

Several Big Cities Calm After Violence

Violence, looting and arson scorched sections of Baltimore and Pittsburgh, Sunday, but Army troops and National Guardsmen, rushed in to quell the disorders, enforced an uneasy calm today.

Washington and Chicago, hardest hit by the violence which broke out in the wake of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Thursday night, were quiet. Authorities turned to the task of trying to provide homes and food for the victims of the riots.

Twenty-four have died in the trouble which struck more than a dozen U.S. cities. In addition, more than 1,200 have been injured and almost 6,000 arrested.

While the violence in most of the major cities ebbed, trouble struck again in Nashville, Tenn. Only hours after segments of the 4,000 National Guardsmen were on duty, the ROTC building on the campus of Tennessee A&I State University, site of recent racial violence, was destroyed by fire Sunday night. Police said it appeared to be the work of arsonists.

Violence in Baltimore broke out Saturday and threatened to spread Sunday into Baltimore County, causing Maryland Gov. Spiro T. Agnew to call for federal troops. Almost 2,000 soldiers rushed to the city to aid 6,000 National Guardsmen, and shortly after midnight officials said the situation seemed to be under control. Four persons were killed in

the violence and more than 300 injured. One official said there had been 420 fires set, 500 stores looted and more than 1,350 persons arrested.

More than 1,800 National Guardsmen marched into Pittsburgh's predominantly Negro Hill District Sunday night, but by early today a state police official said "things are settling down."

Scattered firebombings and looting were reported far into the night, but the frequency dropped sharply about three hours after a 7 p.m. curfew went into effect. The streets were almost deserted by late evening.

The shaky calm in Chicago and in Washington was being enforced by nearly 22,000 Army troops.

Thousands of Mourners Start March in Memphis

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Thousands of mourning Negroes and civil rights leaders marched from a gray stone church toward the ultramodern city hall today in silent tribute to the man who had planned to lead them, the slain Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

The marchers walked in ranks of eight, but on the front row there was a vacant space. That was where King would have been. They stepped off at 10:16 a.m. CST.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Mrs. Martin Luther King Jr. came to Memphis today and joined the silent march of thousands of Negroes and civil rights leaders in honor of her slain husband. Mrs. King and three of her four children joined the march, which had halted a few minutes after it started to wait for her, at the corner of Main and Beale Streets. She had arrived at 11:17 a.m. CST from Atlanta aboard the private jet plane of singer Harry Belafonte. The plane touched down just one minute after the march had started from a gray stone church and headed toward City Hall.

In the front ranks were Percy Sutton, Manhattan, N.Y., borough president; Charles Coggins, president of the American Federation of Teachers; Jerry Wurf, international president of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees; Walter Reuther, president of the United Auto Workers, and his wife.

Many of the marchers wore black bands on their arms and carried signs identifying their organizations.

King's widow, Coretta, and the three oldest King children left Atlanta aboard the jet plane of singer Harry Belafonte to join the march.

"I've got my three children with me — and that helps," she said.

An hour before the march was to start, hundreds of helmeted National Guardsmen, bayonets attached to rifles, stood on the wide plaza of the modern city hall, overlooking the Mississippi River, and throughout an area stretching three blocks in every direction from that point.

A National Guard helicopter circled constantly over the building complex through which the march route passed.

Despite threatening skies, parade marshals refused to allow marchers to carry anything that could be used as a weapon — including umbrellas.

Dempsey Proclaims Holiday

Tribute to the memory of slain civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. continues today and Tuesday to reshape Connecticut activity ranging from school sessions to 30 local Democratic delegate primaries.

Gov. John Dempsey has proclaimed Tuesday, the day of King's funeral in Atlanta, Ga., a statewide public holiday. As a result, the elections of delegate slates to the state Democratic convention has been put off till Wednesday.

The state's chief executive also urged Sunday night that all schools remain closed and that businesses and industries suspend operations Tuesday.

Dempsey said the day of public mourning for the assassinated spokesman for nonviolence would be extended to all banks in the state by separate proclamation issued today.

Meanwhile, the city of New Haven retains much of its Sunday calm today under a proclamation issued Saturday by Mayor Richard C. Lee. He ordered all city offices and public schools closed and asked merchants and industries wherever possible to observe the day in mourning.

Leaders of New Haven's Black Coalition had urged the day before.

Mansfield Cautions Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield cautioned Congress today against impetuous action in the wake of racial violence that followed the slaying of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

He also said that plans for President Johnson to address a joint session of Congress were "very indefinite."

At the same time an aide to House Republican Leader Gerald R. Ford said the Michigan congressman will not support immediate House approval of the Senate-passed civil rights bill, dealing a blow to hopes the bill might avoid lengthy work in a conference committee.

