Combers Wed 25 Years. Mr. and Mrs. Edward F. Three Groups Back Busing

Another church council, PTA group, and a teacher organization have voted to endorse the continuation of Project Concern in Manchester. They are the church council of Second Congregational Church, the executive board of the Buckley School PTA, and the Manchester Federation of Teachers.

Under Project Concern, 62 non-white youngsters from Hartford's North End are currently being bused to Manchester. The Manchester Federation of Teachers has asked that the program be continued here next year.

The church resolution stated: "The Council of Second Congregational Church reaffirms its support of Project Concern and urges both its continuance and an affirmative vote on the referendum. Two years ago, when participation in the project was first being considered, Second Church voted its support of the educational experiment and its clergy took a strong public stand, the council points out. It adds: 'It is the consensus of Second Church that Project Concern has been a successful program and has benefited both Hartford and Manchester... not only economically and educationally, but also morally.' The Buckley PTA executive board said: 'For the past two years, 13 children have attended Buckley School as part of the busing experiment. On March 19 the members of the Child Study Group invited Project Concern parents to a coffee and had an opportunity to hear their reactions about the project. These parents indicated their pleasure with their youngsters' involvement in the experiment, and their enthusiasm convinced Buckley School parents of the need to continue this project.' The Manchester Federation of Teachers, in voting its support for the project, also called for an affirmative vote at the school referendum. The Smoky Hill Bomb and Grenade Range of the Air Force is the site of the school. King lived and died, and the kind of society which denies equal opportunity.

Marching had been a big part of King's life. In his death, there was a final march for Martin Luther King. His wreath-brocaded coffin traveled more than four miles over Atlanta streets in a faded green farm wagon drawn by two brown mules—symbolic of the poor whose cause he had taken up. Thousands marched with King the last time.

Ahead of the old wagon, behind it, beside it, in wide and uneven columns, numbering up to 20,000, they marched with the man who was called by most of the black mourners simply "our leader."

At the Morehouse rites following the march from Ebenezer Baptist Church, attendance was estimated at 100,000 by police. Red Cross workers cared for several hundred persons struck down by heat exhaustion in 80-degree weather.

The prominent names at the memorial services in Ebenezer, where King was co-pastor with his father, included Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, representing President Johnson. The vice president got up to honor the slain minister. King's close associate and now his successor, performed the memorial service in Ebenezer. Other notables at the service included Mrs. John F. Kennedy, who like Mrs. King was vi-

Danish Students Protest
COPENHAGEN (AP) — More than 3,000 test-tube students today, lighting fires and breaking windows in protest against the new government's cancellation of free vacation travel inside Denmark, claimed a victory in Hunan, Chairman of the National Education Commission.

The demonstrators carried such signs as "Bring Back Our Free Rail Travel," "We Want Pol," "Give us L&D," and "The Government Doesn't Like Children."

The non-socialist coalition which came to power in January canceled the free travel as an economy measure.

Hostage Released
BASSARI, Sardinia (AP) — An exhausted, bearded man owner stumbled out of the jail to freedom early today, two weeks after captured bandit leader Graziano Messina appealed to his hand to release the hostage.

Relatives reportedly paid \$48,000 ransom for Giovanni Campus, 32, who was in the hands of the kidnapers 34 days before he was set free on a path leading to a main road in northern Sardinia.

Police had begun to fear for Campus' life because of the long delay in his release after the radio appeal by Messina, Sardinia's No. 1 bandit, who was caught at a roadblock March 20.

Police said Messina admitted his hand also was holding Nino Petretto, son of an automobile dealer. Defying Sardinian tradition, Petretto's family has refused to pay ransom and has vowed a vendetta against the kidnapers if the young man is killed.

Red Rebellion Quelled
PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — Government forces have put down a Red rebellion in three Cambodian provinces, the official news agency announced today.

The agency said government units had defeated Khmers Rouges-Cambodian Communists—in the provinces of Kampong Kohong and Kompong.

The agency also charged that U.S. troops penetrated 200 yards into Cambodia on April 6 and in an ensuing clash killed one Cambodian border guard and wounded four others.

