At the last session of the State Legislature, the "Clean Water Bill, Public Act #57," was passed. This Act, gives the State of Connecticut the authority, by law, to clean up the streams of the State and to control the waters that flow into these streams. Therefore, Manchester (and some industries) is confronted with an edict from the State of Connecticut that orders secondary

treatment of all of its waste waters be provided and that such treatment be in operation by Dec. 31, 1970. For the benefit of those that are unfamiliar with the treatment of waste waters, there are two types of treatment that are necessary. One type is called "Primary Treatment" which the Town and 8th District has at present. The "Primary Treatment" removes approximately 50% of the solids from the waste waters.

The other type, "Secondary Treatment," which the Town and District do not have, removes an additional 40% or more of the To simplify, if you will visualize a treatment plant as being a huge washing machine capable of handling 6% million gallons per

day—the actual washing operation is similar to the "primary treatment" in that approximately 50% of the dirt or solids have been The rinsing operation of this huge washing machine is similar to the "secondary treatment," and therein, the additional dirt or

olids (an added 40% or more) is removed. The State of Connecticut is insistent that the Town install such a "secondary treatment" facility so that the waste waters flowing into the State streams meet their standards.

The State and Federal governments are providing substantial funds to assist in the completion of these facilities. In addition, there are other provisions for those communities that qualify under the stipulations of Public Act #57, such as, the payment of 30% of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the present facility. This will amount to an outright grant of \$189,900 There is also an interest free State grant of 7% of the total project cost that the Town would be eligible for, that can be used

in paying for engineering and planning expenses. These grants would be forfeited if the project is not approved at the referendum Manchester has reserved certain Federal grants and these grants, too, will be forfeited if the Town does not move ahead with this poject in accordance with the time schedule set up by the State. If the referendum item schedule for vote on April 30th is defeated, Manchester could be faced with paying for the entire cost (without the benefit of State and Federal funds) for this "MUST"
