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The Blitz Bloops

When Senator Kennedy entered the 1968 Presidential race, he set himself off on a whirling tour of the country while his organization concentrated on reconstructing, as speedily as possible, the same accumulation of money power, deal power, and alliance power which had brought his brother through to the nomination in 1960.

The first results were impressive. The Senator himself proved capable of attracting crowds which, if they were too young and too screamy, were nevertheless large. The mirage of Kennedy money and Kennedy alliance rolled out in front of the actuality, giving the impression that the young Senator, with the Vietnam issue, was going to be able to give President Johnson a real conention battle, Then, when President Johnson seemed to change course on Vietnam and did announce that he himself would not be a candidate, the road seemed, for a few days, open for Bobby. All he had to do, apparently, was continue with his blitz, and he might be able

to wrap the thing up early. It is now in the air, as well as in reports from various campaign headquarters, that the Kennedy blitz has not proved quite as devastating as its organizers may have hoped.

All the old John Kennedy ties have not proved to be automatic Bobby Kenledy ties. The old John Kennedy phrases do not have quite their old pulling power on the tongue of the brother. The old John Kennedy pros are holding themselves back from any immediate commitment.

On the other hand, Vice President Hubert Humphrey, posing as the slow starter, and busying himself with pulling some visible support together before he takes the formal plunge, seems to be establishing himself as a really formidable contender.

As things now stand, it would not be surprising to see the Democratic National Convention wind up composed 40 per cent of enemies of Bobby Kennedy, 40 per cent of enemies of Hubert Humphrey. and 20 per cent of admirers of Senator Eugene McCarthy, with the final outcome dependent upon the status of war and peace in Vietnam, or, barring any clear signal from that direction, a convention deadlock which might last beyond November.

By Signal Or By Surprise? In the first phases of the new diplomethic situation with regard to Vietnam the theory which kept inviting itself forward was one which suggested that perhaps both sides knew, from secret diplomacy behind the scenes, what the other was going to do in the way of signal and response, signal and response. This theory was buttressed by public revelation of the way in which preparatory work toward such a kind of deescalation in Vietnam had been done back last summer, in secret diplomacy for which Harvard's Professor Kissinger had been something of a middle man Within a few days, however, as both sides began sputtering inconclusively about the particular place that would be the site for the first negotiations about holding talks for negotiations, another and directly opposite theory began to suggest itself.

This is the theory that both sides surprised each other-that Washington surprised Hanoi when the President announced his de-escalation of bombing plus his own non-candidacy-and that Hanoi surprised Washington just as much when it responded with what amounted to acceptance of the proposal to negotiate about negotiating.

Whether a confrontation born of mutual surprise can be as safe and beneficial as one rising from some secret mutual planning is not easy to tell. Perhaps it doesn't make much difference how the thing happens.

However the new phase began, by halfunderstood plan, or by surprise, one part of the behavior of both parties has been rather consistently parallel. Each side has, during the period of possible aproach toward talks, been plcturing itself as already in the dominant, near-victorious position on the battle-For Hanoi, the Tet Offensive

taught us a lesson once and for all. For Washington, the same Tet Offensive representing the beginning of the military end for the enemy. Senator Aiken of Vermont once suggested, some time ago, that the United States arbitrarily acclaim itself as the victor in Vietnam, and then prepare to de-escalate on that basis. Now North Vietnam, propagandawise, seems to have taken at least part of his advice.

We happen to think the truth is that both sides have discovered that neither can win. But if it sounds better to have both claiming to have won, and if they are willing to leave the battlefield for the conference table on that basis, who will offer real guarrel with such a pleasant and beneficial self-deception?

The League On Question 11

In finding that the proposed Charter Revision change in the system of electing Manchester Boards of Education answers no demonstrated need and promises undesirable results in itself, the Manchester League of Women Voters is paralleling the unanimous opinion of those who have education itself at heart.

The present system of electing a board with staggered terms, so that there is never a lack of continuity and service on the board is in itself one of the checks and balances in the New England town government system, designed to give the schools something of a special protection from the shallower tides of politics. It is a system which should be retained. The new proposal, from the current Charter Revision Commission, providing for the election of an entire new board every two years, is in itself the product of one of these shallower tides of politics. It is, one suspects, a gesture toward those who wanted to weigh the whole record of the last Board of Education purely on the basis of the fact that, on top of this record, it had also voted to permit Project Concern to place some 65 pupils in the schools of Manchester.

The fact is that those voters of Manchester who felt so strongly about Project Concern they wanted to vote against somebody because of it had their chance in the election which followed the acceptance of the Project, and that some of them indeed made their opinion and sentiment visible, with influential political result. This was freedom of expression and opinion and voting within a system, but it was not the destruction of the system itself. And so long as there is that continuing opportunity for citizens who think and feel one way or another on specific issues, there is no serious demonstrable need for tampering with the system itself.

U.S. Aides Spied, Moscow Implies

MOSCOW (AP) - The Soviet government accused five U.S. military attaches and one from Canada today of overstepping the line between legal activity and "open espionage."

The U.S. Embassy responded with a charge that the Soviet Union on several occasions violated the diplomatic immunity of American military attaches in Moscow. It said the violations ranged "from minor, such as short detention, to various serious ones involving prolonged detention, forcible search and selzing of personal property." Both the U.S. and Canadian

against the six attaches as un-The charges, as detailed in the government newspaper Izvestia, implied spying at a military base in Soviet White Russia and a shipyard in Lenin-

Charges d'affaires of the two embassies were called separate-ly to the Soviet Foreign Ministry and the charges presented to

There was no immediate indication that the Soviet government would declare the attaches persona non grata - unwanted ersons - expelling them from the country.

"They crossed the border of curiosity and ended up on the path of vice," Izvestia said. The charges against the attaches were made public after another official Soviet newspaper accused the leader of a U.S. student exchange group of esp8onage last summer
