MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Thousands of mourning Negroes and civil rights leaders marched from a gray stone church toward the ultramodern city hall today in silent tribute to the man who had planned to lead them, the slain Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

The marchers walked in ranks of eight, but on the front row there was a vacant space. That was where King would have been. They stepped off at 10:16 a.m.

Such are the questions the American people have been trying to find the answers to, during these past few days of violence, prayer, rioting, kneeling, tears, talk, shame, hate, penitence, bitterness.

Only a month ago, a good part of this nation thought it could take the apocalyptic pronouncements of The National Advisory Commission On Civil Disorders as some kind of unnecessary and unwise extremism. Two Who Walked On the night of the assassination Dr. Martin Luther King, when the news itself was like a sudden, mad hot wind blowing into every dark corner of America, there were two American mayors (there may have been more whose action has not come to our notice) who reacted in the same way

after the news had reached them. In New York, Mayor John Lindsay went out and walked the streets of Harlem, as he had already done on other nights of tension. No one knows how much it helped to have him do this; perhaps it played a very important part in keeping Harlem as relatively quiet and restrained as it did remain. In any case, there was the mayor of the city. doing what he felt he ought to do, and what he had to do, regardless of his own personal safety. In Hartford, Mayor Ann Uccello went

A Bombing Halt, A Bombshell

To this year of seemingly implausible and even impossible political happen-ings President Johnson has now conributed the most extraordinary event. It could win him a larger place in history than a bitter last-ditch fight for renomination and re-election. For by accompanying his dramatic announcement of an open-ended suspension

of the bombings of North Vietnam with an abdication of his own quest for office, he gave significant credibility to what would otherwise have been discounted as a desperate political gambit.