But Ford, the aide said, does not plan to make a leadership issue of the controversial matter, scheduled for a House vote Wednesday.

103 Survivors Reported Jetliner Crashes in London

LONDON (AP) — A BOAC jetliner with 128 persons on board crashed in flames on a runway at London's airport today just after taking off.

The British Overseas Airways Corp. said it knew of 103 survivors. The airport fire brigade reported three bodies recovered from the wreckage of the four-engine Boeing 707 bound for Australia. Police said they knew of five killed — three women, a man and a child. Eighteen persons are missing.

Scotland Yard reported it knew of 22 persons injured in hospitals, some of them badly hurt. Thirty others were in the airport medical center. The Australia House in London said 24 of the jet's passengers aboard.

It crashed on No. 5 runway in the center of the airfield. The plane's first stop was to be Zurich, Switzerland. Other stops were listed as Tel Aviv, Israel; Tehran, Iran; New Delhi, India; Singapore, and Perth and Sydney, Australia.

A BOAC spokesman said the plane carried 115 passengers and 11 crew. BOAC said five of the aircraft's technical crew — the men in the cockpit — were safe. But they had no knowledge of the six stewards and hostesses aboard.

Sir Giles Guthrie, chairman of the state-owned airline, was at the crash scene.

A short time later, however, BOAC said it knew of 103 survivors.

Airport officials said the plane's pilot, Capt. Charles Taylor, radioed two minutes after takeoff that an engine had fallen off.

The plane made a left turn, attempting to reach a cross runway. On impact the port wing fell off.

Black smoke poured from the plane as it lurched in Airport emergency services rushed out alongside it.

A witness said: "There was a terrific pall of black smoke and flames coming from the aircraft. Two thirds of the plane appears to be intact with the tail and still sticking up. It lies almost in the center of the airport, 500 or 600 yards from the main buildings in the central area."

It crashed within sight of Queen's Building, the main passenger terminal building.

In Lindbergh Law Death Clause Ruled Unconstitutional

WASHINGTON (AP) — The death penalty provision of the Lindbergh kidnaping law was ruled unconstitutional today by the Supreme Court.

In a 6-2 decision, the court said the provision, enacted by Congress in 1934, needlessly chills the exercise of basic constitutional rights.

The provision says the death penalty may be imposed only on the recommendation of a jury. The high court reasoned that this discourages trial by jury and encourages guilty pleas since the case is thereby taken out of a jury's hands.

"The defendant ingenious enough to seek a jury acquittal stands forwarned that, if the jury finds him guilty and does not wish to spare his life, he will die," said Justice Potter Stewart, for the majority, recognized that the provision avoids "the more drastic alternatives" of mandatory capital punishment in every interstate

kidnaping case where the victim is harmed.

However, he added: "Whatever might be said of Congress' objectives, they cannot be pursued by means that needlessly chill the exercise of basic constitutional rights."

Stewart went on to say the goal of limiting the death penalty to cases in which the jury recommends it, is an entirely legitimate one.

"But that goal can be achieved without penalizing those defendants who plead guilty and demand jury trial," he said.

The Lindbergh law was passed in the aftermath of the infamous kidnaping and murder of Charles A. Lindbergh Jr., infant son of the aviation hero, Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, in 1932.

It was exactly 32 years ago today that Bruno Hauptmann was electrocuted after being convicted of kidnaping the child.

Justices Byron R. White and Hugo L. Black dissented. White, speaking also for Black, said the provision should not have been struck down.

Instead, he said, the court should have made it clear that pleas of guilty and waivers of jury trial "should be carefully examined before they are accepted in order to make sure that they have been neither coerced nor encouraged by the death penalty power in the jury."

Justice Thurgood Marshall, a former solicitor general, did not participate in the case.

An important aspect of the decision is that it leaves standing other provisions of the federal kidnaping law.

This was enacted in 1932 and the death penalty clause was added two years later with several other amendments.

In January 1967 Chief Judge William Timbers of the U.S. District Court in Connecticut declared the entire law unconstitutional because he found the death penalty clause put an unconstitutional price on asserting the right to a trial by jury.

The Justice Department appealed to the Supreme Court which today agreed with Timbers' reasoning on the death penalty but salvaged the remainder of the law.

"There is no reason to invalidate the law in its entirety simply because its capital punishment law violates the Constitution," Stewart said.

Israelis, Arabs Battle

Israeli troops in helicopters chased a band of Arab commandos out of the Negev Desert and pursued them six miles inside Jordan south of the Dead Sea today, the Israeli army reported. The Israelis withdrew after inflicting a number of casualties and blowing up part of an Arab guerrilla complex, the army added.

