Perhaps his qualtty is a mediocrity which seems pleasantly safe and reliable and respectable and a little like maturity.

Lessons For White Liberals

All over this country, in any number of situations involving all kinds of people, we are all learning things about ourselves and about each other as we try to struggle with the implications and effects of the great race issue. Those of us who need to learn much

are of many stripes. There are, of course, those of us who instinctively concentrate on fighting off anything that threatens change. We hope, in vain, that the problem will somehow disappear, that the urgencies will go back into their hidden cubbyholes where they stayed quiet for so many decades. And what has to happen to those of us who feel and reapt this way is some kind of a change in our very chromosomesnot an impossible thing, but a thing which demands all kinds of patience and exposure to the possibility that new, concepts, and different people, may not

really be quite as bad as they seem, at first cringing thought. Then there are those of us who congratulate ourselves upon being liberals, in the forefront of the battle for good causes. We are proud that we carry the banner of tolerance high before us; we think of ourselves as at least someone who has been discharging the obli-

ablished liberal in a kind of educational

gations and responsibilities of a civilized person; we regret the world doesn't have more people just like us, so it could be a better place. Some of us who are this kind of liberal are probably more hopeless, probably more of 'a problem, than the no-

torious reactionary who seems totally controlled by prejudice and superstition. For this kind of liberal is often so ascinated with his own nobility that he never does really get to the core of the problem he is trying to solve. There have been some rather sharp thrusts into the complacency of the es-

tively small band of Negroes attending Carleton College out in Minnesota. One easy but careless liberal assump

tion that was deflated by the Negro educational campaign among the white liberals on the Carleton campus was the assumption that what the Negroes are after is "to become white." Now some of the white liberals have begun to understand that the Negro wants to be a Negro, and proud of being a Negro, and not an imitator of or a highly privileged retainer to the white man.

And the Negroes at Carleton had some refreshingly original advice when they got around to telling their white liberal friends where to do their best field work for the cause. What they told the white liberals was

that "their job wasn't to go into the ghetto and carry on 'missionary' work but rather to go into their own suburbs · to change the attitude of their own white neighbors."

There, in other words, in the white suburbs, rather than in the ghettoes, is the real sickness for white liberals to

Sometimes, it is a question which needs to learn most-the instinctive reactionary or the complacent liberalbut it is a possibility that the incomplete liberal is really the more obdurate problem, first because he is so obviously well-intentioned, second because the particular lesson he needs to learn, al though posed in subtler form, is still essentially the same lesson that some day will have to be learned by his reactionary antagonist-that the desire to be equal does not mean a desire to be like or the same.

The best thing about the new location for London Bridge is that it is go ing to be in a woodless desert some 232 miles east of Los Angeles, and that, therefore, it is likely to be immune, for some time at least, to the sound of the chain saw produced by the gentleman who bought the bridge.

Eventually, in the new city this ger tleman decided, four years ago, to build in the desert, there may be enough specially irrigated trees grown to require the services of one of those grunt-growl saws for which the purchaser of the Bridge has become famous, and from the sale of which, we suppose, he obtained the funds for his \$2,400,000 capi-
