When you must develop two suits to make your contract, you must lead one suit first, because the opponents get very agitated if you lead two suits at the same time. The suit to lead first is not necessarily the one you will provide more tricks for.

Opening lead — Five of Hearts South won the first trick in dummy and returned a club "automatically." It was the suit in which he expected to win most of his tricks, and he saw no reason to postpone its development.

East took the ace of clubs and led a heart to see if his partner's suit. South could finesse or not, as he pleased. The outcome would be the same. He needed the rest of his nine tricks without loss of his lead.

Heralding Homes Monterose Home in Tour

STORY BY DORIS BELDING PHOTOS BY SYLVIA OLFIRA The interests of its owners are reflected in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Monterose of Abby Rd. East, Wapping, which, although antiques are placed throughout the house, is contemporary, warm and extremely livable.

Monterose, an artist who has received numerous awards for his paintings in exhibits throughout the state, has created pictures and designed furniture especially for many of the rooms in his home. His wife, whose hobby is sewing, chose unusual fabrics and designs for the curtains and draperies she made for all the windows. Together with their butler, the couple planned the eight-room, front-to-back split level to best suit their needs.

On Saturday, May 21, the home will be one of the 16 opened to the public for a "Tour of Homes" to benefit the South Windsor Committee for Retarded Children and sponsored by 15 of South Windsor's Church and Civic Groups. Tickets may be purchased from Mrs. Margaret Kingman of 819 Clark St., or Mrs. D. P. Cavanaugh of 840 Main St., both of South Windsor, or at St. Francis of Assisi Church Hall, South Windsor, after 10:30 a.m. on the day of the tour. The tour was initiated by the Ladies Guild of St. Francis of Assisi Church.

A circular driveway of washed natural stones curves up to the front entrance of the house which is enclosed by an open porch. The exterior consists of cream vertical board and batten, shingles and a brick facade. Both the main portion and all of the house have lead-toe roofs, and the lines of the roofs are repeated in the fenced-in courtyard at the rear.

The front doors open directly opposite the entrance to the dining room and on to a hallway extending across the side of the house. A lithographed copy of a Toulouse-Lautrec poster, an ink drawing of a Mexican playing an instrument and a large sculpture of a woman's head and shoulders are placed in the room. The Monteroses also count folk singing as one of their hobbies and they appear frequently in this area with "The Whippoorwill." Floors in the hallway and dining room are of Vermont slate.

Monterose, an engineer with Hamilton Standard, Division of United Aircraft, Broad Brook, hand-hewed the fir beams for the dining and family room ceilings. He also made the built-in maple table in the dining room and stained it to match the finish on the table and chairs. An antique butter churn filled with dried swarf grass is in the corner of the dining room near sliding glass panels which may be opened on to a walled patio.

Pumpkin colored counter tops accent the lantern gold of the kitchen walls. Monterose built the kitchen table and benches, the indirectly lighted cornice above them, and painted a still life for the wall using colors that complement the decor of the room.

The focal point of the living room is a fireplace of hatched bricks designed with circular mantel of carved walnut. Antique coach lanterns of brass and emerald green glass are hung at each side of the fireplace. A sofa and side chair in the room is covered with blue and white Scandinavian print, and two winter landscapes pick up the tones of the pean wood and soft green lacquered furniture.

A family room and "Art Gallery" is on the lower level, and features a portrait by Von Schlippe of egg tempers and oil glass made by a method used by 18th hand hewn beams forming the mantel. The fireplace is made of skyline quarries from Ellington with hand hewn beams forming the mantel. The gray of the stone are repeated in the sliding windows of colored quartz. A Scandinavian Bya rug of wool and linen yarn hangs on one wall of the family room and was hand woven by the Monteroses.

Also on the lower level is the art studio. It is paneled in knotty cedar and cedar shingles, and pen and ink sketches by Monterose are hung around the room. He also designed the antique stained glass windows in the studio.

Three bedrooms and baths are on the upper level of the house.

Pool Fence Would Cost About \$3,300

Director of Public Works Walter Foss has estimated that a new seven-foot-high fence at Globe Hollow Swimming Pool would cost about \$3,300 to install. The estimate was requested by General Manager Robert Weiss, in order to determine whether swimming fees should be charged at all pools next summer, or at none.

Up to now, fees have been the rule at Salters and Verplanck Pools, with Globe Hollow, because it is not fenced, free.

