

A circular driveway of washed natural stones curves up to the front entrance of the house which is enclosed by an open porch. The exterior constructed uses vertical board and batten, shingles and a brick facade. Both the main portion and ell of the house have lean-to roofs, courtvard at the rear. The front door opens directly opposite the entrance

to the dining room and on to a hallway extending across the side of the house. A lithographed copy of a Toulouse-Lautrec poster, an ink drawing of a Mexican playing an instrument and a large sculpture of a drummer boy are in the entrance hall and carry out a theme of music and people. The Monteroses also count folk singing as one of their hobbies and they appear frequently in this area with "The Whippoorwills." Floors in the hallway and dining room are of Vermont slate. 
vision of United Aircraft, Broad Brook, hand-hewed the fir beams for the dining and family room ceilings. He also made the built-in maple hutch in the dining room and stained it to match the finish on the table and chairs. An antique butter churn filled with dried swamp grass is in the corner of the dining room near sliding glass panels which may be opened on to a walled patio. Collecting antique tools is another of Monterose's hobbies and he has a gallery arrangement of them on the soft avocado colored dining room walls, together with a Spanish pitchfork made of a single piece of wood, the root of which was trained to form the tines. Pumpkin colored counter tops accent the lantern gold of the kitchen walls. Monterose built the kitchen table and benches, the indirectly lighted cornices above them, and painted a still life for the wall using colors that

complement the decor of the room. The focal point of the living room is a fireplace of blistered bricks designed with circular mantel of carved walnut. Antique coach lanterns of brass and emerald green glass are hung at each side of the fireplace. A sofa and side chair in the room is covered with blue and white Scandinavian print, and two winter landscapes pick up the tones of the pecan wood and soft green lacquered furniture. A family room and "Art Gallery" is on the lower level.

He depended on the routine consensus which came to him just once, and was his own man forever after. He resented platitudes, not only for themselves, but for the type o thinking they represented and the kind of policy they evaluated. He too, like Eisenhower, was a balancing intel-

lectual and policy and judgment force in the nation. Under Eisenhower and Kennedy, the nation had ten years in which it had a defender of reason and the reasoning process in the White House.

In the clutch, again and again, we could and did rely on the man then in the White House to exercise judgment. to know how far to go, and where to stop, where to be adamant and where to negotiate. That huxury of being able to rely, for

ten years, on somebody in the White House to keep the worst from happening" or to reject the worst policy alternative, may not have been good for us, or good for the United States

If we think we find ourselves confronted with a situation in which the White House neither possesses nor exrcises mature judgment, if we have begun to debate what lies behind and what necessitates the platitudes the President and the Vice President keep pouring over their somewhat uneasy and ques-tioning constituents—then it behooves us to begin to stir our own processes of thought and opinion again, to begin to take things out for ourselves and examine them as they are, rather than continue to take them as we are told they

There is the role in which Senator Fulbright has been taking the lead. We don't know what will become of him or what will happen to him as a result. ut we consider it almost inconceivable that we could continue to be a great nation if we did not have somebody oing exactly what he is doing.

Distance Helps The Tolerance We are not quite sure where real true blue Americanism lies in such an issue, but we can't resist the hope that it lies

with the position which might be called tolerance for something a little bit un-

American. We refer, with pleasure we cannot muite restrain, to a tolerant and gentle settlement which the constituted authorities of the state of Iowa have just negotiated with that state's Old Order Amish community.

By the settlement, the Amish children won't be dragged off to attend the same schools the other children in the state attend. They will still go to their one room schoolhouse. They will be taught there by state-certified teachers whose salaries a private do-good foundation will help pay. In their one room school, they will get a pretty old-fashioned, fundamentalist education, which will avoid offense to their particular in terpretations of the Bible. But, other than that negative influence on the teaching, there will be no entrance of

All this instead of what the state of Iowa has been trying to do in the past which was to cart the Amish children off to public schools, or fine their parents for not sending them to school, and then auction off their grain to pay

In announcing the agreement the other day, Governor Harold Hughes admitted that such gentle treatment of the eccentric Amish might inspire some of the brethren who have been having trouble in other states to move to Iowa

"If the Amish from over America decide this is a good place to live, I welcome them to Iowa.

America are big enough in space and spirit to provide a kindly place for all good people, regardless of race, creed or

"One of the most precious parts of the American heritage has been our willingness as a people to lean over backward to assure minority groups freedom of conscience. It is a tradition

Now to be sure, in feeling approvs for this, we are not really being honest. We are not facing up to the possibility that these particular Amish, or some cult like them, should so flourish and grow among us as to demand room for their queer standards and their own special schools in every state and every community. In that case we might consider them a menace to the American way of life rather than an especially colorful instance of how much room America has for differences. Tolerance, as usual, comes most easily when it is for some special, limited case located a long way off.