Anti-Maoists Quarters
HONG KONG (AP) — Anti-Maoists have established a four-province headquarters in four-province headquarters in Shaokwan, a strategic town in northern Kwangtung province, persons arriving from Red China said today.

One arrival said all former pro-Mao officials in Shaokwan were deported to other areas. He said the forces opposed to Communist Chairman Mao Tse-tung included "a large number

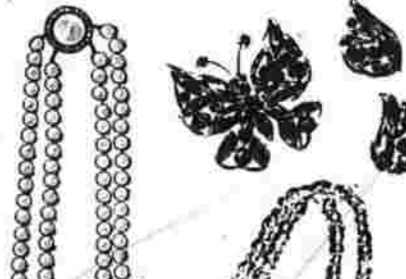

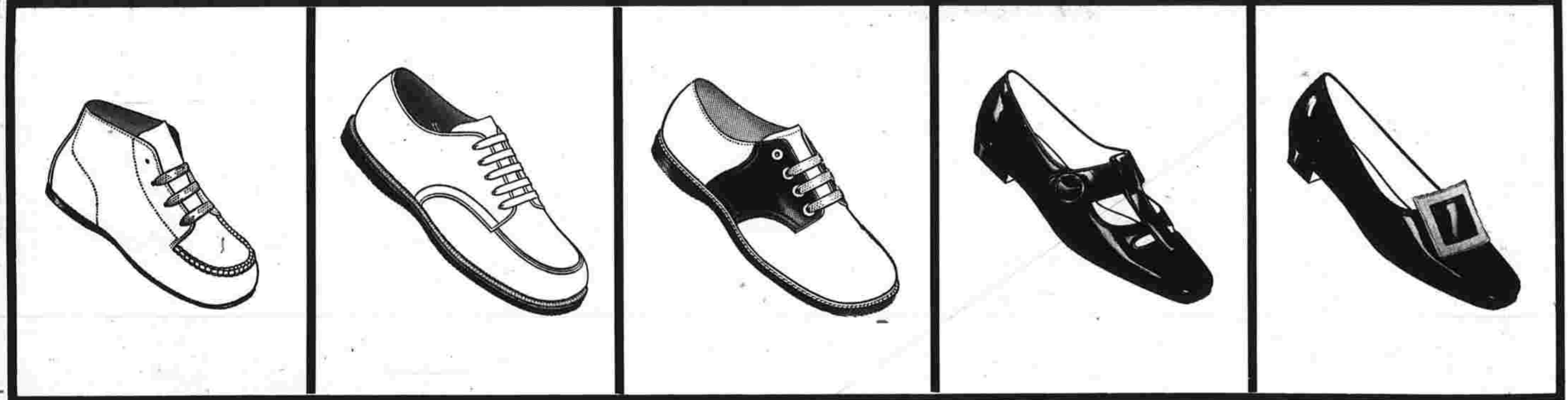

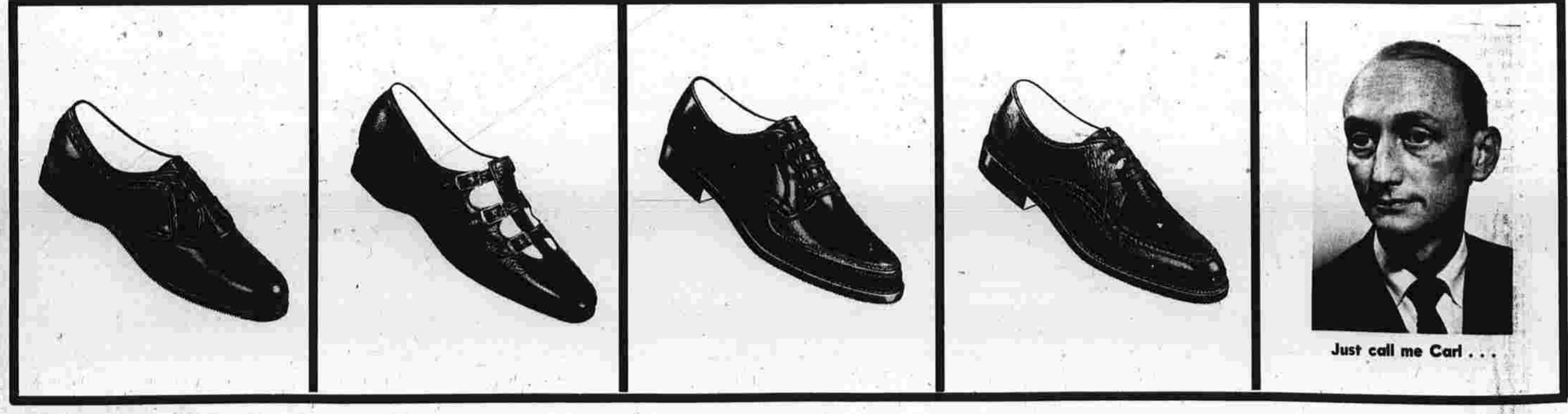

Saigon Target Biggest Ally Drive Is Staged

(Continued from Page One)

U.S. Command said the aim of the new drive is "the elimination of enemy forces throughout the 11 provinces in the 3rd Corps tactical zone."

The operation involves three U.S. divisions and the equivalent of a fourth, three South Vietnamese divisions, two South Vietnamese paratroop and marine task forces, the 1st Australian Task Force, which includes New Zealand troops, and the Royal Thai Army Regiment.

U.S. units taking part are the 1st, 25th and 26th Infantry Divisions, the 3rd Brigade of the 101st Airborne Division, the 199th Light Infantry Brigade and the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment.

A spokesman said Operation Toan Thang combines the "efforts and resources of all allied forces in the 3rd Corps tactical zone" in accomplishing the task.

There was no report of casualties so far in the operation.

No major ground fighting was reported elsewhere in Vietnam for the first time in nearly three months not a single enemy mortar, rocket or artillery round landed on the shell-scarred Marine combat base at Khe Sanh over a 24-hour period. From Jan. 21 until Tuesday, North Vietnamese gunners had kept up a relentless daily shelling, sometimes as many as 1,000 rounds in one day, sometimes as few as 50.

The 20,000-man allied force that relieved the Marines at Khe Sanh last week continued finding bodies of North Vietnamese killed in the relentless air and artillery bombardment with which U.S. forces had pounded the base in the north-west corner of the country.

