





### The Board And The Tax Rate

Just about every imaginable circumstance has transpired to present our Board of Directors with a most difficult and painful task if they are to attempt to keep the promise Manchester taxpayers have been trying to exact from their public officials during the past few

It is quite apparent that if Manchester is to continue to be a place where people can afford to live and in which industry can afford to locate, it must find some way to keep its tax rates con-

The ideal way to do this is also the only way to do it. The only way to do it is to rate and provide the expansion of the functions of Manchester government at a rate which dovetails into natural increases in the grand list of taxable property and, optimistically, into a gradual decrease of the bond retirement and debt service burden we shouldered in our post-war school building program. Accomplishing this is not easy in any

year. But it has been a guideline which several Boards of Directors have now kept before them, and one which they have succeeded in honoring in the main, with the exception of last year's rate. This was a rate which, camouflaged by an exorbitant grand list revaluation, pretended to go down in figure while it went up in reality. Still, the real increase was

This year, the Board of Directors finds itself confronted with the recommendation of the General Manager that the tax rate be permitted to go up 4.6 mills, which would be a real, open, and extremely hard to pay increase.

office pledged to pay-as-you-go principles, iedicated to the maintenance of a stable tax rate, has a difficult, but not necessarily thankless task ahead. The grand list, readjusting after its too big a leap forward in last year's revaluation, has provided only a moderate increase. The various town departments, and the General Manager from his position of sureillance over them, have found an endless number of new or additional spending opportunities which are either inevitable, mandatory, or highly desirable. Yet the departments and the General

Manager know, when they ask and propose, that they are likely to be subject o some cut. That is what the Board of Directors is for; otherwise the town tax rate would have been twice its present figure long before this. It is the duty of the Board of Directors

to be hard and tough, and to apply the cut until they are sure that the screams of anguish they hear about them have begun to be at least partly genuine. To behave this way is not to plot against the good servants or the legitimate needs of the town, but to give the

taxpayers their moment of voice and No doubt, as the General Manager observes and implores, the day may come when the cities and towns can succeed in persuading other tax-collecting sovereignties, like the state and federal governments, to absorb a greater share of the home ground expenses of the cities

and towns. In the meantime, however, our tax rate will be as low or as high as we ourselves choose to make it. That choice has already been signaled to the Board of Directors: let the Board aim at making this a year when a number of very good and necessary things have to wait for the town tax base to resume its

### Champion Rug-Puller

As the stories of how Governor Rockefeller progressed to his decision come leaking out, they reveal a singular lack of concern for the loyalties and eelings of other men.

The relationship between Governors

didn't stop, Instead, he went faster. The Rockefeller and Romney would make one illustration of this. While Romney was still ostensibly his candidate, and while, in fact, he was supposed to be in Romney's state helping collect campaign funds for Romney, Rockefeller took that most strange and unusual moment to confess a revival of his own interest in the nomination. That gentle stab in the back undoubtedly went deep enough to influence the subsequent thinking of Romney as, a few days later, read the latest polls from New Hampshire and decided to get out of the race in time to give Rockefeller a

to clear the way for Rockefeller, and then Rockefeller refused to run. It has taken second thoughts, how ever, to realize that, if he had known Rockefeller would not enter, Romney himself would never have pulled out. And, if the polls in New Hampshire were off as much on the Republican side as they were on the Democratic side, Romney might even have come out of New Hampshire with a respectable run. n any case, he would still have been on the track, fighting his tough up hill cross country kind of race, and still capable of attracting the support of Republicans envious of the potential freedom of choice developing among

Then there was the relationship between Governor Rockefeller and Senator Thruston Morton of Kentucky. That valiant party moderate, and former national chairman, had just announced his own approaching retirement from the Senate, citing unspecified personal reasons for his decision not to run again. The guessing everywhere was that he had received seriously unpleasant news concerning his health. But, after a meeting with Governor Rockefeller, Senator Morton gave the Governor his agreement to head the national campaign on his behalf. Obviously, the Kentucky Senator thought he had found a cause he wished to serve no matter what the circumstances which had, just a few days before, led him to his announcement

The beauty of this standby sentence is that, if it is delivered at a different pace or with a different jump of emphasis from one word to another, it can be repeated an infinite number of times and still sound like fairly respectable commentary progressing from one point

to another in orderly fashion. The kind of Instant Comment Kit which can be devised for those who have to produce vocal reaction some 30 seconds after the surprise news development is not of much assistance to those commentators who may function in the slower and somehow much more tortured world of the written comment