Out Of A Lifetime

One Purshottam Kakodkor, leader of the Congress Party in the Indian state last November and was finally discovered, just the other day, meditating on the banks of the holy Ganges River.

time out of a lifetime, if it should tell a man who he is and why he is where he is, and where he is going,

Not Enough Listening

Do we ever stop to consider the lone-

liness of most teen-agers? To us, their

experience is universal; to each of them it is unique. Each is in his prison of conformity to a group-centered standard, of response to the challenge to compete, and often of doubt as to his ability to become anybody of his own, anybody at all. Both as teachers and as parents we say that we "sympathize," I wonder if we do, or if we do it right. I wonder if we are not sometimes too ready to dismiss teen-age insecurity, and its refuge in group-mindedner with the easily formed phrase: "It's just a stage; he'll grow out of it" without reflecting that he or she is not yet out of it and hence needs our sympathy. And by sympathy we should not mean patronization ("I was a boy once myself") or gushing solicitude ("I know how hard it is for you, dear") but rather the forgivable flattery of taking the young seriously. When a boy or girl works hard at something, an athletic team or even a rock-and-roll combo, something has been accomplished that is worth noticing. Or if, in a rare burst of confidence, he wants to tell us something, we should thank our stars and get ready to listen. For we cannot say to a teen-ager what we should like to say, and be listened to, unless he can say to us what he would like to say, and be listened to. Many of us, I am sure, do all too much talking and not enough listening. And many young peo-ple are reluctant to confide because they have received too little encouragement.

NEW YORK (AP) - Television's lackluster year has produced, a lackluster list of nominations for Emmy Awards. These are supposed to be the industry's highest honors since they are sponsored by its own organization, the National Academy of Television Arts and

Naturally, most of the year's high moments were reflected in the list of 225 or so nomination released Tuesday — "Color Me Barbra," "The Julie Andrews Show" and the coverage of the Pope's visit to New York.

For the most part, the programs seemed to have been nominated almost perfunctorily, with a Nielsen rational rating report in one hand and a pencil in another. "Batman" won a nomination in the comedy cate-gory. "Bonanza," after eight unchanging years of horse op-era, is in the running for "outstanding dramatic series."

Barbara Parkins, who did her best suffering two years ago in "Peyton Place" is up for a best actress citation — against Bar-bara Stanwyck who plays the matriarch in a Western and Anne Francis who played a lady private eye and karate expert in a series that didn't make the

grade.

It probably doesn't make much difference to the viewers who will be watching the Emmy Awards show on CBS May 22 when the winners — elected by anonymous blue ribbon panels — will be announced.

If the program — coming live from New York and Hollywood — moves fast enough, if there are enough stars in interesting clothes in the audience and on tage, it won't make much difence to them who wins the statuettes. George Wallace May Do Better The world headlines currently convey the news that West Germany's extreme right wing party, the National Democratic, has just scored the most impressive victory of its three year ex-

It scored this victory by amassing 9.8 per cent of the total vote cast in the state election in Baden-Wuerttemberg. With less than one-tenth of the vote cast, the party will wind up with 12 of the 120 seats in the next state parlia-

In previous elections, in other West German states, the right-wing party which offers a super-patriotism which recalls that of another and still more infamous German party of a quarter century ago, has ranged from 5.8 to 8.8 per cent of the vote.

In this new election, then, it went up one per cent over its previous high. This small increase to this small total per cent of the total vote is what is being given attention in the headlines as a matter of international importance and as a possible signal of the survival of dangerous tendencies among the

citizens of Germany. The sense of fright engendered by the appearance and the small success of such party is augmented by some of the rinciples it dares enunciate openly. It s, for instance, in favor of ridding German soil of foreign troops---a natural issue for any party dedicated to rebuildng German nationalism. And it is also n favor of the restoration of Germany's pre-war borders, a precise and very useful issue with one Adolf Hitler.

That is long enough for us Americans to dwell upon the significance and the potential danger of this demonstration of this extremist German party to get as high as 9.8 per cent of the vote in one German state.

Suppose that, at this moment, we interrupt our feeling of superior political wisdom and behavior in order to look at prospects for an extremist party in our own country.

It is a party which, using a lingo which is full of racial signals, proudly declares itself to be taking the field patriotically in defense of the traditiond American virtues. It has as its candidate an orator who is a master at the art of rousing dark emotions with bland and persuasive words.

This party, and its candidate, are going to be on the ballot in many American states this November. In many of these states, the estimate

of the percentage of the total vote cast this party and its candidate are likely to get goes high above the 9.8 per cent which has just been considered so important and newsworthy in Germany. It might even go that high in this supposedly sane and founding state of Con-

Let's be careful whom we presume to look down upon in the business of extremist appeals in politics. Let us remember that, in these turbulent and poisoned times, any community's political sanity is something it has to keep proving to itself, and to the world, over

#### McCarthy In Pennsylvania

The story of the Pennsylvania Democratic primary was not that Senator McCarthy, being on the ballot, scored an 8 to 1 victory over the write-in total for Senator Kennedy and a 10 to 1 victory over the write-in total for Vice President Humphrey.

Being the only one on the ballot, Senator McCarthy was not really running against anybody or in comparison to

The story in Pennsylvania was that more than 401,000 Democratic party members in that state felt favorably enough and strongly enough about Senator McCarthy to go to the trouble of casting a vote for him,

This vote didn't win him many delegates, perhaps only 30 of the state's 130. But it was generously beyond the 200,000 figure which the Senator's friends had thought would be a good showing for him, and the New York Times ediially declared that "Senator Eugene McCarthy's handsome showing in the Pennsylvania Democratic primary is further proof that his candidacy is tak-

The Pennsylvania primary is not the only such straw in the wind. Straw polls in California, for instance, show McCarthy running better than either Kennedy or Humphrey there. The WTIC opinior poll showed McCarthy running slightly better than Kennedy against Nixon, here

All this makes the Indiana primary or May 7 perhaps a little more important than Senator McCarthy likes to concede any single test might be. If he should succeed, in that three-way race between Senator Kennedy, Governor Branigan, and himself, in at least holding his own the amateurish under-dog phase of his campaign would be about over, and the party's professionals would have to begin admitting that he has been develop ing the kind of vote-getting muscle they themselves respect.