On from the U.S. 1st Air Cavalry Division and South Vietnamese troops said they found 169 enemy bodies Tuesday bringing their total to 277 in four days. Allied units also discovered two weapons caches containing 27 individual and 35 crew-served weapons, 1,500 mortar rounds, 2,000 Chinese grenades, 800 pounds of dynamite and 50,000 rifle bullets.

The big U.S. B-52 Stratofortress flew four raids in the central highlands Tuesday night, attacking close to the Cambodian border amid evidence of a North Vietnamese buildup there. New supply roads and infiltration trails winding in from Cambodia have been spotted.

The giant bombers also have been saturating the A Shau Valley farther north, where U.S. intelligence reports say intense new enemy activity is under way. Three other B-52 raids were flown Tuesday night and this morning 16 miles southeast of Hue, not far from the A Shau Valley.

In Saigon, President Nguyen Van Thieu asked the National Assembly to vote general mobilization of the country. "While preparing for peace," he told a joint House-Senate session, "we must increase our fighting potential more than ever."

Thieu on March 31 had said his government would order mobilization this fall if the Viet Cong continued their attacks. His only explanation for introducing the bill now was that the government's position has to be strong so the Communists will "know they cannot win" and will accept peace talks. But Washington's maneuvering for peace talks has many of the

Neither on Page 24, nor on any other page of that issue was there any story under any such headline, so that the only disarray illustrated was one inside the normally efficient operations of the New York Times Herald.

The Medium Was The Nation
There was a long span of time Tuesday—the seemingly endless singing of the hymn "Where He Leads Me I Will Follow" at Albany—when this medium was one mood and one thought and one action.

In that long, endless moment, with the slow words of the hymn repeating themselves endlessly, it seemed that all the world and all its problems and all its unities and disunities alike had dissolved into that one continuous wave of sound. It felt as if it could only go on forever, prove truly endless, one thought, this one experience could be all that remained of human existence on this earth, in this society.

