"My God," asked Dr. Kirk, "how could human beings do a thing like this?" It is impossible not to understand and share the pathos and shock of such a Unfortunately, there is also a terrible

answer-an answer of terrible parallels and explanations. There are other things that "human beings" do that are equally shocking and unspeakable, if they are taken up and weighed in the rightly sensitive kind

"Human beings," for instance, have maintained the social and economic orier which has prevailed in this country for the last hundred years. "Human be ings" have perpetuated the shambles and litter and the callous misery of certain living conditions. "Human beings" against the natural rights of other human beings who happened to be of a lifferent culture or color. There are many things of which "human beings" are capable. And some of the most inhuman things of which "human beings" are capable are not acts of commission or visible or definable wrong-doing, or inflicting of wrong, but things of omis-

sion, of not moving or acting one way Dr. Grayson Kirk no more deserves to have the heritage of all this come lown and strike blindly at his particular ecademic office than any individual Negro deserves to be born into a world of ngering discrimination and denial of

There is now going to be, for a time, more emphasis on some of the differences between Republicans, and more of a debate on the potentially divisive issues than Mr. Nixon would ever have chosen to hold with himself. This carries its risk of danger and division to the party; but it also offers the promise of ultimate decision which has meaning and health. Britain's Race With Time On Race

The new Race Relations Bill is the Government's second attempt at legislation in this field within three years. No one suggests that the law alone can change people's behaviour. The tragic events of the other week in Memphis make it abundantly clear that in the American South the passage of laws against segregation has not eliminated the hatred, violence, and second-class citizenship which Negroes still have to suffer. But equally that week's events are yet another reminder of the chao which inevitably results when a community fails to take constructive steps improve race relations in time.

The moral of the American experience is that the authorities, after centuries of slavery and exploitation, have done too little too late. Britain is fortunate to come to this problem from an easier historical starting-point, and to be able to learn from Canada and the United States and other countries. Attitudes are still fluid here. Coloured people have not been here in significant numbers for long. Patterns of behaviour toward them have not hardened, so that here they are not automatically exclude from whole areas of housing or from particular types of job.
