Manchester's New Tax Rate

Last year, after a succession of years n which Manchester did fairly well at the grim task of trying to hold its tax rate steady, there was a break upward in the rate, pleasantly disguised, for those who wished to pretend they weren't paying an increase, by the revaluation of assessments which came

This year, without any pleasant disguise, there has been a major surrender to those rising costs and those additional expenditures no one seems able to re-

And, instead of being able to advertise itself as a community which has proved it can hold its tax rate steady. Manchester treats itself to a 4.1 mill in-

Perhaps there are some taxpayers who can find some way of adjusting their bookkeeping, or their expenditures, or their own incomes, to this nasty increase in their town tax bills.

But the great majority of Manchester homeowners will find themselves powerless to compensate for this additional expense, or to cushion its blow against their own budgets.

The dilemma is this: There seems no asonable way by which those who propose and control town expenditures can handle their duties and responsibilitie without imposing such unreasonable burdens on the taxpayers. Any one of the overburdened, protest-

know, if he or she were put in position of authority and responsibility and told to fix the size of any of the particular appropriations from which the whole bur-

Yet the fact that the problem seems insoluble does not make it tolerable. Sooner or later, something has to give. The routine, almost fashionable, urge in such a situation is to begin beating

the drums for additional financial hel to the towns by the state. And it can be proved that, if it weren't for the present amount of state aid coming into towns like Manchester, our tax rate would need to be many mills higher than it is.

But, even if the state's extraction of money from us all seems less direct and less painful than the direct town tax on real estate, it is not really the sound solution. Rather than disguising the source of the money we spend for government and governmental services, we still need to face the brutal fact that there must come, some day, a halt to the ceaseless escalation of these expenses. Not where the money is coming from, so much as how much money is to be spent, and when it will ever stop in creasing itself, is the real, legitimate question. Is there ever going to prove possible any stabilization, any sound balance between what a community ac-

knowledges as its needs and what it can assess as its resources? Has there ever been an administerator a board member, an executive a poli-tician who proved capable of reducing a municipal expenditure? Or of just holding it stationary? Or, to grow even more

lenient, capable of holding the increase in municipal expenditures to any predetermined rate per year? The answers are, of course, negative. In municipal affairs, as in our business af-

fairs, and our private affairs, our natural talents are all for spending, not for To be fair, while we moan about Man-

chester tax rates, we also have to ask ourselves the question of whether things are much better anywhere else. And the honest answer would have to be that we can easily see, looking out from Manchester, municipal situations and tax rates and prospects for the tuture much worse than ours. What, in face of all the inevitabilities,

can one still recommend for Manches-

First, a more stringent effort than we exerted this year to keep increases in spending to a level that can be financed through the expansion of the town grand

Second, avoidance of new bonding as if it were the plague, even though it means an additional wait for things that seem necessities. There could be a time ahead when we

might begin to find our tax demands upon ourselves easing. But such a time can never come unless we somehow manage to keep some kind of rein on both kinds of spending-both cash and bor-

What we need more of in America and other lands —is downright old-fashoned patriotism. I mean the patriotism defined in dictionaries as "love of country" and as "devotion to the welfare of

Not a jingoistic "my country right or vrong." Nor a nihilist despair which says "smash it as unworthy." But the patriotism which says "Let's do everything in our power to see that our country is right —in its policies, its morality, its concern or the unfortunate.

Is your vision of the United States inxtricably bound up with the singing of "America the Beautiful"? Nothing wrong in that! I still get choked up on "purple mountain majesties," the "alabaster cities," and all the rest. Have you ever seen those snow peaks piled high up there in Glacier National Park? Have you watched sunset on the Arizona desert? Ever seen New York City at dusk from a ferry, with those monstrous monoliths all lit up? I pity anyone to whom all

But patriotism shouldn't include a "gee good but we can't stop it" sort of attitude to everything that comes over the pike: Such as the constant drift of people into the big cities, half of whom wouldn't come if they could see the hardships ahead. Or such as the McLuhan thesis that we are all the children of television, that the TV media has grabbed us, with its instant acquisition of knowledge and instant implantation of desire,

and so it's good-by to books and quiet evenings and calm conclusions. No, the trend to the cities could be reversed if we made that a priority and were willing to spend as much treasure on rural America as we're going to have to spend on urban renewal. And we should combat, tooth and nail, the suggestion that because everything is TV. oriented, we are in the everlasting grip

of the hidden persuaders, the false valuers, the instant conclusioners and the bawdy playwrights. I hope that patriotism means also a caring, not only for the country's repu-tation, but for its appearance. The Swiss and Germans manage not to litter their land with beer cans and dumped refuse.