But the throats which had been producing the hymn did not take the endlessness. The moment was not endless. Eventually, it dissolved into its component parts.

It was on this day, as on the day of the funeral of President John F. Kennedy, that television attained a stature almost beyond the stature of art, because it bound a whole nation into the final realization of the depth and meaning of the tragedy being enacted.

This was, and is, remember, the medium which, in some performances, seems hardly able to pause between commercials to give its viewers the news. It is the medium which, in its deliberative choices of what is supposed to interest, absorb, entertain the American people, sometimes seems incapable of taste and sensitivity, it is a medium which sometimes seems, in its serious attempts to represent us to ourselves, a prying invader, a manipulator of emotions, a sensationalist of our inhibitions.

Yet, on Tuesday, this same medium was willing to devote all day to the singing of "Where He Leads Me I Will Follow." This same medium brought dignity and beauty to the impressive and united it helped impose on the nation. And it did this, exercising all the senses and all the faculties of the human mind, becoming the nation, the instrumentality becoming the reality.

One of the component parts of the day was the Negro people. It was brought into the nation unified on television as it had never been brought into the nation before. That portion of the Negro population which was on display all day Tuesday was that segment which has risen to the top in those departments by which the standards of individuals in society are rated. They were the more highly educated, the more talented, the more accomplished, the more refined Negroes of American life. Dr. Martin Luther King himself was a cultivated man. It was impressive, Tuesday, to see how much accomplishment, how much culture, how much political acumen, how much ability, the Negro race had accumulated at the top of its own structure.

But in the presentation of the Negro race which was made Tuesday there was more than the culture and success and impressive intellect of those at the top. There were other qualities which were also gifts to the nation. There were the beautiful faces made more beautiful still by their sadness. There were the myriad gentlenesses of men and conduct.

Above all, in these people who moved so much closer to all the rest of America Tuesday, in the medium which was the nation, there was the spirituality which told the hearers and watchers of many faiths and of no faith that there was the power and surge of belief, of elemental unity with the universe, which seemed to make the individual involved a particularly vital force, an organic and not merely a doctrinal reality.

In Dr. Martin Luther King there seemed that same combination of distinctive intellectual attainment with

This is a copy of a letter I sent to Reverend Butcher in Hartford.
I wish you could have been with me this morning as I went to work, because the sight I saw would have brought me comfort to your sorrow.
I was directly involved with the busting of Negro students from Hartford's underprivileged neighborhoods. I passed one of these schools as they were dropping these youngsters off for their classes. The white classmates were to vote for congressmen who were dropping their hands and many arms put around their shoulders. I have, of course, a idea what words were said, but I know that Dr. King would have observed this with a smile on his face and gladness in his heart.
Reverend Butcher is inborn in the human heart, it must be taught and divested as a child grows. These children were not being patronized, they were simply concerned because they knew that standing teacher had happened but even though they could not fully understand it, they knew their black friends were deeply involved.
As you know, if the children of both races could influence the adults, they would never have to endure a day's history like last Thursday.
There are many white adults who feel that you people are feeling now, not merely enough. I know, but still angry, and as I have told my friends these days have been thrust now step forward, and they must tell the world that you is the time for them to act and change their attitude because if they don't, this country will not be worth living in.
Legislation, civil rights laws and open housing will do no good to legally allow Negroes to enter a restaurant if the owner does not inwardly welcome him there. It does no good to have a restaurant which supports open housing if the proprietor is not willing to accept Negroes in his neighborhood.
We white Americans have stood aside too long but now I honestly believe that this horror which has finally been brought into every American home may have been the kind of country that my race, your race and especially Dr. King's race will feel privileged to live in.
I ask you with your influence, to tell your people as I have been doing, that there are many whites who are concerned with the Negroes and who stand up to be counted. Please tell them also that they must now also stand up and be counted as you and millions of others of your race have done.

Metal Plate Smooths Ride To Elevator

Manchester Memorial Hospital has recently developed a device which when placed across the door opening of an elevator allows wheeled vehicles to roll smoothly in and out of the elevator.