A military spokesman in Tel Aviv said the action was a limited one that lasted 105 minutes. He denied a Jordanian claim that Israeli armored columns and helicopter troops covered by jet fighters had invaded Jordan.

Jordanian military headquarters also reported fighting north of the Dead Sea near the Allenby Bridge, a major crossing point between Jordan and the Israeli-occupied sector of Jordan. The sound of gunfire could be heard in Amman, 25 miles east of the cease-fire line.

5,500 More Square Miles Put Off U.S. Bomb Limits

SAIGON (AP) — President Johnson has put almost 5,500 more square miles of North Vietnam off limits to American bombers, U.S. sources said today. Below the demilitarized zone, allied ground forces reported killing more than 700 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong in weekend fighting.

Informed sources in Saigon said the American air forces have been told to keep their raids below the 19th Parallel, which is about 170 miles above the demilitarized zone. In the last four days U.S. bombers North Vietnam's southern panhandle struck no farther north than 180 miles above the DMZ, supply lines and convoys.

Trudeau Elected By Party

OTTAWA (AP) — The Liberal Party's choice of Pierre Elliott Trudeau as Canada's next prime minister has set the stage for a confrontation with the new Conservative leader, Robert Stanfield, in a national election later this year.

It will be a test of strength between two new personalities who are expected to give Canadian politics its biggest shot in the arm since John Diefenbaker and Lester B. Pearson began their rivalry a decade ago. Both Trudeau and Stanfield are newcomers to the national political scene and are anxious to seek a mandate from the public which will bring an end to minority government under which Pearson has ruled for the past five years.

Trudeau was elected Liberal leader Saturday night on the fourth ballot after a coalition of middle-of-the-road and right-wing rivals failed to head off the

39 Dead, 33 Missing Wreckage Probed In Indiana Blast

RICHMOND, Ind. (AP) — Weary searchers continue today tugging at the wreckage of buildings shattered by an explosion which struck the business area as shoppers crowded streets and shops.

Thirty-nine bodies had been recovered and 33 other persons were reported missing.

Fire followed the Saturday explosion in this eastern Indiana city and spread to adjacent buildings. Three buildings were destroyed and five damaged severely in a two-block area. Windows were shattered for blocks around.

More than 100 persons were injured. Eighteen remained in hospitals today, three in critical condition.

State police said the blast erupted in the basement of Marting Arms Co., a sporting goods store where gunpowder was stored for hunters and skeet shooters. Richmond Fire Marshal Fred Klotz said a large shipment of gunpowder reportedly was delivered to the store recently.

"It seemed like somebody pulled the whole world out from under me," said Leo Collins, who was walking near the Marting store. Collins was knocked down by escaped injury.

Capt. Kenneth E. Faust of the Indiana National Guard said the ceiling of a restaurant where he was having lunch began falling on customers.

"I ran into the street and saw an injured woman atop Sergeant's paint store," Faust said. "I got a ladder and with the aid of others got her down. She said she had been blown to the roof by the explosion."

Faust said people helped clear bricks and debris to get to the injured.

"There was no concern among the helpers for their own safety, even after one of them was injured slightly by exploding ammunition," he said.

Only a crater remained where the sporting goods store stood at the Sixth and Main Streets.

Bolton Mrs. Butterfield Asks Moves To Ease 'Financial Crisis'

Mrs. Virginia Butterfield, a miller, on a 1968 property evaluation of the Board of Education and former members of the Board of Finance, has appealed to the taxpayers of Bolton in a prepared statement today to evaluate the financial crisis which is in process of becoming a fiscal reality.

"If drastic measures are not taken at this time," she said, "the average taxpayer will not in a few years be able to meet the necessary mill rate payments and selling one's property will not be the answer. Buyers will not exist."

Saying that industry will not consider Bolton "with its fantastic mill rate projections estimated at 88-90 mills increase in the next three years," she added that the answer lies in "administration" and suggested a meeting of all town boards and officials to plan a course of action to deal with the crisis.

She proposed a six-point plan of action: Alert townships to possible drastic mill rate increases; request the Public Building Commission to eliminate specifically on the new school; secure financial advice to evaluate the damage that will be experienced to our credit rating if the tax structure is not administered properly; and how it will affect our future bonding capacity.

She advocated a contract with an outside evaluation of the administrative set-up, having a study made of all town employees' duties, considering a possible change in form of government under the home rule act, and alerting townships to become more fiscally aware of the drain of all taxes upon them.

"Once the town has nullified its responsibilities," she concluded, "there will be nothing left but a nonentity at the end of one of the long arms of the Region 10 Octopus. The Town of Bolton will be just a memory."
