WASHINGTON (AP) — Earlier in the day, Mirlow paced the floor of the AP office, tested his ideas on editors and copy boys, read, researched and paced some more. He was an easy conversational mark for anyone, especially the young.

The past 25 years he wrote a column for The Associated Press from Washington. It was called "The World Today," won awards and was unusual.

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

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

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Rockefeller On Vietnam

When former Vice President Richard Nixon stands, as he now does, with the position that it would be improper and indestrable for him to comment on the Johnson administration's Vietnam policy at a moment when the possibility of negotiations is still alive, he is attempting to put angelic wings on what is really his own practical political nec-

essity at the moment. Mr. Nixon keeps silent primarily not o influence the course of the potential negotiations, but to keep himself in position to jump whichever way the effort to negotiate pans out. If it proves to be successful, he can claim to have helped it. If it proves futile, he can say he expected it all along. But, at the moment, there is really nothing very important he wishes to risk saying about

Governor Rockefeller occupies a different position. He too, no doubt, would like to have been excused from comment on Vietnam at this particular moment, just as he had excused himself from making such comment for nearly three years now. But, precisely because of this long silence, Rockefeller is under compulsion, as a candidate, to prove that he has a Vietnam position, and that he can present it. He did so, in Philadelphia the other day, not because he wanted to, any more than Nixon, but because his particular political situa-

What Rockefeller accomplished in Philadelphia was not anything more than the minimum required of him. He so long impossible for Governor Romney-that of talking about the Vietnam issue without putting his foot in his mouth. And he did manage a nice middle-road discussion of Vietnam, rather pleasantly suited to the non-hawkish, tired, disillusioned, peace-wistful Vietnam consensus which has been building

What this proves-in light of the fact that Governor Rockefeller, when he last had a foreign policy position three years ago, was definitely on the side of the hawkish attitudes then dominating the White House-is that Governor Rockefeller has been following a rather normal evolution of personal views on Vietnam, perhaps not too different from that experienced by the man now in the White

The New York Governor has no brilliant, striking, original solution to our problem in Vietnam. Neither, for that matter, has anybody else. In fact, the most likely prediction for

Vietnam-and perhaps the best thing to hope for with regard to Vietnam-is that there is now a tacit conspiracy between military and political events and the thoughts and feelings of men and nations to let gradual processes of deemphasis and deescalation take place, with negotiation and without negotiation, until Vietnam has somehow ceased to be the crisis upon which the fate of the whole world depends.

The spirit of Rockefeller's middle road pproach to the whole foreign policy home in Asia is better fitted to such long and delicate prospects than the emporary truce the political necessittes of the moment have imposed upon all his options to return to the issue, when he decides to break his truce, with recommendations for greater hawk-like escalations than ever.