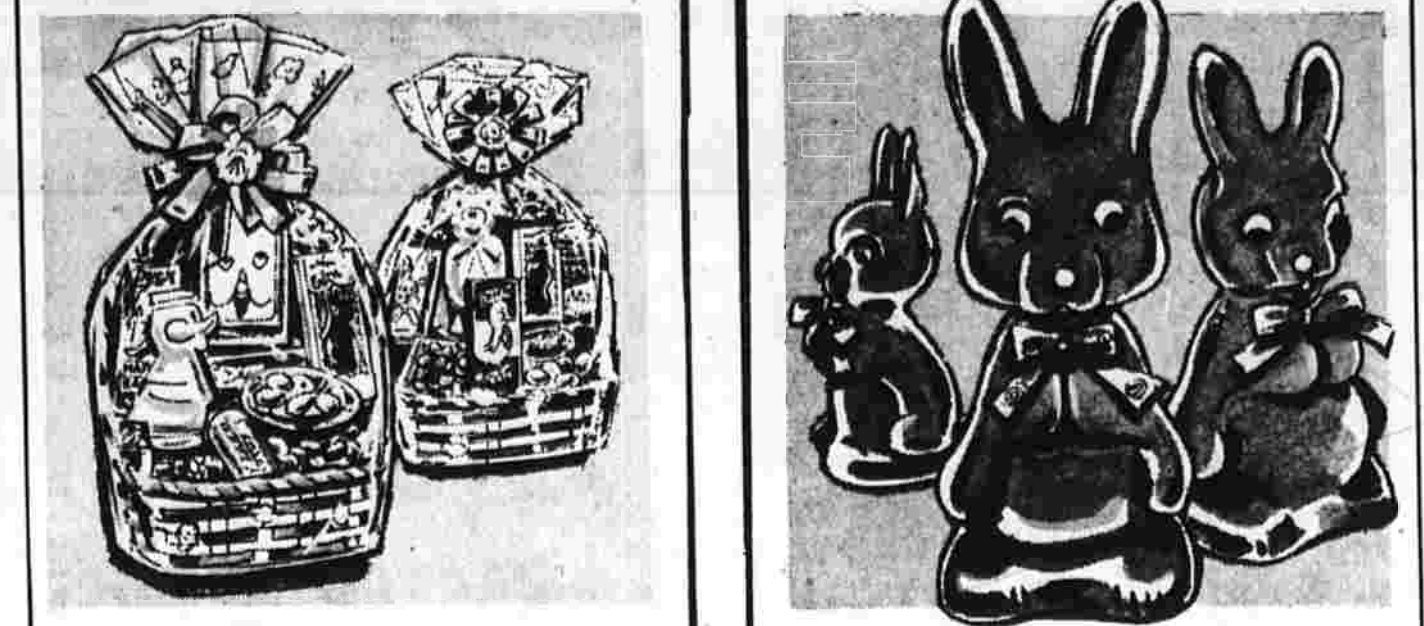

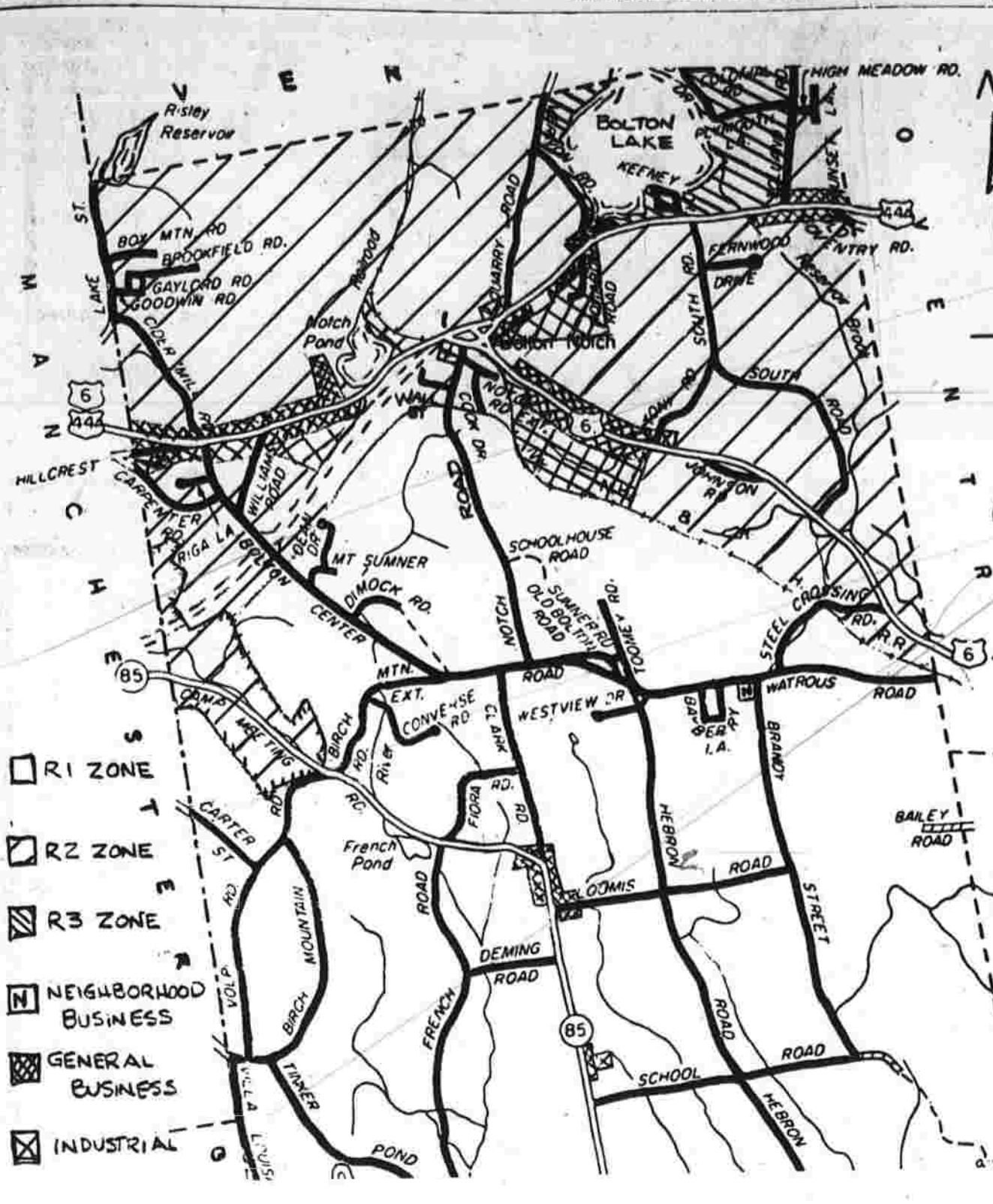

South Windsor School Board Hears Curriculum Report

The Board of Education's meeting last night at the Timothy Edwards Middle School was the first in a series of meetings on the curriculum at the new 15 percent larger in enrollment school. Various members of the school departments explained their respective curricula and then answered the questions of the board members.

Leslie Albes of the English department stressed that reading skills should be taught beyond the sixth grade and indicated that at Timothy Edwards the teaching of reading has been extended into the seventh grade and hopefully will go on into the eighth grade next year.

On the need for funds it was stated that next year the high school building will be 20 percent larger than the middle school and new positions are needed to maintain proper class size for the present enrollment and projected school population.

The mathematics curriculum was discussed by Robert Freeman, who explained that at this time math can be a new and exciting area and not the same as it was in previous years. Under a new program instituted at the Timothy Edwards School a child can take regular ninth grade algebra in the eighth grade and thus if he continues to study math can have a total of five years of college preparation in math.

Philip Bourque explained the social studies program and said up at the public hearing on that different texts are used to suit the students levels; that a student with reading difficulties can use a text geared to his ability and intended to stimulate him to further interest in the social studies.

American history with emphasis upon democratic institutions is taught in eighth grade as well as in eleventh on the high school level. Also, economics has been brought to the students' attention and economics are working on developing further their presentation of the history of Connecticut.

Changes in science curriculum were discussed by the science program and explained how the program had been changed five years ago so as to be set up to serve the specific needs of the children of South Windsor. In the seventh grade the course is basically biology and in the eighth it is physical science which correlates with what students have learned in seventh grade.

