomac and the Pedernales.

No Pienic For Pundits

In Britain, in the four by-elections held the other day, the party out of power scored devastating gains. Where the Labor candidate had won a seat by more than 10,000 votes in 1966, the Labor candidate now lost by 12,000. This is the savage kind of turn-over no political party can withstand. Obviously, if a general election were to be held in Britain today, the Labor Government would be thrown out, and the Conservatives brought back to power.

Underneath any such political result there has to be a savage discontent with the government in power. What makes the situation especially

striking in Britain is that the Labor Government is not really in itself responsible for any of the unpleasantnesses which have provoked such a mood in the people. It has not been mismanaging; to the contrary, it has shown considerable courage in facing its problems; the things it has found itself forced to do have not been Labor Party policy; they are the things any political party of any stripe would find itself being compelled to do in the situation of today. All the things bearing down on British life today would be there, disconcerting and unpleasant, no matter who was in

who find the state of the nation full of trouble and uncertainties which seem to keep leading to deeper and deeper dilemmas have convinced themselves, rightly or wrongly, that somebody in particular, namely the head of the party in office has somehow become responsible for everything that goes wrong.

And if, by strong argument, they are forced to admit that he couldn't possibly be totally responsible for everything, they then fall back on the assertion that his behaviorism in office merely makes

The political turn-over in Britain is savage, without any particular target. Here, the unrest thinks it does have a target. Pundits pontificate at penultimate peril to their own proud pretensions.

Swift As Hounds

March was wet, March was kindly, March brought spring precisely on schedule, March had moments of April. But above all, March was fast, swift as hounds as it bounded out from the frozen lairs of winter toward the sun-pooled hillsides of a warmer world.

As we try to look back, it almost seem as if we had really seen none of it, hardly noticed it in its passage. It generated speed from its variety of behavior. The long monotone of February, dry and even-temperatured, was a whole season in itself. That is how to slow things down---let nothing vary more than a degree day or two from day to day .To construct a swift month, or to pick up the sensation of speed in life, mix all potential elements together in a continualy whirling succession of hots and colds, snow, sleet and rain, cirrus, cumulus and stratus, freeze and thaw, flood and ebb, and, in the human, alternating assaults of spring energy and equinoctial

Mix all these elements together and you have something approaching our March of 1967, and an explanation of why it went so swiftly, with hardly time for anything more than one paralyzing touch of that fever.

What apparently happened, say the voting machine custodians, is that the voters pulled down the little levers to in dicate their choice, and then pushed then back up again. They apparently assumed

pushed the levers back up was to cancel what they had done. They effectively wiped out their choice, their vote did no register at all. Pulling the lever which opens the curtain actually casts the vote. The use of the voting machine is much easier than it used to be in the days when the party lever was mandatory. Now it's a simple matter of flicking the individual levers. But there are still some

Bombing Halt 'Overshadowed'

These officials view the President's decision as a victory for those within the government who, in the wake of the Communists' Tet offensive, argued for a major change in policy.
