The Specifics Of Equality For the past several days, we Amer icans have been showing how much we cared. The panoply of our grief has been spread high and wide over the

We do care. Nor is it of tremendous negative importance that we care in a remorseful (we're sorry we didn't do more before) and in a self-protecting (perhaps if we prove the sincerity of our good intentions now we can still have a nation) sort of way. We are all human beings; none perfect; if there is any divine system of grace it has to encompass those who come to the right decisions late or under some degree of

We care. That is the demonstration of our services and days of mourning for Dr. Martin Luther King. That is why we have been proclaiming anew, and with greater fervor and intensity than before, our loyalty to the spirit and objective of his crusade.

Proceed, then, to ask the next question. What does this caring, this loyalty this fervor require of us in the future? How do we make the future different

The key answer to the key question we have to keep asking ourselves is contained in Dr. King's own prophetic awareness that his mission was as much mission of freeing white Americans

White America must be freed from its own chains of thinking and feeling ust as much as black America must e freed from them.

How far is white America likely to be berating itself now that it feels reewed intention, renewed urgency?

Let us first measure the goals. The one name for them all is equality fot a measure of equality. Not concesions toward equality. Nothing less than quality in all the full breadth and scope

of the word. Total equality. Now, before we promise ourselve that this is our goal, let us define total

There are a few key things it has to mean if it means anything. It has to mean the hardest thing

as well as the easiest. It has to mean Negro occupancy the house next door as quickly as it could mean some undesignated house on the other side of town, and it has to mean it makes no difference, totally no difference, anywhere.

It has to mean the admission that ilthough so far the matches have been n the wrong hands, applied under the vrong circumstances, it does happen to e fire which is the best and most eflicient action program which can be applied to the ghettoes of America. It has to mean anybody's daughter as

well as Dean Rusk's daughter. These are some of the sample specifics

These are the specifics lurking underneath the fervent resolves, the desperate prayers of the past few days. If we annot encompass them now and rerive them into our own thought and eeling, that is an incapacity of our reolve, the fatal weakness in our intenion. Our first line of prayer, like Martin Lather King's first line of crusade, must be not for the oppressed, but for ourselves, that we can make ourselves free of our own incapacities, our own im-

perfect humanness.

How faint and weak are the only real lines the world has toward its own future security and survival may be udged from the wistful volunteer report made, at the United Nations the other day, by five of the world's smaller rations, none of them big enough really to attack a neighbor, or start trying to run the world.

What Sweden, Denmark, Finland, Norway and Austria reported to the United Nations Special Committee on Peace-Keeping Operations was that each of them had now voluntarily undertaken to service contingents of military forces suitable for United Nations peace-

keeping operations. This is something Canada has already done, being the leader in this matter. That sets up a situation, then, in which six members of the United Nations are voluntarily maintaining units ready to be of service to the United Nations where and when and if that organization decides it wants to use them.

By their decision, these six nations are setting up the potential nucleus of a United Nations police force. They are ready, if the United Nations

And if the United Nations itself should ever be ready to accept the idea of a real international police force, there would be many more small nations willing to contribute forces, there is little doubt about that,

Possibly, if they ever did really get together, all the small nations in the world could convince the few big nations, the few bellicose small nations, that they had better cede their own right to use arms to the potential police functioning of a world organization. But not even the small nations are moving in any unity toward such a policy. The joint willingness of these six to provide the first standing contingents for such a force stands as a rather faint, wistful whisper in the midst of much bigger noises from the nations concerned with keeping their own rank and power in the world as it is, not as it might be.

A Standard Has Been Set Up

Lyndon Johnson will leave the Presidency on January 20, 1969. This can be the only meaning of his declaration last Sunday night. It set off burst after burst of speculation. Some had to do with the campaign and the election. Could Mr. Johnson be drafted for another term? How would the fortunes of other Democratic candidates, declared and undeclared, be affected? Would there be a shattering of the Democratic party? What would be the effect on the tepublicans' choice of a nominee? Were the Republicans' chances now improved? Some of the speculation bore on the war. Would the President's withdrawal speed or show Hanoi's acceptance of the invitation to negotiate? Some of it was concerned with the impact on the United States' standing in the world, some with the consequences to the administration's

The more that was indulged in, the more the main point was missed. This complex, unreadable man had done something dazzlingly simple. He had put the good of the nation above his own interests, his own pride, his own power. He had recognized the disturbed and divided condition of the country. Is Staged 100,000 troops of five nations fanned out today over the Saigon area and 11 provinces around the capital in the biggest allied offensive of the war. Only light, scattered action was reported, and a general lull in the ground fighting in Vietnam con-

tinued for the second day. The U.S. Command announced that the big new sweep around the capital, Operation Toan Thang, or Complete Victory, began Monday. Its objective is the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops who got away rom the 50,000 American and South Vietnamese troops in Operation Quyet Thang, or Resolved to Win.

U.S. headquarters announced Tuesday that Quyet Thang, a sweep of five provinces around Saigon, had ended with 2,658 enemy killed. But when it began early in March, a force of 13,000 Viet Cong and units of two North Vietnamese regiments were reported maneuvering around the capital, possibly for a renewal of the Tet offensive

U.S. spokesmen explained that Quyet Thang and all other allied operations in the 3rd Corps area terminated Sunday, and all allied forces which had been participating in them be gan Toan Thang on Monday.