The reduction of three classroom teachers would be offset by the fact that the board is planning to increase the number of classroom teachers to 18. It will either curtail the present educational program or increase the load to unreasonable pupil-teacher levels, or would curtail the education of handicapped children.

On Good Friday from noon to 1 p.m. there will be Ante Communion. Library and the penitential office. At 7:30 p.m. the Way of the Cross will be read. On Easter Sunday the celebration of Holy Communion will be at 8 and 10 a.m. Anyone unable to be in church for the Easter services may arrange with the vicar to bring the Eucharist Communion to them.

The board maintains that if the cuts are made by the council efficiency of the South Windsor High School will be diminished. The Board continued that the cuts are not to provide additional funds for the high school but to maintain a quality education program in South Windsor. Deep concern exists because of the size of the town council cuts.

The board feels that with the problems facing young people today, it does not seem realistic to make this kind of sacrifice in educational program. Teacher Cuts Assailed

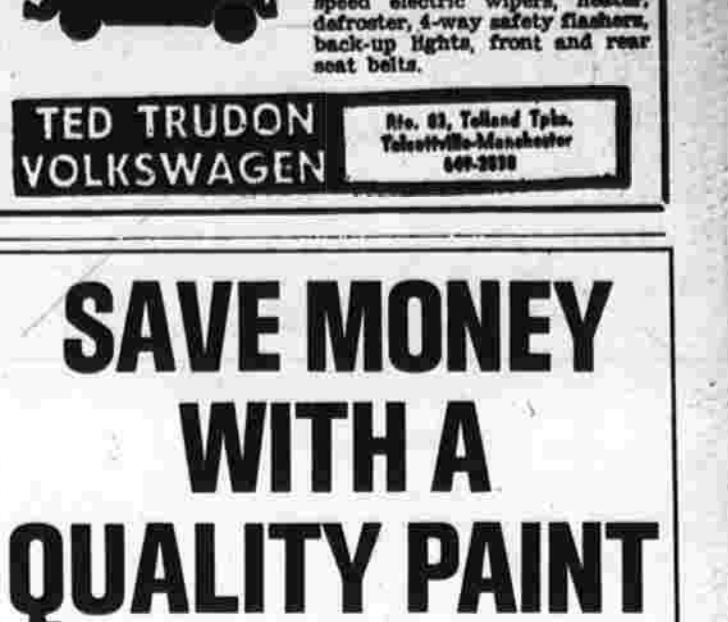

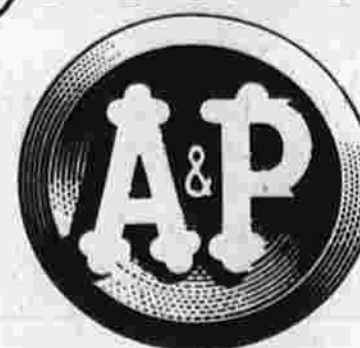

Not in many years has so much civic effort been exerted to present the Academy Awards in an atmosphere of dignity and excitement. The plethora of shows that marred last year's event—only one of the acting winners was present—appears to have been avoided. The academy proudly predicts that 17 acting nominees will be in the Santa Monica Civic Auditorium for the awards. The turnout was accomplished by means of cajoling, pleading and even some home-trading. Supporting actress nominee Estelle Parsons will appear because of an agreement between academy producer David Merrick, for whom she is working in the new Tennessee Williams play. When Merrick pleaded that Miss Parsons be excluded from tonight's performance of the play, Merrick replied: "If I let her go if you'll appear on the Tony Awards show."

"You've got a deal," replied Merrick, who will be among the presenters of the stage awards April 21. The only acting nominees who won't be in the Oscar audience are Katharine Hepburn, who is making a film in France, and Paul Newman, who offered the eyebrow-raising excuse that he is in the East editing the film he directed last year. Mrs. Spencer Tracy will accept the Oscar if her late husband should win. No production numbers are planned, but nominated songs will get an airing with the talents of Shirley Jones, Louis Armstrong, Lamei Kazan, Angela Lansbury and Sergio Mendez and Bread 66. The telecast (ABC—10 p.m. EST) has been tentatively scheduled for two hours, but it remains open-ended in case of overtime. If past performance is any criterion, it will run overtime. Sonny, Cher, Little Noticed Until Teamed

WASHINGTON—On stage Sonny and Cher's banter is slightly antagonistic. When she finishes a solo, he remarks, "Not bad for a girl," she looks bored during his number and he tells the audience, "She did that during last night's show and I made her sleep on the couch—I think she liked it."

