#### The Small Flame Of Hope

Hawks and doves seem momentarily united on the proposition that developments potentially opening in the direction of peace in Vietnam are ground for cautious and prayerful encourage-

The common denominator truth, we think, is that all manners of opinion about the war in Vietnam reached, some time ago, even if for different reasons, a common denominator kind of shudden over the continued existence of this war, frustrating, inconclusive and costly to everybody

Now, by the grace of what inner factors and decisions no one really knows, the partial bombing de-escalation which President Johnson ordered as the first American step toward de-escalation and possible negotiation has, surprisingly, met a response from Hanoi which is, without being particularly affirmative or encouraging, something better than a

So, petty though the Hanoi step has been-merely, after all, an agreement to talk about how to arrange to talkthere has been a small puff of favoring air for the small flame the President lit Sunday night.

It is a time when a whole humanity which is sick of this war has to hold its breath, for fear of blowing this small flame of hope out before the next piece of fuel can possibly be added to it. tension and dram There is as much about having such a small flickering alive and perhaps capable of getting stronger as there would be about some great new escalation of the conflict.

But it is to be hoped that, if the flame can be kept alive long enough, it will begin to draw into itself new fuel from the gathering resolve of the statesmen involved, not to miss, but to make the most of this perhaps last desperate hope for ridding the world of this tragedy nobody really ever wanted. Perhaps, in the test, even some of those who engineered our way into it will feel tempted to direct their pragmatic competence to the careful and tedious and expert work that has to be done at high levels in order to get everybody out of it.

It has become a war in which nobody was ever going to win anything. The need is for a peace in which nobody will lose anything vitally, rightfully

#### From The Veteran Of Algeria

Of all the sidelights bearing upon the possibilities of negotiation over Vietnam, none has seemed a more significant flicker of possible revelation than the statement of President de Gaulle of France, issued before the first sign of agreement for a first meeting had apeared from Hanol.

Perhaps the French leader had advance knowledge that Hanoi was going to avoid outright rejection of President Johnson's move Sunday. Perhaps, on he other hand, he had decided to try to influence Hanoi into making some kind of non-negative response.

In any case, what the French President said was the first pleasant word about this country which had come from his lips in a long time.

"Regarding the President of the United States," said this de Gaulle statement, "the fact that he publicly prascribes the halt of the bombings of North Vietnam, even though this halt is not yet either general or unconditional, seems to be a first step in the direction of peace and, consequently, an act

of reason and political courage." Such praise from de Gaulle, on such an issue, has its particular weight because of one phase of his own career which was probably his greatest, even hough it will never become his most famous. History will name him as the leader who kept the idea of a free France alive during the impossible days of World War II.

But if that was de Gaulle's most spectacular performance on the world tage, the truly finest and most courageous role he ever played was that in which he accomplished the liquidation of the French war in Algeria. That war, in many of its characteristics, has always seemed the real prototype to the present struggle in Vietnam, with a great modern army inconclusive against