Reo Superintendent Horace Murphy has recommended the lifting of all fees, citing the poor net returns and the designation of life guards as ticket takers, as his main reasons.

Weiss, at first, went along with Murphy's recommendation, but then decided to explore the possibility of a fence at

Globe Hollow, in the event fees are retained. The town, this summer, will have four pools, with the one at Waddell School scheduled for completion in July.

The Globe Hollow fence which Foss has in mind would run east from the existing bathroom fence to the Camp Kennedy dirt road, then south along the west edge of that road about 500 feet to a point south of the existing picnic area, then west to the spillway from the reservoir. The new fence would have two gates.

In the event the fence is installed, the board of directors may consider another possibility—admission to all pools to holders of a rec membership card, as recommended by Mayor Francis Mahoney.

CURRENCY EXHIBIT

What does a \$3 bill look like? What happens to money when a country has uncontrolled inflation?

Several displays of currency exhibited at the Savings Bank of Manchester on Main St. for the next several weeks show this.

A display of Colonial currency shows paper money which was printed by a Rhode Island bank in 1780. The display shows not only a \$3 bill, but also paper money in the amount of \$4, \$7 and \$8.

Exhibited also is a fascinating display showing the ravage of inflation as it took place in Germany between the years 1916 and 1923. Thirty coins of various denominations put out by the Germans during this time are shown. As precious metals in the country became more and more scarce, baser metals were used in the coins and they lost their purchasing power. Several of the coins are even made of porcelain.

To show the decline in value, the creator of the display compares purchasing power of the German mark to a U.S. dollar. In 1913, it took slightly over four marks to equal one dollar; by 1922, it took 7,357 marks to equal a dollar, according to the display. Finally, by December of 1923, when the German economy collapsed, it took a fantastic number of 4 trillion 200 billion marks to equal one American dollar.

Displayed in the exhibit is one German coin, about the size of a present American half-dollar. It was minted in 1923 and its denomination was one billion marks.

Displayed also is a collection of historic American paper money, showing \$10 bill with a Buffalo engraving on it, a \$5 bill with the picture of an Indian on it, and a \$10 bill, called military currency, which could only be used in U.S. military establishments.

Shown also are some of the gold certificate bills which state on them that "twenty dollars in gold coin will be paid to bearer on demand."

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Emmy List: Honors for Lackluster

TV Visits the Golden Days of Radio

NEW YORK (AP) — Television's lackluster year has produced a lackluster list of nominations for Emmy Awards. These are supposed to be the industry's highest honors since they are sponsored by its own organization, the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences.

Naturally, most of the year's high moments were reflected in the list of 225 or so nomination releases Tuesday — "Color Me Barbra," "The Julie Andrews Show" and the coverage of the Pope's visit to New York.

For the most part, the programs seemed to have been nominated almost perfunctorily, with a Nielsen national rating report in one hand and a pencil in another. "Batman" won a nomination in the comedy category. "Bonanza," after eight unchanging years of horse opera, is in the running for "outstanding dramatic series."

Barbara Parkins, who did her best suffering two years ago in "Peyton Place" is up for a best actress citation — against Barbara Stanwyck who plays the matriarch in a Western and Anne Francis who played a lady private eye and karate expert in a series that didn't make the grade.

It probably doesn't make much difference to the viewers who will be watching the Emmy Awards show on CBS May 22 when the winners — elected by anonymous blue ribbon panels — will be announced.

If the program — coming live from New York and Hollywood — moves fast enough, if there are enough stars in interesting clothes in the audience and on stage, it won't make much difference to them who wins the statuettes. Another Nation Is Leak Expert's Friend

NEW YORK (AP) — Spring thaws are melting flowers but they also bring out leaks. Joseph Blatter, president of a firm which manufactures home roof drainage materials, gives these hints to homeowners who wish to ward off dampened spirits.

"Every leak is a small disaster area and the first sign of trouble with a roof. The foundation of a good roof is proper nailing. As for another litter problem—leaky roof surfaces, gutters, and downspouts clear of clogging like-leaves and twigs, so that water won't back up."

"A roof should be inspected at least once a year for change shape. Give it ventilation and let it breathe, or it may change shape and that also causes leaks."

"Watch for signs of wear such as pitting and bubbling in the paint. This is damage to roofs, and homes near salt water are more likely to develop roof trouble than those farther inland."