The show ends and the tone swiftly changes. Sonny puts a protective arm on Cher's shoulder to guide her through the clamoring crowd which follows them as they leave the stage. In the dressing room, he inquires anxiously, "Are you all right?"

She, sinking into the nearest chair, sighs, "I've got a headache that will not quit."

He secures aspirin and soda and parries questions from reporters, musicians and the press as she sits quietly in the corner, resting after the first of two shows, here recently.

Sonny sips a soft drink and talks about the Sonny and Cher phenomenon.

The two (real names Salvatore Busico and Cheryl Ladd) met in 1964 when he was 20, she 17. A short while later—she says six months, she is not sure—they were married.

Both had previously done some little noticed professional singing, but once teamed, they ignited. The second record they made as Sonny and Cher, "I Got You, Babe," sold four million copies.

The two seem prototypes of today's youth—she Everygirl with her long, straight hair and eyebrow level bangs, heavy eye make-up, mini dress and maxi boots and he with long hair and colorful garb including beads and rings.

As Sonny tells his young audience, "When we started singing together three years ago, it was hard to dress differently. Some people wanted to punch you in the face."

Today, as Sonny admits, their odd garb hardly strikes a discordant note. "We like to think we've made it easier for people to be what they were."

Cher designs most of her own and Sonny's clothes. "Not that," she says, frowning, "I picked this up in the Village. The couple wears the Indian carved wedding bands—his says "Cher," hers "Sonny."

But they are trying to change the image of Bobby's twins. Each has recently made a solo television appearance and Cher will star in a movie which Sonny will write and produce, but will not appear in.

"We are forced to be apart to show that we can entertain," says Sonny. "Any movie we're in together will immediately be characterized as 'for teeny boppers.'"

Sonny says the movie, to be called "Chastity," will be a difficult commentary on the difficulties of being a girl today; a subject on which he is very vocal.

"We have a triple moral standard today—people think one thing, say another and do a third."

"A girl doesn't know whether to be a virgin (and thus square, she thinks) or whether to go ahead and be modern (she assumes). This conflict creates tremendous pressure on the girl, whatever she decides. It has caused a large increase in frigidity and lesbianism among modern women."

"Today women are as independent as men, but they don't want to be. Every woman wants a man who takes care of her and protect her."

"A woman will always test her man to see how far she can go, but she wants him to set the limits."

Sonny feels that the movie will have a message for parents, as well as their offspring. "It's a way, I hope, to be the one to show them what's going on, but it goes on."

However, Sonny, 27, has little faith in the average adult's ability to learn from his mistakes and change. "They just cannot change," he says, but adds that he has. "At one time I was a model, which I had no right to be, but Cher changed all that. To me, Cher, like the character she plays in the movie, is a true innocent."

Nurses Made 1,326 Visits Last Month

Activities of the Rockville Public Health Nursing Association during the month of February included 1,326 visits made by the visiting nurses. Of these 247 were for bedside care and treatments, 967 for health guidance and 102 for moderate purposes.

New babies visited totaled 47. The physical therapist is currently visiting three patients.

At the immunization clinic held in February, 36 infants and preschool children received 11 measles, nine mumps and 25 DPT inoculations. Dr. Joseph J. Kristian was in charge.

The nurses spent 648 hours of their time in Vernon, which includes Rockville, 118 hours in Tolland, and 102 hours in Ellington schools.

Six expectant mothers graduated from the classes for mother-to-be and received certificates.

Representing the nursing association at the recent annual meeting of the Connecticut Public Health Nursing Association, Inc. were Miss Ruth E. Hoy, supervisor; Mrs. Betty Cormier, assistant supervisor; Mrs. Harry Hamner, chairman of the Nursing Committee; Mrs. Samuel Pearl, corresponding secretary; and Mrs. E. Fenton Burke, president of the board of directors of the agency.
