#### It May Have Saved Both There was, in the last round of big city riots, a new control technique on

display which some people are beginning to attack as really a lack of control techniques. Putting it bluntly the new policy is as it was displayed on television from Washington. It is a policy of being willing to sacrifice some property in the effort to avoid the taking of human lives. On television it looked as if the authorities were deliberately refraining from trying to stop the fire and loot tactics

The outraged cry raised against this kind of tactic on the part of the authorities is that it condones violation of the law. There is no good answer to that charge, not as a matter of principle. And sooner or later things which can't be squared with principle usually prove to be bad in themselves.

In the pragmatic meantime, however, it seems to us there is much to be said for the new technique, and not merely from the point of view of saving lives. First, however, it seems to us that it did save lives, and that the lives it saved night well have been lives just as insecent as any property that was being lestroved or looted. In this series of riots, the new technique was not yet on display in one city, Kansas City, and pitched and continuing battle between the police and the ghetto erupted. There will killed whom, but several of the deaths were obviously innocent of any participation in the rioting or firing or looting.

Second, it seems to us quite conceivable that the new policy not only saved lives, which seems beyond question, but that it also actually reduced the amount of looting and burning about which it eemed so permissive, and reduced it far below the levels of damage it might have attained if authority had been trying to attack it more directly. This ound of riots was, for instance, the first in which the work of the firemen was not hampered and obstructed. But the really enticing possibility is that the ooters grew tired of their sport much more quickly this time than they would have if they had had their blood roused by armed opposition. They knew, in their hearts, they were doing something they weren't very proud of. And it was so relatively tame, this time, the sense of shame may have come more quickly

What we suggest, as a sort of summary theorem, is this: That when the potential force of the riots was met, this time, by a resistance which was generally quicker, and more adequate in numbers, but more passive in its own conduct, the resultant damage which developed in the clash between the rioters and authority was considerably less than it would have been, both property-wise and life-wise, if authority had pushed forward with drawn guns. The new technique may have saved both lives and

#### Moral And Legal

Edwin N. Griswold, the solicitor general of the United States, made an observation about civil disobediance Wednesday night that ought to be well tood, but apparently is not.

Mr. Griswold made the simple point that while individuals have a moral right to disobey laws they believe to be unjust, they have no legal right to do so.

Most of those who set out deliberately

to violate a law because they find the law abhorrent understand this firm distinction, but their sympathizers and followers often do not. Those who feel compelled by conscience to disobey, must not only be ready to accept the legal consequences of their action, but they must, if they are consistent, actually invite prosecution.

Dr. Spock and his co-defendants understood this when they collected draft cards from objectors to the Vietnam war and turned those cards in to the Justice

convincing job of spotlighting these dif-The European immigrants arrived as America was becoming urbanized and industrialized, in need of great pools of unskilled labor. This enabled them to gain an economic foothold, and their children and grandchildren could even tually move up the economic ladder to

Today the demand for unskilled labor has shrunk sharply. Negroes migrating to the cities since the 1940s lack the skills required by the new economy, and the slum schools haven't been able to provide these fast enough. "The Negro migrant, unlike the immigrant, found little opportunity in the city," says the riot commission. "He had arrived to late, and the unskilled labor he had to offer was no longer needed."

Racial discrimination further snarls any Negro bootstrap effort. A black skin is harder to conceal in a white society than a brogue or hooked nose or pe culiar name. Even more relevant is the pattern, as old as America itself, of thinking of the Negro in mental terms and relegating him to menial jobs.
